Well Flows From Caddo

A flowing Caddo lime well was brought in on the E. P. Kilgore tract in the Cross Cut-Blake area Thursday of last week, by Troy Mills, Alvin Hill, Dewey Austin and Ollie Ratliff of Burk-

The well is located on a 120acre lease out of the Kilgore ranch and was drilled by rotary to a depth of 2,058 feet. It flowed naturally while a service rig was engaged in cleaning it preparatory to acidizing it with 500 gallons of acid. Flowing by neads, it shot high gravity oil over the derrick before being turned into the tank battery.

Operators have spotted the No. 2 Kilgore as an offset to the northwest of the discovery well. The Kilgore tract is located some five miles east of Cross Cut community center.

C. M. Vaden, Field Representative, will be at the City Hall in Cross Plains on Friday, October 19, November 16, and December 21, at 10:00 a.m.

Persons wishing to file claims, secure account number cards, check their social security accounts, or just get general or special information about some phase of the old-age, survivors, and disability insurance provisions of the law are asked to keep the above dates and times in mind, and get their answers from official sources rather depending on second-hand, unofficial guesses about what's in the social security



Proper Fall Care Means More Beautiful Lawns

The appearance a lawn has next spring may well depend upon the care given it during the fall season. E. M. Trew, extension argonomist, says beautiful lawns just don't happen, they require careful and considerate management.

Soon they should be fertilized. Do this job, says Trew, about 30 days before the first expected frost. By making application early, the grass will have an opportunity to use most of the plant food before going dormant. Too, the fertilizer will allow lawn grasses to go into the winter season in a vigorous condition and they will remain green longer in the fall and grow off earlier next spring. Weeds, during the winter and spring, will also cause less trouble.

Trew suggests using a complete fertilizer with a 2-1-1 or a 1-1-1 ratio applied at a rate to give two pounds of actual nitrogen for each 1,000 square feet of lawn. This amount of nitrogen can be supplied by using 20 pounds of 10-5-5 or 10-10-10 or 25 pounds of 8-8-8. Some soils do not need potash for crop production but since the cost is small, Trew believes the results may be very good.

He advises halving the fertilizer Apply one-half and then distribute the other half at right angles to the first application. This will insure even distribution. The lawn should be watered after the application Soak the soil to a depth of at least six inches. If the soil is wet when fertilizer is applied, wash it off the grass onto the soil. Moisture is necessary for plants cannot use the food until it is dissolved.

In some sections of the state Trew says that Bermuda lawns are sometimes overseeded with Italian or annual ryegrass to give green color during the winter. But, he warns, unless the rye grass is closely clipped during the spring, it may prove harmful to the Bermuda. It competes with the Bermuda for light, moisture and plant food. He says to use the Italian or annual ryegrass because it dies in the spring.




