## Cross Plains Youths Injured In Accident

Two 19-year-old Cross Plains boys, Jackie Pancake and Wilburn Weiss, narrowly escaped death and serious injuries when the 1956 Chevrolet in which they were riding overturned in a ditch on U. S. Highway 279, near the Lake Brownwood bridge, Saturday night.

They were taken to the Rising Star Hospital in a Higginbotham ambulance, and have since been released. Pancake, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Pancake, and driver of the car suffered a chipped bone in his right leg and multiple abrasions to the body. Wilburn Weiss, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Weiss, of Cross Cut received lacerations to the scalp and right arm and contusions to the shoulders.

Pancake lost control of the car when one of the front tires blew out. The car overturned in the burrow ditch on the right side of the highway. Damage to the car was estimated at \$1,000 by the Highway Patrol.

## Jim Cade Wounded Slightly In Accident

Jim L. Cade, of Odessa, son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Cade of Burkett, narrowly missed serious injury Wednesday night of last week when a .22 caliber pistol he was cleaning went off and wounded him slightly. 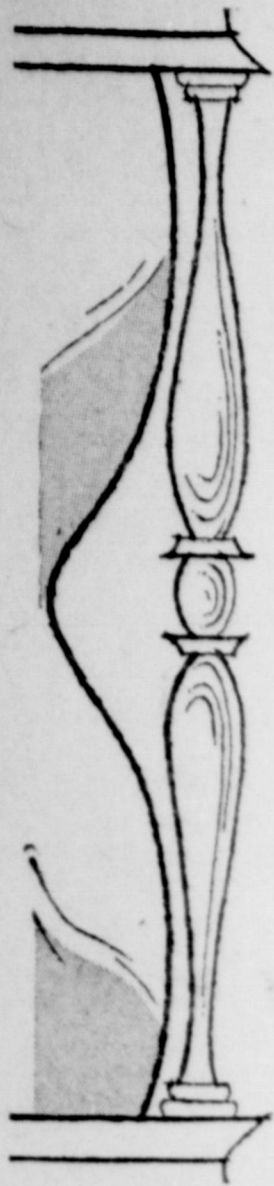

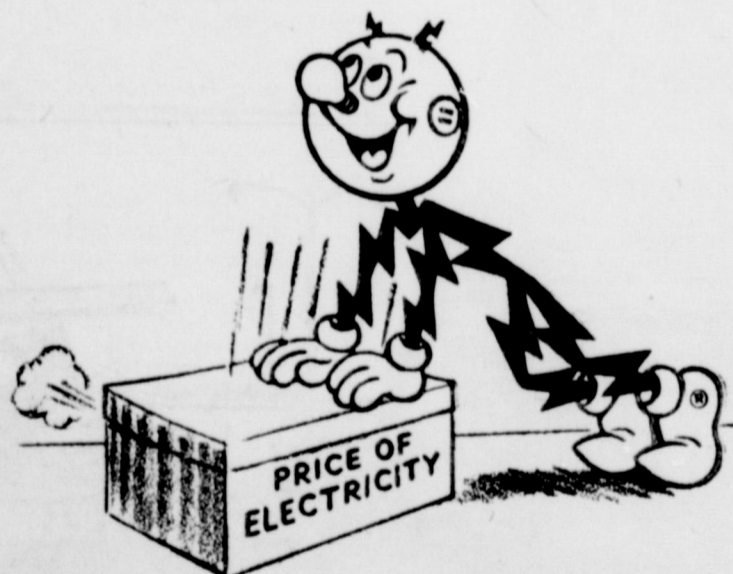

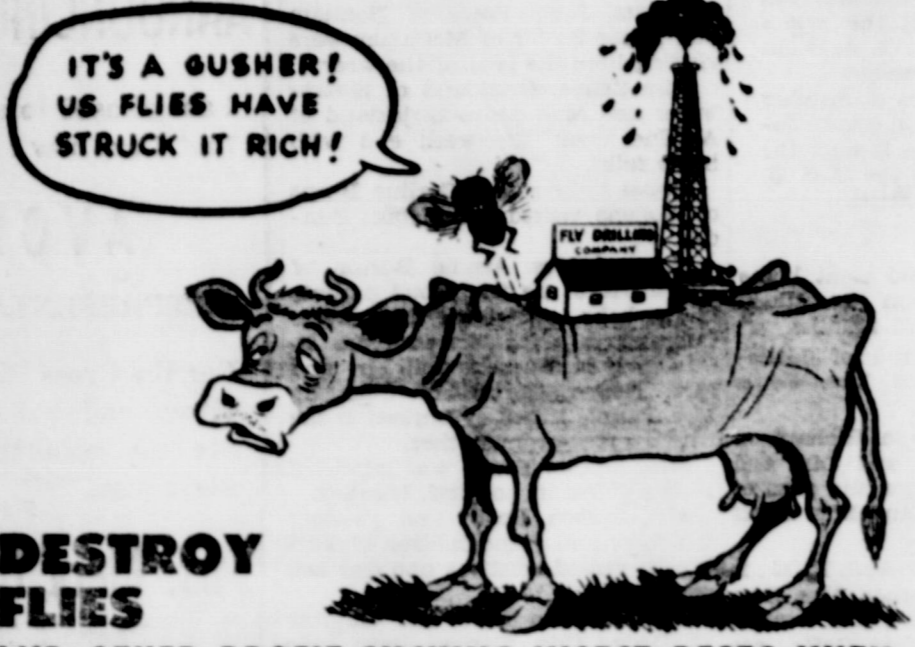
