



WHAT TO DO WHEN BREATHING STOPS



These five figures illustrate, from top to bottom, the steps in mouth-to-mouth resuscitation now being taught in Red Cross First Aid courses.

(1) Mother, using middle finger of one hand, clears child's mouth of any foreign matter. With same finger, she holds the tongue

(2) Mother places child in a face-down, head-down, position, and pats him firmly on the back with the free hand, to help dislodge any foreign object in the air

(3) The child is placed on his back, and the mother, using middle fingers of both hands, lifts the lower jaw from beneath and be-

hind so that it "juts out." (4) With one hand only, the jaw is held in this jutting-out posi-

(5) The mother, covering the child's mouth and nose with her mouth, breathes into the child with a smooth, steady action. The free hand applies continuous moderate pressure to the child's ab-domen, between navel and ribs, to prevent the stomach from being filled with air.
