Another 16.995 females held licenses indicating they were qualified to drive commercial vehicles; and only 4,423 were in possession of chauffeur's passengers for hire.

Starting at age 14 (the youngest at which a person may qualify under certain conditions for any sort of driver's license in Texas), the number of individuals holding valid licenses increases from 4.937 (the number of 14-year-olds licensed) with each age group upwards to age 29 (194,082 licensed).
