## County Agent's Column

We have been watching the pecans and it looks like the next week or ten days will be a good time to spray them to control the pecan nut case bearer.

The timing of the spray application is the main factor in obtaining control of the casebearer or the pecan borer as it is sometimes called. A knowledge of the life cycle of the insect will help you in making this timing.

The first crop of casebearers feed on the tips of the new shoots or twigs on the pecan in the spring. They go through the pupa or resting stage and hatch into a moth about the size of a clothes moth. By the time the moths hatch the tiny pecans are beginning to show on the trees. The moths lay their eggs on the tip ends of the small nuts. The small bluish white eggs, laid singly, hatch in five to seven days. They can be seen with the naked eye.

After hatching the worms move up and down the twig to which the little nut cluster is attached and start feeding on the second or third bud below the nuts. After feeding four or five days on the buds, they move back to the nut cluster and enter the pecan through a small hole which they eat out at the base.

It is during this period, when the eggs are laid and the time that the worms are feeding on the buds (10 to 12 days) that the spray should be applied. After the worms enter the nuts, spraying will not control them.

We believe the best time to spray is in the next week or ten days, and by the 26th or 27th at the latest. Most of the nuts are just now fertilized and the tip ends have turned brownish gray.

There are several spray mixtures which will control the pecan nut casebearer. The one that has given good control is three pounds of 50 per cent wettable DDT powder in 100 gallons of water.

Proper spraying of the trees is as important as spraying at the right time. Each limb, from bottom to top, must be thoroughly wet with the spray. The spray must be put on with enough pressure to force the material through the leaves to the nut clusters.

Does your lawn have white grubs just take a sharp shovel and cut around three sides of a block of turf and run shovel under the block and turn it back on the uncut side, and examine for the grubs. If six or more grubs are found in a square foot it's time to apply an insecticide.

A good insecticide is 40 per cent chlordane, plus 10 ounces of wettable powder per 1000 square feet and sprinkle the lawn afterward to wash the material down into the soil.

Farmers who plan to apply for a refund of the Federal gasoline tax should keep a good set of records to be able to prove their eligibility for the refund. To get a refund, a farmer must file after July 30 and before October 1, a claim with the District Director of Internal Revenue covering the gasoline used during the first six months of the year. After 1966 refunds will be made for a one-year period from July 1 to June 30.

The claims must be filed on form 2340 which will be available after June 1 at the County Agent's office, the banks, post offices, and Internal Revenue offices.

## Baked Ham With Springtime Garnish

Ham is traditionally a springtime favorite. And a picture-pretty ham, beautifully glazed and garnished, is so easy to bake that even a beginner cook can do it.

Garnish your ham with colored deviled eggs set in fresh greens. Simply peel hard-cooked eggs and dip them in harmless food coloring. Then cut the eggs and prepare the deviled egg mixture as usual. Refill the colored egg whites, leaving a wide ruffle at the edge.

To complete this menu starring ham, serve buttered green beans, a fresh spring salad, piping hot rolls, a fruit sherbet and coffee. There's a type and size of ham to fit every family's need. You may buy a regular uncooked smoked ham, a ready-to-eat ham, or a canned ham. If your family is small, a shank or butt half of ham is a good choice.

To bake a ham: Place ham fat side up on a rack in a heavy roasting pan. Do not cover. If you have a half ham, place cut side down on rack. Bake in a slow oven, 325°F., for the approximate time given in the following chart:

### Chart for Baking and Reheating Hams (325°F. oven)

To Bake Uncooked Smoked Ham	Approximate Total Time
Whole Ham, 10 to 12 pounds	3 1/2 to 4 hours
Whole Ham, 14 to 16 pounds	4 to 4 1/2 hours
Half Ham, 6 to 8 pounds	3 to 3 1/2 hours
To Heat Ready-To-Eat Ham	
Whole Ham, 12 to 14 pounds	3 to 3 1/2 hours
Half Ham, 6 to 7 pounds	2 to 2 1/2 hours

One-half hour before total time is up, remove rind and score fat lightly. To make glaze, heat together 1 cup brown sugar and 1/2 cup corn syrup. Spoon 1/2 of the glaze over the ham and return to oven. Add remaining portions of the glaze at 10-minute intervals.



## State Capitol News

August—Supreme Court Justice Will Wilson grabbed the political spotlight with the announcement that he was resigning on June 1.

He will devote his full time to an aggressive campaign for the office of Attorney General.

Said Wilson: "Texas' greatest need today is vigorous enforcement of Texas laws. I believe I can serve Texas best in filling that need."

Wilson, who gained fame as Dallas' racket-busting district attorney, has served six years on the Supreme Court. He was elected in 1960 by a heavy majority, and is one of the youngest men ever to serve on the high bench.

It was felt by most seasonable observers that Wilson would have been re-elected without opposition had he desired to continue as a member of the State's highest tribunal.

Wilson served as Assistant Attorney General of Texas under Gerald Mann and Grover Sellers in 1941-42.

IKER'S VISIT—Pres. Dwight D. Eisenhower's visit to his native state, planned long ago, by chance came three days after the Democratic State Convention. There, Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson was endorsed as favorite son candidate for President.

Thus, Texas has two native sons in the race for Chief Executive of the United States.

Gov. Allan Shivers, who has said he will support the presidential nominee whom he considers best for the nation, regardless of party, didn't attend the Dallas convention at which Johnson was the main figure.

As Texas Chief Executive he did, however, welcome President Eisenhower at Waco, where Ike received a honorary degree from Baylor University.

Eisenhower leaders, including National Committeeman Jack Porter, and other Texas Republican notables, conferred with the President briefly in Waco. Also present was Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby, late of the President's cabinet and now co-chairman of the national Citizens for Eisenhower organization. Governor Shivers did not take part in the conference.

JOHNSON'S GOALS—Senator Johnson gained his personal goals at the Democratic convention. But his control of the convention was shaky all the way through.

Near the end, his personal requests were turned down. His reported choice for Democratic National Committeewoman, Mrs. Lloyd M. Bentsen Jr. of McAllen, was side tracked for Mrs. R. D. Randolph of Houston. She replaces Mrs. Hilda Weinert of Seguin. Also replaced was National Committeeman Ben Ramsey. Elected in his stead was Byron Skilton of Temple.

A new state executive committee is not to be named until the usual time—the September convention. Meanwhile, the May convention is not adjourned—merely recessed. This is interpreted as a "foot in the door" to keep watch over the present committee during the summer.

Defeated conservatives say that Shivers conservatives and Johnson conservatives soon will be back in the same camp. They think it can happen in time to shift party control again in the September convention.

Campaign platforms of legislative candidates show that many think existing tax sources are paying as much as they can. Many suggest that new revenue sources should be found to equalize the load. Few are very specific.

A concrete suggestion came last week from a University of Texas economics professor writing for "Commet," the Bureau of Public Affairs monthly. A "business activities" tax was proposed by Carey C. Thompson.

Such a tax, said Thompson, would be based on value added to a product by manufacture and hence would hit "only newly-created wealth hitherto untaxed."

Michigan, he said, collects about \$30 million a year by this means.

Alternate proposals, such as income or sales taxes, widely used in other states, have always met strong opposition in Texas.

"RIGHT-TO-WORK" LAW HIT—Labor leaders are elated, state officials grim over the crippling of Texas' "right-to-work" law.

U. S. Supreme Court last week ruled such state laws cannot apply in the railroad industry. They are superseded by the National Railway Labor Act, which authorizes closed shop contracts.

Said Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepherd: "It means 'railroad workers must join unions or go hungry. A man who is refused the right to work unless he supports certain organizations cannot exercise any of the other rights guaranteed by the constitution.'"

Jerry Holleman, executive secretary of Texas AFL, called the decision "a great step forward. Texas Federation believes Congress should extend this same protection to the rest of the workers in the country."

OLD DEBTS COLLECTED—A state auditor's survey of the General Land Office resulted in payment of some long overdue debts to the school land fund.

State Auditor C. H. Cavness released a report covering the three-year period just prior to Bascom Giles' resignation. It had turned up 24 mineral leases on which annual rental payments were in arrears. These were called to the attention of Land Office personnel, and collections of \$9,373, plus interest, were made.

Cavness noted that J. Earl Ruder, appointed to succeed Giles as land commissioner, has sought to improve lease handling insofar as funds permit.

## SCS District News

Root plowing and seeding of blue panic grass is progressing at a rapid rate. Cooperators of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District are trying for the first time a method of seeding blue panic and other grasses and at the same time root plow for the control of mesquite and other brush.

Ranchers in South Texas are reaping great benefit from this practice. In both increased grazing and added water intake of the soil. Good stands of grass have been obtained and grazing has been increased greatly. When a good cover is obtained, the water intake of the soil during heavy rains is increased. This added water into the soil acts as a reserve moisture during drier times. Blue panic grass, being a deep rooted grass, can tap these reserves during the dry periods and not suffer from lack of moisture that exists in the short rooted grasses.

C. Q. (Bunk) Davis has done

some seeding following chiseling and has blue panic up from the recent rains. Bunk used a planter that he recently purchased and seeds on each side of the chisel furrow. The furrow acts as a moisture trap and gives the young seedling extra moisture to start it out and hasten its growth.

Scott Langford of Blanket chiseled and seeded blue panic with a cyclone seeder and has a spotted stand of the grass.

Oliver Steels has seeded 125 acres in rows to be kept in a semi-state of cultivation. He also has a partial stand established.

One advantage of seeding blue panic is its germination period and rapid growth when moisture is available.

Ranchers in South Texas who lease vast acres are finding it pays to root plow and seed these leased ranges. On native brushland only two and one-half pounds of beef per acre was produced. On ranges that were root plowed and seeded 180 pounds of beef per acre was produced. There is little doubt left in the minds of these ranchers in the Frio SCD that root plowing and seeding will pay large dividends.

### Weather Control By Cloud Seeking

This is the season of the triple-threat of crops—hail, lightning and tornadoes—in Texas.

Can their potential dangers be minimized? A number of weather control studies are being made to find out.

All three of these natural disasters cause tremendous damage in Texas each year. Hail is a deadly destroyer of crops and can churn the year's work and income of a thousand farm families into mush in a half-hour. Lightning is particularly dangerous in starting forest fires in the wooded sections of East Texas.

Back in 1946, when cloud seeking became prominent in the news a young General Electric scientist, Vincent Schaefer, became interested in the possibility of suppressing hail and lightning by this method.

Lightning and hail occur in the same general type of storm which may grow into a tornado. These storms come from the immense blue-black thunderclouds that tower far above the freezing line into the atmosphere for as much as nine miles or even more.

When water-vapor condenses into a cloud, it gives back to the atmosphere the heat-energy that turned it into vapor in the first place. Such energy is enormous. Even any small thunderstorm represents the energy of several atomic bombs. This energy is discharged in lightning, or in rain.

If such a cloud "cannot rain", but builds up in bellowing anguish to great heights, it may result in destructive hail or lightning, tornadoes—or all three.

Experiments have shown that cloud seeking includes rain or snow more quickly than under normal conditions. Thus seeking may cut down cloud growth, and the menace of the bellowing clouds.

This and other possibilities, are being studied by the U. S. Committee on Weather Control. We are still a long way from "ready-made weather," but the reduction of natural disasters may not be too far in the future.

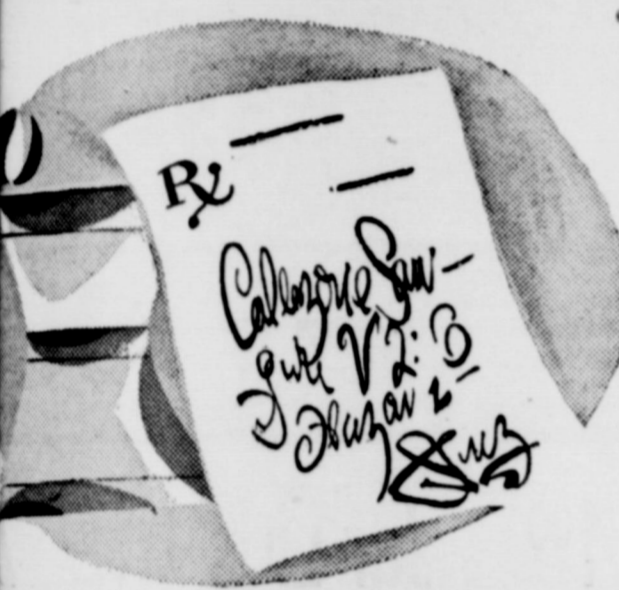

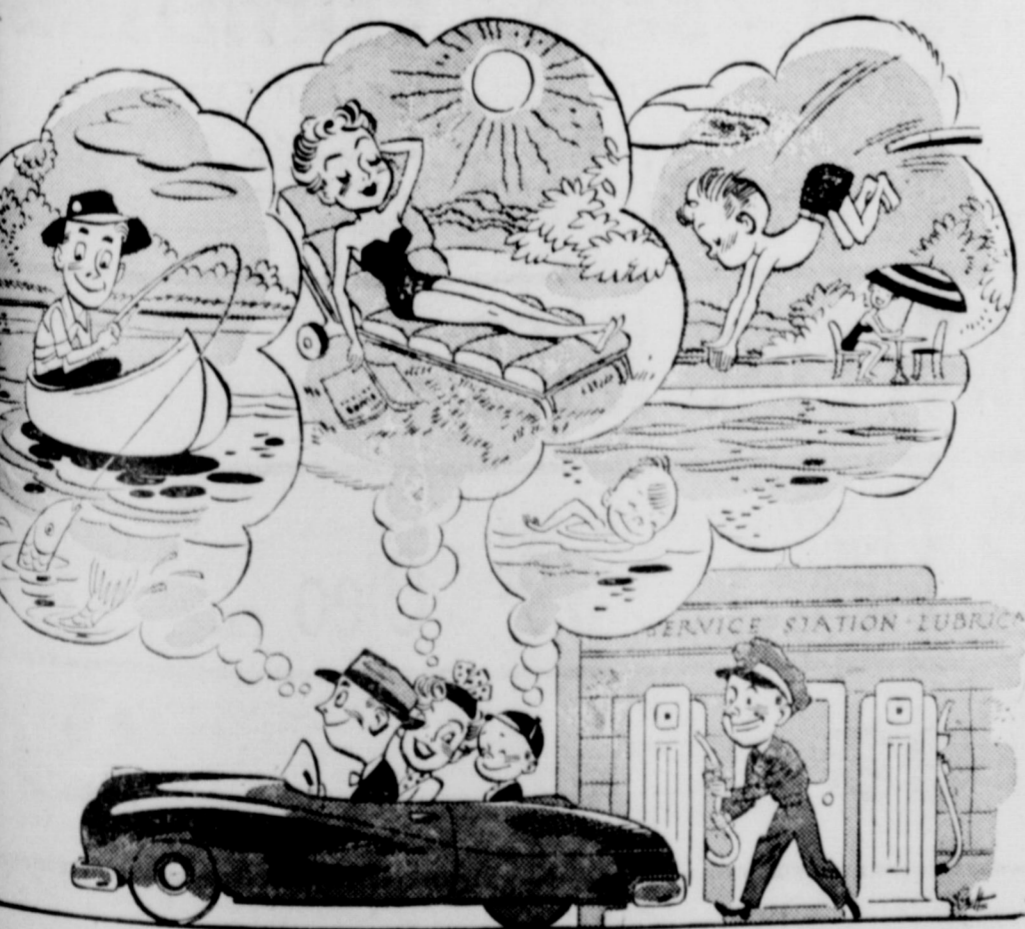

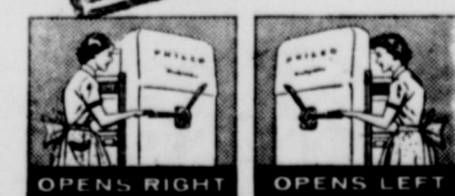

### Full Retirement Not Necessary For SS Checks At Age 65

Workers or self employed persons now 65 or over who are considering either partial or complete retirement should get in touch with the social security office for information which may be helpful in planning for the years ahead, R. R. Tulley, Manager of the Abilene social security office, said yesterday.

"Even though a worker may be eligible for benefits, they are not payable under certain earnings conditions," he explained. "Workers under age 72 who earn less than \$2080 in a year can be paid one or more benefit checks, depending on the total amount earned and how much work is done. All checks for a year are due if earnings do not go over \$1200. After age of 72 benefits are payable to insured workers regardless of the amount earned."

No benefits can be paid until an application is filed, Tulley added as a reminder.

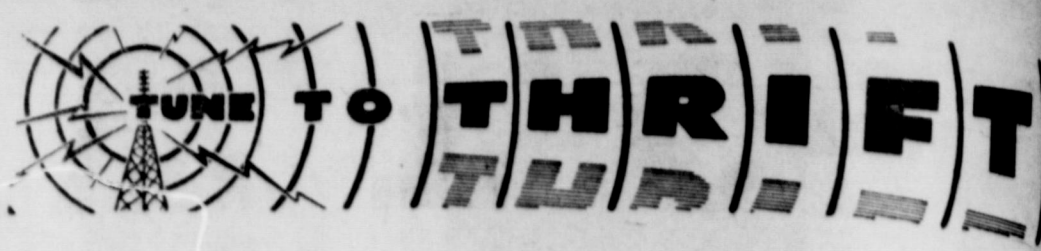
