Gist of the amendments and NAACP. arguments pro and con:







hen 2,700,000 people who are tuberulin reactors today will have active aberculosis during their lifetime. Progress in saving lives of tuberculosis patients has been tremen-

ous. Unfortunately, progress made preventing tuberculosis disease been relatively slight. Medical and Public Health Advances

Credit for the strides made in reventing deaths from tuberculosis ould go to medical advances, improved and stepped-up case finding and other public health measures, better living and working conditions. Outstanding among the medical dvances are the availability of rugs effective in treating tubercuosis and refinements in surgery.

But before treatment can begin he disease must be diagnosed. And ealth authorities believe there are it least 150,000 people in this country uffering from tuberculosis whose disease has never been reported and who may not be under medical care. The principal drugs in use are issalicylic acid (PSA).

The drive against tuberculosis in the United States is conducted by the U.S. Public Health Service, state and local departments, and the voluntary associations affiliated with the National Tuberculosis Associa-

The NTA has constitutents in ev-

ery state and a number of large cites. The state associations have affiliated local associations which carry on tuberculosis control work within their city or country. Thus, there is a vast network of 3,000 voluntary tuberculosis associations across the country. The work of the associations falls into the broad categories of health education, case finding, rehabilitation, and medical and social research. It is supported by the annual sale of Christmas Seals. Of the money raised each year, 94 per cent remains within the state and 6 per cent is allocated to the NTA. In 1956, the tuberculosis association are carrying on the 50th Christmas Seal Sale in the United States. The first sale of Christmas Seals was conducted in December 1907 by

Miss Emily Bissell to raise funds for small tuberculosis hospital in Wilmington, Del. Since that year, the Christmas Seal Sale has spread to every state and territory of the
