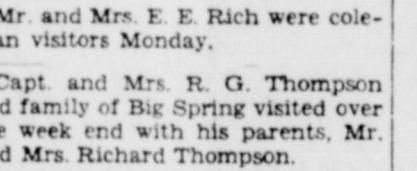

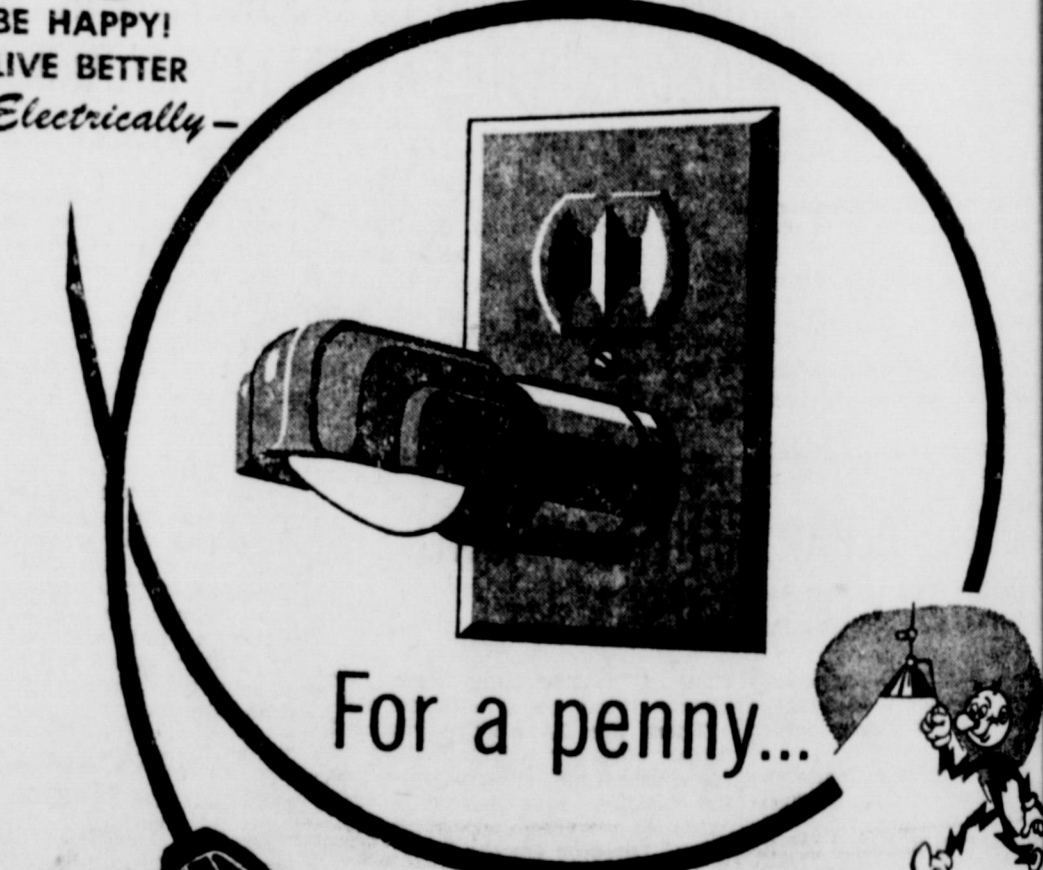

Austin—Campaigning in Texas is in high gear.

First to open statewide campaign headquarters were the Texas Democrats for Eisenhower. In charge is Weldon Hart, longtime aide to Gov. Allan Shivers.

A few days later Warren Woodard, Houston attorney, moved to the capital city to set up the Stevenson-Kefauver camp.

Says Hart, "Our campaign is backed by Texas Democrats who supported Eisenhower in 1952 and who can see no reason to change."

First of a series of ads in behalf of Ike appear in all Texas newspapers this week. Stevenson ads will follow as Woodward's program begins to unfold.

Meanwhile candidates for the vacated Senatorial post of Price Daniel are jockeying for position. But none has made what could be a state wide plea for support.

Daniel is finally "in" as the Democratic nominee for governor. But procedure for naming a new U. S. Senator still is as muddled as ever. He resigned his senate seat effective Jan. 15, "or sooner if a successor is elected."

When this can be done, and how, hinges on (1) when the governor calls a special election; and (2) whether the State Democratic Committee decides to try to hold party primaries before the special election. Meanwhile Governor Shivers is on a bear hunt in Kodiak, Alaska, with two of his sons.

Segregation Laws Proposed
Legislation designed to circumvent the school integration ruling has been proposed by the governor's advisory committee.

Bases of the plan: (1) local boards could not segregate schools unless so directed by a vote in the district, (2) liberal consideration would be given requests of parents wishing to avoid sending a child to an integrated school and (3) persons trying to force integration would be liable to prosecution.

Governor Shivers said he would use the report in making recommendations to the next Legislature.

Roughage Program Suspended
It took drought-hurt Texas farmers only about two weeks to swamp the million dollar federal aid program for roughage.

U. S. Department of Agriculture has ordered that no more applications be approved while it makes a "careful reappraisal" of demands. Under the program, originally designed to run to Jan. 1, farmers in drought disaster areas were to receive certificates good for \$7.50 per ton for purchase of roughage for cattle.

State Building Hits New High
An estimated all-time high of \$27,600,000 will be spent on new state buildings in the fiscal year just begun.

More than half of this, or \$14,000,000 will be used in Austin. A whopping \$6,000,000 will be poured into the new state office and courts buildings for which sites now are being cleared. Another million will be used to repair and air condition the Capitol building; \$5,000,000 for state schools; and \$2,000,000 for state hospitals.

Of the remaining \$13,400,000 to be spent over the state, \$10,000,000 will go for armories and \$3,400,000 for state hospitals at Abilene, San Antonio, Wichita Falls, Gainesville and Waco.

School Experiments Studied
Ways to get "more for the money" out of Texas' school system are being sought.

A statewide advisory committee of educators and lay citizens has just launched a six-month study of ways to make most effective use of school properties and personnel.

Ideas being considered: (1) a 10-month year, (2) a longer school day with staggered schedules, (3) more use of college students to assist teachers and (4) more multi-purpose rooms in schools.

College Enrollments Soar
Texas college campuses are overflowing again, even more than in post-war days.

Many schools report record enrollments. Some expected totals, after latecomers straggle in: University of Texas 18,000; University of Houston 13,500; Texas Tech 8,000; Texas A&M 7,400; Texas Christian University, Southern Methodist University, and Baylor, about 5,400 each.

At least one school, Texas Western at El Paso, was having to curtail its curriculum because of teacher shortage.

Securities Panel Named
Eight men have been named to take another look at that perennial hot potato—securities regulation.

They will study the effectiveness of two laws passed by the Legislature. One revised the state securities act which is administered by the Secretary of State. Another created the Insurance Securities Division handled by the Insurance Commission. Likely they also will discuss the long-debated issue of whether the two securities regulating divisions should be combined.

Named to the Committee by Gov. Shivers are Secy. of State Tom Reavley; former Secy. of State Everett Fulgham of Lubbock; Ins. Commissioner J. Byron Saunders, Hal Dewar of San Antonio; Charlie Pierce of Dallas; Dr. J. C. Dolley of Austin; Gus Wortham and Wilbur Hess of Houston.

Safety Expert Discusses Child Pedestrian Safety

I'd like to give every parent and every automobile driver a chance to sit behind the steering wheel of a school bus for just one day. Believe me, they'd learn plenty about child pedestrian safety.

That observation was made today by E. C. McFadden of Dallas, President of the Texas Safety Association. He was discussing the child safety program which is being conducted in Texas this month by the Texas Safety Association, the Department of Public Safety in cooperation with the National Safety Council.

McFadden is pretty sure that driving a school bus would convince the adults of one thing—that the responsibility for the safety of children in traffic rests largely on the shoulders of grown ups.

"Sure, we have problem kids on the bus," he said. "But it's my opinion that the problem of most problem children is their parents."

He believes that the youngsters who get out of control on the school bus, or who disregard safety rules when getting on or off the bus, haven't been taught at home to respect others or to respect law and order.

So much for the adults who are an indirect cause of many child pedestrian accidents. He also had plenty to say about the adults who are a direct factor—the automobile drivers.

"Some of them are in such a hurry to get where they are going that they can't spare the time to stop while the school bus is loading or unloading," he said. "There are others who stop, but don't make sure that all the children are safely across the street before they start up again. Drivers like these risk the lives of children just to save a few seconds time."

For these drivers and for those who don't slow down near schools and playgrounds or who don't keep a constant eye out for children in traffic, McFadden had this reminder:

"It's one of the responsibilities of an automobile driver to look out for kids in traffic. If you're not ready to accept this responsibility, you're not ready to drive a car."

Proper Fall Care Means More Beautiful Lawns

The appearance a lawn has next spring may well depend upon the care given it during the fall season. E. M. Trew, extension argonomist, says beautiful lawns just don't happen, they require careful and considerate management.

Soon they should be fertilized. Do this job says Trew, about 30 days before the first expected frost. By making application early, the grass will have an opportunity to use most of the plant food before going dormant. Too, the fertilizer will allow lawn grasses to go into the winter season in a vigorous condition and they will remain green longer in the fall and grow off earlier next spring. Weeds, during the winter and spring, will also cause less trouble.

Trew suggests using a complete fertilizer with a 2-1-1 or a 1-1-1 ratio applied at a rate to give two pounds of actual nitrogen for each 1,000 square feet of lawn. This amount of nitrogen can be supplied by using 20 pounds of 10-5-5 or 10-10-10 or 25 pounds of 8-8-8. Some soils do not need potash for crop production but since the cost is small, Trew believes the results may be very good.

He advises halving the fertilizer. Apply one-half and then distribute the other half at right angles to the first application. This will insure even distribution. The lawn should be watered after the application. Soak the soil to a depth of at least six inches. If the soil is wet when fertilizer is applied, wash it off the grass onto the soil. Moisture is necessary for plants cannot use the food until it is dissolved.

In some sections of the state, Trew says that Bermuda lawns are sometimes overseeded with Italian or annual ryegrass to give green color during the winter. But, he warns, unless the ryegrass is closely clipped during the spring, it may prove harmful to the Bermuda. It competes with the Bermuda for light, moisture and plant food. He says to use the Italian or annual ryegrass because it dies in the spring.

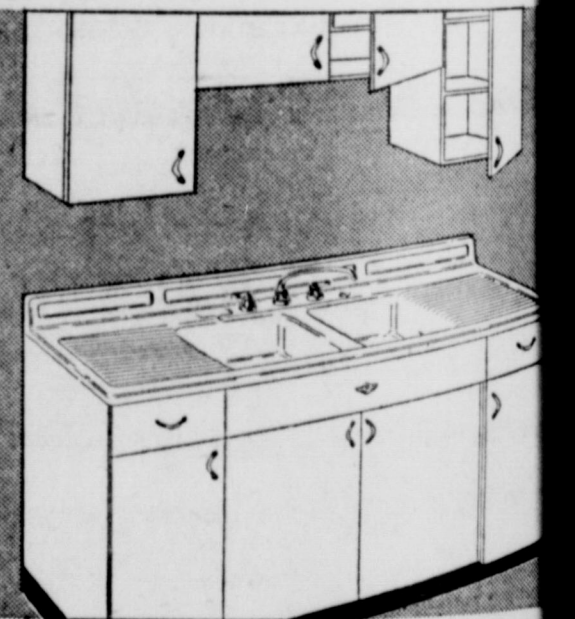

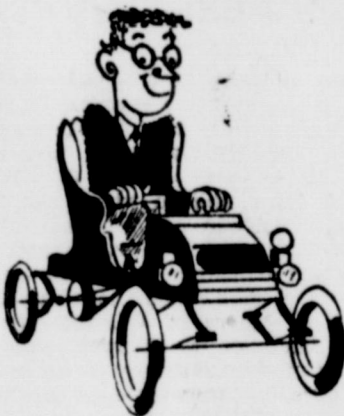

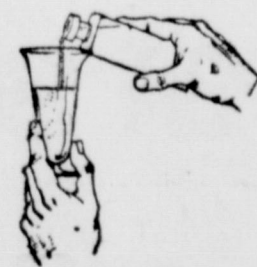

1956 Amendments To The Social Security Laws

The 1956 Amendments to the Social Security law also made some changes that affect the coverage of farm employees, beginning with the calendar year of 1957.

For the years 1955 and 1956, ranch and farm employees got social security credit if the farm or ranch operator paid them \$100 or more in cash wages during one of those years.

Under the new law, beginning with January 1, 1957, earnings for work done on a farm or ranch will count for social security coverage under either of these two conditions:

(a) If the farm employer pays you \$150 or more in cash during the year your cash pay from that employer is covered by the law.

(b) If you farm or ranch work for an employer on 20 or more days during a year for cash pay figured on a time basis (rather than a piece-rate or per-acre basis), your cash for such employer is covered by the law, regardless of the amount.

For the \$150-a-year test, both piece-rate and time-rate cash pay count. The total number of days worked does not matter so long as you are paid \$150 in cash by the employer in the year.

For the 20-day test, the total amount of your cash pay does not matter so long as you work for one employer on 20 days or more for cash pay based on some unit of time such as hour, day or a week.

Wages paid to members of a labor crew such as those used to pick cotton may be covered by the social security law, but in the past it was sometimes not easy to tell whether the employer was the farm operator or the crewleader (or labor contractor or row boss). Beginning in 1957, crew members are employees of the crew leader unless there is a written agreement between the crew leader and the farmer showing that the crew leader is an employee of the farmer. If such agreement exists, then both the crew leader and members of the crew are employees of the farmer.

A more detailed explanation of these changes in the form of a free leaflet may be obtained by writing the Social Security Administration, Abilene, Texas, and asking for the new farm booklet on changes for 1957.

fanfare, and under a cloud of criticism. Critics said it would be impractical and expensive.

"They were certainly proved wrong," Mr. Summerfield noted.

"The effect the Post Office Department's rural delivery has produced upon the American scene in 60 years can scarcely be exaggerated," he said. "It stimulated development of the parcel post, and it aided greatly in the establishment of the American system of roads and highways."

"Moreover, its effect on commerce, as a vital link between industry and the American farm family has been tremendous, and it has a great cultural and social effect on American life, providing new vistas of communication for the rural family."

"Rural delivery service is still expanding today because increasing numbers of Americans are moving out of more congested areas into suburban surroundings," Mr. Summerfield went on. "Thus, improvement of the rural delivery service also means better mail service for increasing numbers of suburban families," he said.

One of the five original "RFD" carriers, Mr. Melvin T. Strider of Charles Town, W. Va., is still living, incidentally, and a prominent citizen active in banking and business in his city, Mr. Summerfield noted.
