Legislative Post, A Year-Round Position, Omar Burkett Says

The Review has been authorized to announce the candidacy of Omar Burkett for the office of Representative, 76th District. His announcement follows:

In announcing my candidacy for State Representative, I desire to express my gratitude for your making it possible for me to have served you before. I regard the office of State Representative as a year-round job, something to do every day for all the people.

PHILOSOPHER, AS EXPECTED, IS FIGURING ANGLES ON NEW SOIL BANK PROPOSITION

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou, as might be expected, is hard at work trying to figure out the angles on the soil bank, his letter this week reveals.

Dear editor: Now that Congress has passed and the President has signed the Soil Bank bill, I have been giving considerable thought to how I can put it into effect this year. After all, if Congress is going to the trouble of offering me help, the least I can do is figure out a way to accept it without stalling around.

As I understand it, the Soil Bank is now in effect, for this year, if I can meet the requirements, and I aim to try, because, since it'll be in effect not only next year but several years to come, anybody who misses out on this year has just missed that portion forever, and it's not Congress' intention, or mine either, to miss out on anything as pleasant as getting paid for staying off my cultivator.

But what I decide not to plant this year is a problem. However, I've been thinking in view of the fact, it would suit Washington mighty well to get rid of some of that money this year, and since all you have to do to qualify is to decline to plant a given number of acres this year, I have decided not to plant any fall peanuts this year. Peanut Growers Invited to Herbicide Demonstration

Peanut growers of this area are invited to attend one or all three demonstrations where the new peanut herbicide will be used next Monday, June 11, according to a bulletin received here from the office of Eastland County Agent J. M. Cooper.

The first demonstration will be at the J. B. Caudle farm about 6 miles east of Rising Star and will start at 9:30 o'clock that morning. The afternoon demonstrations will be held on the T. J. Wellborn and the Hulon Erwin farms, northwest of Rising Star.

The demonstrations will consist of planting peanuts, rolling the beds behind to flatten the clods and spraying a 12 inch band of the new peanut herbicide down the drill where the nuts have been planted to kill weed and grass seed as they germinate. All of this is to be done in one operation.

This is the method they have used in some of the other southern states, particularly in Alabama and Georgia. It is said to be effective in those areas to the extent that it saves hoeing and one or two cultivations.

Burleson Asks Voters For Another Term As Congressman



The Review has been authorized to announce the candidacy of Omer Burleson for re-election as Representative, 17th Congressional District. His statement to the voters follows:

It is customary for a candidate for public office to make a formal statement of his intentions. I have filed my application for a place on the July 28th Primary Ballot with each County Democratic Chairman for reelection to Congress. Due to pressing business of the Congress, this is about the first opportunity I have had to issue a newspaper statement.

In a previous campaign announcement I quoted Champ Clark, one of America's great statesmen and a former Speaker of the House of Representatives of the United States. He made the following statement, not in a political campaign, but as political doctrine: "The truth is being more and more realized that, other things being equal or anywhere nearly equal, the value of the Representative (in Congress) increases in proportion to his length of service. The best plan for a constituency to pursue is to select a man of good sense, good habits, and personal integrity, young enough to learn, and reelect him so long as he retains his faculties and is faithful to his trust."

It is my hope that I thusly qualify, and on this principle I base my candidacy for reelection to Congress.

My record should be known to all who have given attention to it. During my service in the Congress, a constant effort has been made to do two things particularly: (1) to know the views and feelings of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest possible degree in the Congress; and (2) to inform and advise, as clearly as I can, on those issues which affect my constituency and our Nation.

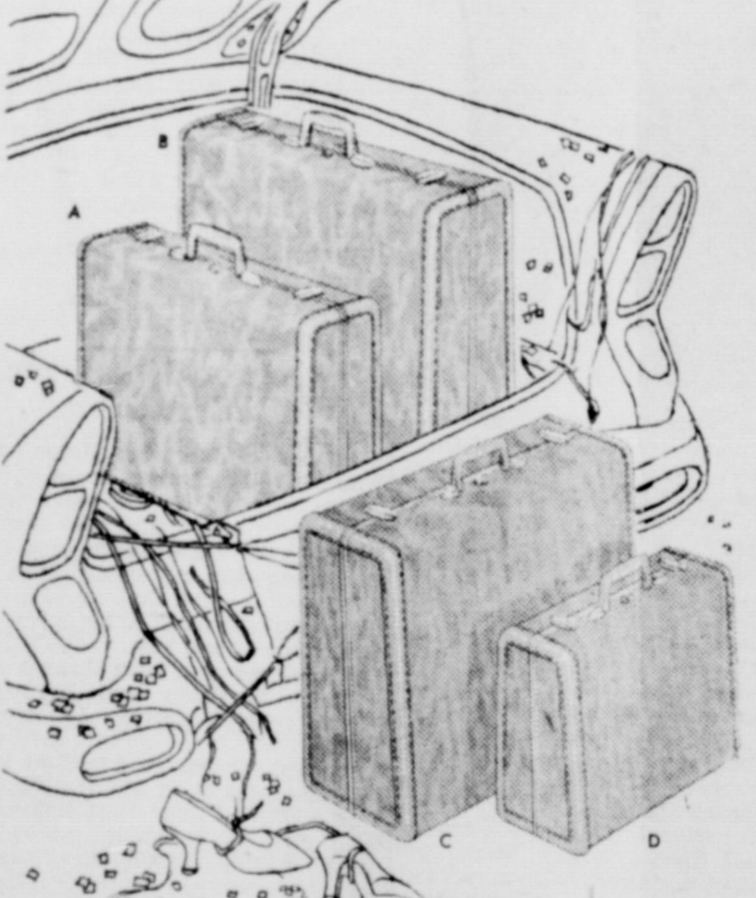

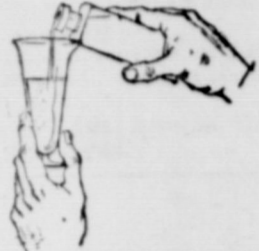

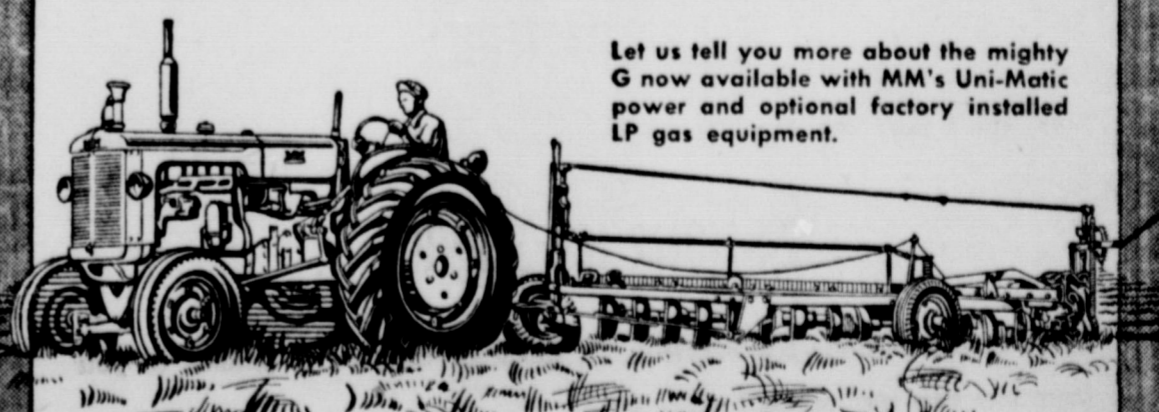

Austin—Nearly 100,000 young Tex-
 ans take off their mortar boards
 and roll up their sleeves this week.

Analysis that figures, when com-
 plete, will show a record number of
 diplomas and degrees awarded this
 year.

Texas Education Agency pegs
 public high school graduates at be-
 tween 64,000 and 65,000. Degrees be-
 ing conferred by state-supported
 colleges and universities are esti-
 mated by the Texas Legislative
 Council at 20,000. Private and
 church-supported schools swell the
 graduate rolls several thousand
 more.

Awaiting these young people, said
 commencement speakers, is unpre-
 cedented opportunity. Examples of
 the '56 high school graduate's fu-
 ture, as outlined by an Austin
 speaker: (1) a longer life span—44
 years ahead for boys, 49 for girls;
 (2) higher earnings averaging a
 quarter million dollars apiece; (3)
 less work, dwindling to a 30-hour
 week and (4) ever-increasing ease
 and leisure as technology advances.

Concrete evidence of the speakers'
 promises is the job placement story.
 University of Texas Student Em-
 ployment Bureau reports five to
 ten job offers per graduate at bet-
 ter than ever salaries. Personnel in
 some deans' offices speak wearily
 of the impossibility of coping with the
 year-end flood of would-be employ-
 ers.

High school officials say many
 graduates began work between
 their last exam and commencement
 night.

Mixed Reaction To Highway Bill
 A bonanza or a blunder—Texans
 are in disagreement as to which
 term applies to the new federal
 highway bill.

Senate passage of the bill left only
 a few details to be ironed out in
 House-Senate conference before
 sending the measure to the Presi-
 dent. Final enactment will set into
 motion a 13-year, \$51,000,000,000 in-
 terstate highway construction pro-
 gram.

Texas Highway Department officials
 are frankly jubilant. They are
 poised to begin letting contracts
 August 1, using the new supply of
 federal funds. "We'll be scraping
 the bottom of the barrel in the July
 letting," said State Highway Engi-
 neer DeWitt C. Greer.

Greer said the new law would
 mean a minimum increase of \$57,-
 000,000 a year in federal road build-
 ing aid to Texas—or double the
 present amount.

He called it "the most far-reach-
 ing legislation yet enacted." He
 predicted an era of unparalleled
 development.

Gov. Allan Shivers was less en-
 thusiastic. He charged turning a
 state function over to "bungling bu-
 reaucracy" made it unduly costly.

His objection was to the provision
 giving the Secretary of Labor, rather
 than the states, power to set
 wages on all contracts. "This means
 a third less highway mileage than
 the people would otherwise get,"
 said Shivers.

"Tax money always dwindle in
 value," said the governor, "when it
 is sent to Washington for processing
 and returned to the states."

Liquor Revenue Reported
 Liquor, legal and illegal, brought
 the state \$2,401,414 in revenue dur-
 ing April. Largest part—\$1,513,932—
 came from the beer excise tax.

A total of 505 criminal complaints
 resulted in 308 convictions, 50 jail
 sentences and \$45,929 in fines.

Beneficiaries were the available
 school fund, old age assistance fund,
 clearance fund and others which
 received \$2,203,518.

Hope Held For Labor Law
 Champions of Texas "right-to-
 work" law haven't given up the
 fight.

Railroad attorneys and Atty. Gen.
 John Ben Shepperd contend that
 the U. S. Supreme Court decision
 on a Nebraska law did not touch
 the constitutional issues involv-
 ed in Texas. This pointed out in a
 supplemental brief filed last week
 with the Texas Supreme Court.

A ruling is expected soon from
 the state's high court on the hard-
 fought "Amarillo case" involving
 railroad unions' right to demand
 closed shop contracts.

Union leaders interpret the U. S.
 Court ruling as knocking out state
 anti-closed shop laws in the rail-
 road industry. Shepperd and rail-
 road lawyers say the decision, if
 anything, strengthens the case for
 the Texas law.

Higher and Higher Learning
 A rising skyline has been proposed
 to meet the University of Texas'
 critical classroom needs.

Pres. Logan Wilson suggests that
 the only two remaining sites on the
 original 40-acre campus be used
 present buildings have four floors.
 For development five to ten years
 hence, Dr. Wilson recommends ex-
 panding to the east of the present
 campus in the area adjacent to
 Memorial Stadium.

"TV Trial" Appealed
 Fairness of the first televised
 murder trial in Texas history is be-
 ing challenged in the Court of Crimi-
 nal Appeals.

Defense attorneys charge that
 Dist. Atty. Tom Moore of Waco was
 more interested in "putting on a
 show" in the Waco trial of Harry L.
 Washburn, than giving the man a
 fair trial.

Law Violation Admitted
 Violation of Texas Election law
 was admitted by C. T. Johnson in
 a deposition just taken in Austin.
 Johnson admitted spending \$1,200
 in travel expenses during his 1954

campaign for Lt. Governor, but re-
 ported only \$125 to the Secretary of
 State. Previously he had testified
 under oath that he had spent "no
 more and no less" than \$125.

Trust Creditors Face Tangle
 US Trust and Guaranty Co. de-
 positors still may have a long, weary
 wait for their money.

At one time State Liquidator J.
 D. Wheeler said he hoped to be
 able to start making partial pay-
 ments after July 1. With that in
 mind a Fort Worth woman now
 seeks court action to designate her
 a preferred creditor because she
 is a depositor.

Dist.—Judge Charles O. Betts
 pointed out proper procedure is first
 to seek priority with the receiver.
 If he refuses, creditors may appeal
 through the courts. This takes
 months, sometimes years.

SHORT SNORTS—Walter L. Bell
 has resigned as director of the State
 Board of Control effective Oct. 15.
 He has held the job since 1953. He
 has no immediate plans except to
 return to his Ft. Worth home and
 rest. The Rev. James Hamilton
 Clark, chaplain of the Texas House
 of Representatives for the past 10
 years, has passed away. He had been
 a Methodist minister in various
 South and Central Texas towns and
 served seven terms as county judge
 in Johnson City before becoming
 House chaplain. Texas Health
 Commissioner Henry Holle reported
 that "practically all" nursing and
 custodial care homes in Texas have
 been licensed and are meeting re-
 quirements of the licensing law
 which became effective June 1, 1953.
 Texas has 466 homes under state
 license.

things applicable to our national defense and those things which I believed to be beneficial to the people as a whole. As the record will show, on many occasions I have found myself in the minority but have never failed to exercise the right to vote and to do as I thought best, regardless of any other consideration. In this session of the Congress alone, I have voted to reduce spending by more than 6 billion dollars, which I did not believe was necessary, although some of it may have been desirable. It is a simple fact that the only way our taxes can ever be reduced is cutting expenditures.

At all times, I have tried to represent the very best interest of every segment of the economy in our 17th Congressional District. All matters affecting the farmer, the oil business, the business and professional man have received my unstinted attention. Many times we do not accomplish all we think should be accomplished in these things, but I know in my heart, and believe those who have had occasion to learn firsthand know, that I have done the best possible under all the circumstances which must be met.

Farmers know of my work in their behalf. The independent oil operator is generally aware of my activities in behalf of the industry. Both my wife and I have tried at all times to do those things to bring the greatest possible credit to our area, and shall continue to do so.

As Chairman of the Committee on House Administration, and because of other important Committee assignments, it is necessary that I be in Washington at the time when the Congress has about completed three-fourths of its session.

Just as soon as possible, without neglecting highly important business, I expect to return home to campaign. In the meantime, I hope you, my friends, will believe in me and trust me with your affairs in the United States Capitol. I shall continue to be devoted and faithful to every responsibility.
