## FIELD TOUR HELD ON GARRETT FARMS TO OBSERVE RESULTS OF GRASS SEEDING

A field tour was held Tuesday afternoon, July 2, on the Harold Garrett farm 3 1/2 miles south of Cross Plains. Purpose of the tour was to observe the results of root-plowing of Mesquite trees and grass seeding which was done on May 9 of this year. Outstanding results have been achieved as a result of the May root-plowing and grass seeding field day sponsored by the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District in cooperation with the Central Texas Machinery Company of Abilene.

Practically no grass was present before the May field day. Blue Panic is now more than knee high just 54 days after Mesquite trees were root-plowed and seeding was done. King Ranch Bluestem, Side-oats Grama, Buffalograss and a small amount of Little Bluestem were seeded along with the Blue Panic. These grasses have come up and are off to a good start. The adjoining pasture land supports only Needlegrass and annual weeds.

Moisture was found at a depth of more than 39 inches under the Blue Panic. On bare pasture land no moisture was found in a hole that was dug 18 inches deep.

Temperature tests were run Tuesday. The air temperature was 93 degrees. Bare ground at a nearby area had soil temperature of 128 degrees compared to 96 degrees under the Blue Panic. Lower soil temperatures cut down on evaporation and hold more moisture in the soil. They are also conducive to more beneficial bacterial action in the soil.

Garrett has owned this farm two years. "The pasture land on this farm had been badly overgrazed," Garrett said. "Only a small amount of Curly Mesquite and Buffalograss

were present when I bought the place," he added. These grasses were so low in vigor that even though his pasture land has been deferred for 2 years, the Buffalograss and Curly Mesquite died because of drought conditions.

After observing the results of root-plowing and grass seeding on Harold Garrett's farm, the group went to C. M. Garrett's farm. The results of seeding grasses on cropland was observed here. Blue Panic which was seeded in April of this year was up to a stand. Mr. Garrett had already plowed this grass.

The group next saw Little Bluestem, Indiangrass, Switchgrass, Weeping Lovegrass and King Ranch Bluestem which were seeded in 1950. These grasses make lush growth each year and furnish winter grazing for Mr. Garrett's cattle. "I have had no hay in 3 winters," Mr. Garrett said. "These grasses serve as hay during the winter months and I feed Cottonseed Cake for protein during that time," he added.

The final stop on the tour was at an eight acre field which had been seeded to Blue Panic during the spring of 1955. Mr. Garrett plans to harvest the seed from this Blue Panic field and another 4 acre field which was also seeded in 1955. This grass has done well and furnishes much grazing during the summer months of each year. "This gives my other grasses a chance to rest during the growing season," Mr. Garrett said. This Blue Panic is head high to a man.

Mr. Garrett, a member of the Central Colorado Conservation District Board of Supervisors, related that soil conditioning is a must before seeding grasses on cropland. He had grown vetch and rye for two to four years before making each of his grass plantings.

Flournoy is a 1957 graduate of Howard Payne College, where he played first chair trombone with the Yellowjacket Band. He is 22 years old and has served as band director of the May Tiger Band for the past two years on a part-time basis while attending college.

He attended high school in Breckenridge and was a member of the Buckaroo Band and also the high school stage band.

Flournoy is married and he and his wife are members of the First Baptist Church in Brownwood, where she serves as organist and he sings in the choir.

Whitton stated that choral singing will be offered in the local schools next year, under the direction of Mr. Flournoy.

He is presently employed by Lydick Roofing Co. in Brownwood, on a vacation job and will move to Cross Plains in time to get band work underway before school starts in September, it was said.

## Brothers and Sister Re-united Here Family Reunion; Separated 20 Years

Ever met an old friend in several years and enjoyed visiting? Then a happy meeting here at Cross Plains when Mrs. Noah Wright of this city and her twin sister, Mrs. Everett Wright of Abilene, reunited with a younger brother, Warner Wayne Griffin who was seen in 20 years.

Here is how the brother-sister reunion came about, as taken from a story appearing in the Sunday edition of the Abilene Reporter-News: A Friday night meeting at an Abilene drive-in re-united two brothers who, while living within a 100-mile radius of one another for two decades, were literally thousands of miles apart.

And a Cross Plain family reunion Sunday was even more of a happy affair since it brought together a brother and sister who were separated in early childhood.

Saturday afternoon, Billy Paul Wright, 25, of 2202 Kansas St. and his brother, Warner Wayne Griffin, 24, of Haskell were still as excited as children around that first Christmas tree after their meeting Friday night. That meeting was the first between the two since their family was split up in the late 1930's.

And Warner Wayne was anxiously looking forward to seeing his sister, Mrs. Bobbie Johnson of Cross Plains, and a twin to Billy Paul.

The trio, as far as they know, are the only children still living in Texas of the late J. W. Cooper, Runnels County farmer, who died in 1935 and was buried in Crews. From what few facts they have available, their mother, two sisters and a brother are living in California.

The oldest brother, J. B. Cooper, is living in Homeland, Cal., and according to the information Billy Paul and Warner Wayne have, their mother and the two sisters are also in the Pacific Coast state, but their names are not known.

Eight Children in Family. There were eight children in the family originally but two have died, Billy Paul said.

Billy Paul and his sister, Bobbie, were born in 1932 and Warner in 1933. When their father died in 1935, it was impossible for Mrs. Cooper to care for the eight children and the 290-acre Runnels County farm she owned. Various relatives cared for the children for several years and, in 1938, Billy Paul and his sister were adopted by Mr. and Mrs. Everett Wright who live on a farm 1 1/2 miles east of Cross Plains.

Warner Wayne was adopted in 1941 by Mrs. W. W. Griffin of Haskell.

While Billy Paul and Mrs. Johnson were attending and graduating from Cross Plain High School, Warner Wayne attended State Home High School in Corsicana. Billy Paul and Bobbie were graduated from the Cross Plain High School in 1950. Warner Wayne was drafted before he was graduated.

Both men served in the military forces. Billy Paul went into service in November, 1952 and after training at Fort Hood and Fort Sam Houston, served 18 months in Korea.

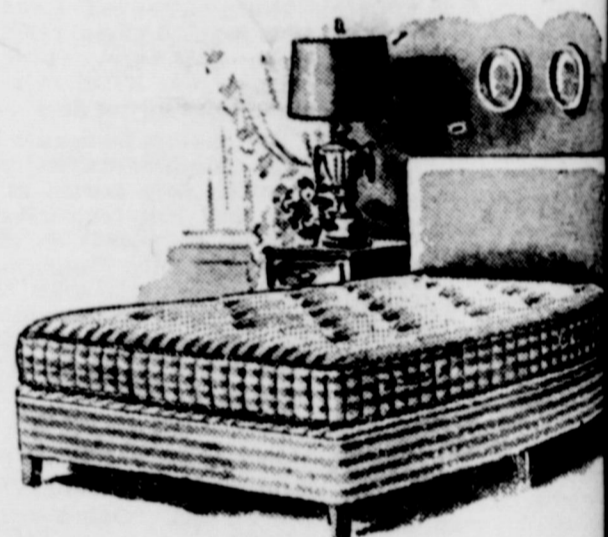

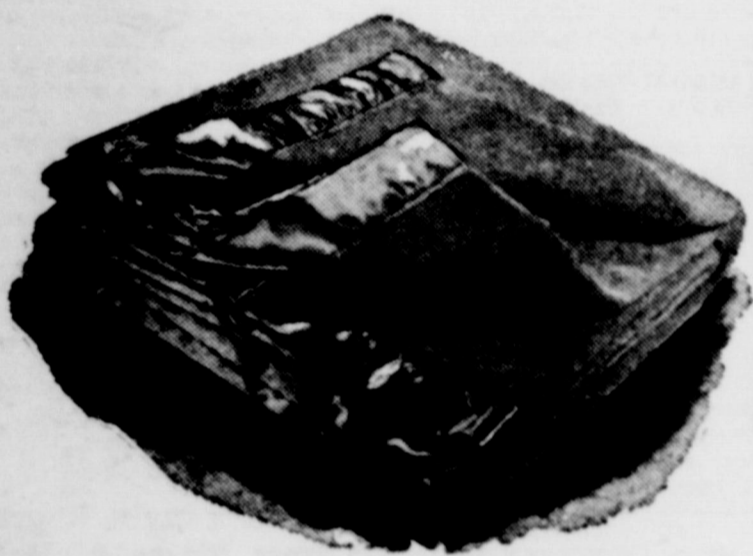

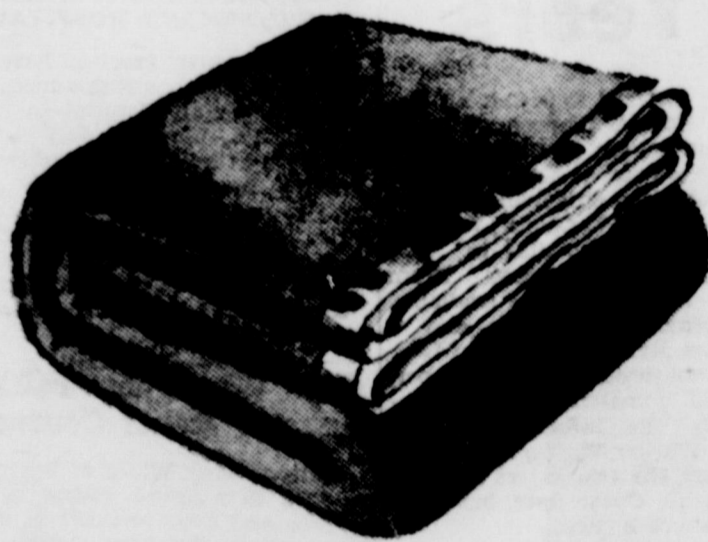

**Longhorn Cavern Deemed Million Years in Making**

Texas Longhorn Cavern, spectacular scenic masterpiece of Nature, was at least a million years in the making, geologists estimate. The huge cavern is awesome evidence of the changes wrought through the ages by variations in climate, earth movements, the rise and fall of the seas and the slow solution of limestone by water.



Longhorn Cavern, located near Burnet in the Highland Lakes region northwest of Austin, is one of the state's favorite attractions for tourists and sightseers. Guided tours are conducted daily through the explored portions of the cave, which is one of the world's largest.

Richard W. Rush, assistant professor of geology at the University of Texas, has traced the sequence of events which led to the development of the cavern from the time when Texas lay beneath a huge sea, approximately a half-billion years ago.

The stone in which the cavern was eventually carved out was formed from limy muds deposited at the bottom of this sea. Over countless centuries this mud deposit gradually rose out of the sea, only to sink beneath it again, a process which was repeated a number of times.

Finally slow uplift raised Texas above the sea for the last time and the limestone which had hardened from the mud deposits lay exposed to the elements for over sixty million years.

At that time Central Texas was a humid swampland in which gigantic dinosaurs and other reptilian monsters roamed.

The actual beginnings of Longhorn Cavern probably occurred during the Ice Age, when the northern part of the United States

was covered by glaciers, more than a million years ago.

As the glaciers retreated, about 50,000 years ago, the climate of Texas became drier and the ground water level began to drop, dissolving the limestone as it fell.

Underground streams flowing through the cave helped to carve out the labyrinthian passageways and huge rooms, until the cavern was excavated to its most remote chamber, an eerie 130 feet below the surface of the earth.

Prehistoric cavemen probably sought refuge in the subterranean depths of the cavern to avoid being devoured by the fearsome mammals which ranged the countryside in dim ages past.

The main approach to the cavern entrance is through a collapsed sink or deep depression in the limestone, with remnants of the original roof preserved as a natural bridge over the steps leading to the cave mouth.

The scenic beauty of the cavern is heightened by the sparkling displays of calcite crystals, the unusual shapes formed of flint and the clusters of stalactites and stalagmites which in some instances have fused to form impressive columns.

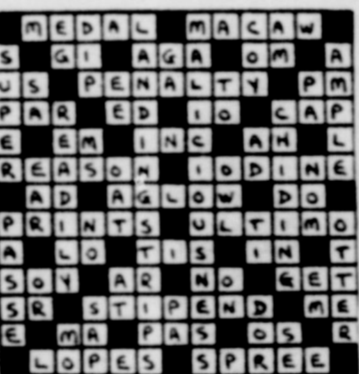
