The rains flooded the business district of Rising Star for the first time in 34 years last Thursday morning when Copperas Creek, which flows through the heart of the town, failed to carry the runoff from a rain measuring 3.69 inches, which fell in a short time.

June 30 Is Important Date To Disabled

June 30, 1957 is a very important date to those who are disabled, according to C. M. Vaden Jr., Field Representative of the Abilene District Office.

Vaden explained that under the present law this date by which any disability of long duration must be established for Social Security purposes, after June 30th a disability can be established no more than a year before application is filed.

If a person is disabled and fails to establish that disability with the Social Security Administration he may forever forfeit his rights to disability payments at the age of 50, payments to his survivors or his own old age benefits.

Beginning July 1957 those who are age 50 to 65 who have established their disability with the Social Security Administration become eligible for monthly payments.

- 1. Be disabled to the extent he cannot engage in any substantial work. 2. Have been disabled for a period of at least 6 months. 3. Have worked in work covered by Social Security for 5 of the last 10 years before he was disabled and one and one half years of the 3 years before he was disabled.

BAYOU PHILOSOPHER COMES OUT WITH IDEA TO SOLVE FARM SURPLUS PROBLEM

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher, on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou, has a new idea for the farm surplus problem, but outside of saying it's new, that's about all you can say for it.

Now that the Soil Bank has gone busted, at least I read in a paper last night that Congress has decided it should close up after this year and be written off as a failure.

and now that Sec. Benson has declared that it is virtually impossible to control farm production, and now that the drought is over in many sections of the country and a bumper crop is in prospect, the problem of a farm surplus once more is coming to the front and the door is now open for new ideas on its solution.

According to Mr. Benson, a "technological explosion" has taken place on the farm, due to machinery, and the production per farm worker has doubled in the last 15 years, which makes the problem of surpluses worse than ever.

Now while it may be true production per worker has doubled in the last 15 years on the average, I'd like to point out in passing that this is now average farm out here, and if my production is any better now than it was 15 years ago, I can't tell it.

But as for the solution to the farm surplus problem, I hate to see Mr. Benson give up, and would like to offer an idea. The trouble with us farmers is, we aren't style conscious. Now for

A thunder shower early Saturday morning dumped upwards of three inches of moisture over most of this area and the rampaging flood waters pouring over the spillway of the lake at Lakewood Country Club, located on Highway 36 in the Pioneer Community, ate out a gaping hole in the spillway and seriously threatened the dam. Virtually every tank and creek in this section was brimful or overflowing Saturday afternoon. Turkey Creek spread out over the roadside park in the west edge of town and the Bayou, south of Cross Cut was a raging torrent for about 24 hours.

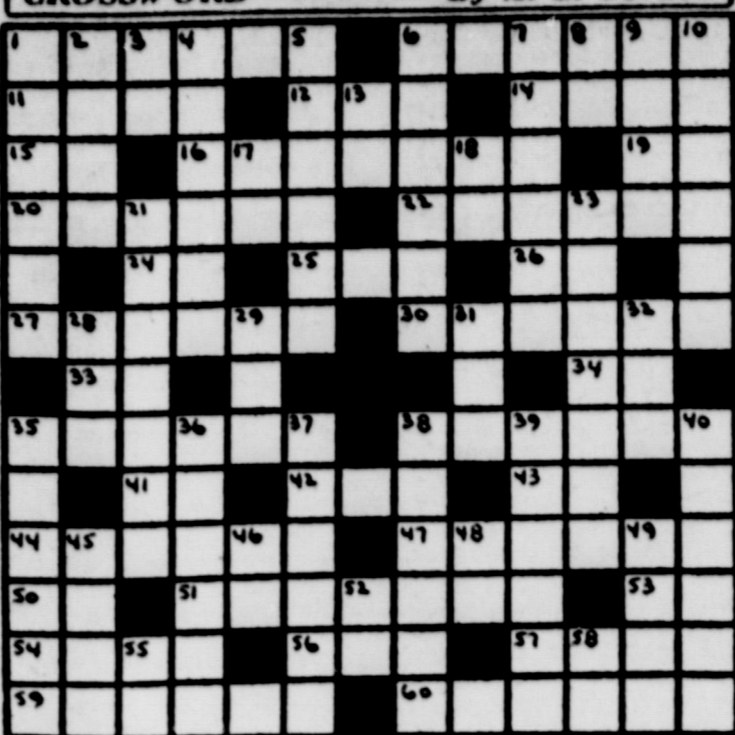

"Follow-Through For Better Pastures"
 College Station.—The lush "green gold" produced in many Texas range areas by recent rain won't hang around for admiration. Most current vegetation is weeds and annuals scheduled to die in 4 few weeks, and proper management is needed to boost the perennials not killed by drought. Deferred grazing will get them off to a fast start, says Extension Range Specialist G. O. Hoffman. Defer native grasses by using a Sudan pasture to move stock, and take advantage of early moisture for best growth response. Hoffman advises concentrating livestock on one pasture until annuals are grazed down. Be sure to move stock onto another pasture as soon as they start to graze perennials. Don't seed native grasses yet! The specialist recommends waiting until fall to determine which will reseed themselves. Most native pastures have enough good plants left to handle all reseeding problems. Many grasses, such as Texas bluegrass, are now coming up after the rains from seed which had been in the soil for years. Brush control and proper stocking are essential for maintaining good pastures. Follow any brush control measure with a deferred grazing program for rapid recovery, Hoffman advises.
