PHILOSOPHER FINDS HE'S UP ALONGSIDE THE EXPERTS IN FIGHTING INFLATION

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou is back on the topic of inflation, his letter this week reveals.

Like a lot of other people, I have been giving considerable thought lately to the problem of inflation, which is not the most exciting topic to think about but it beats plowing.

According to the economic index and my grocery bill, the cost of living has been going up a little every month for the last 18 months, and every time it goes up, it means a general increase in prices and wages which in turn sends the cost of living up a little more, and if it keeps it up anybody can see it'll get completely out of hand.

Consequently, I was pleased to read in an article in a newspaper yesterday afternoon which I had been using to put on my tractor seat while I went to get a drink of water to shade it from the sun, anybody knows what happens to a tractor seat when it's left in the sun fifteen or twenty minutes in August, and when a puff of wind blew this paper off and left the seat too hot to sit on, there wasn't anything else for me to do but take the paper to the shade of a tree and read, and consequently, as I started to say I was pleased to read that some of the best minds in the country are working on the problem of inflation.

According to Gardner C. Means, one of the top economists in the country, inflation is caused by "administered prices," by which he means prices aren't allowed to follow the law of supply and demand, people just set a price they figure they ought to get or can get, and by a quirk of human nature the price is always up, not down.

Therefore, he says what we ought to do is stop raising prices and wages for one year, while we study the problem of mounting inflation. I think this is a good idea and I am pleased to know that one of the nation's top economists has finally caught up with us farmers.

As you know, me and the rest of the farmers of this nation haven't raised prices in the last 12 months. I will go even further. We haven't raised 'em in the last 5 years. I'll pay my subscription to The Review five years in advance if anybody will point out to me any farmer or rancher in Callahan County who has raised the price of anything he sells in the last five years. Personally, the last time I raised the price of a steer was in 1949. I priced it at what I figured I ought to get, and bowed my neck and held out. The steer died of old age.

So, if American business and American labor will follow the pattern set by us farmers and flat refuse to raise prices for one year, we'll give this new idea a complete test. It sure is lonesome testing it all by ourselves.

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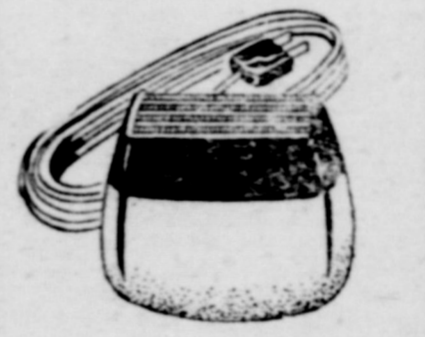

### Soil Conservation District News

N. V. Gibbs has cut and shocked three acres of Sorghum Alum on his farm about one mile South of Rowden. He plans to thresh the seed from these bundles. Gibbs is well pleased with this new grass and plans to plant additional acres next year.  
C. M. Garrett has combined seed from eleven acres of Blue Panic. Garrett planted this grass in 1955, on his farm three miles south of Cross Plains. He has already planted about one hundred and thirty-five acres to various grasses and plans to plant more next year.  
Again attention is being focused on the seeding of fall and winter cover crops by farmers. Vetch and winter peas are being used in most instances, either with or without small grain. These cover crops will be seeded to protect land against wind and water erosion and as soil conditioning crops.  
Vetch and winter pea seed are available from most of our local seed dealers.

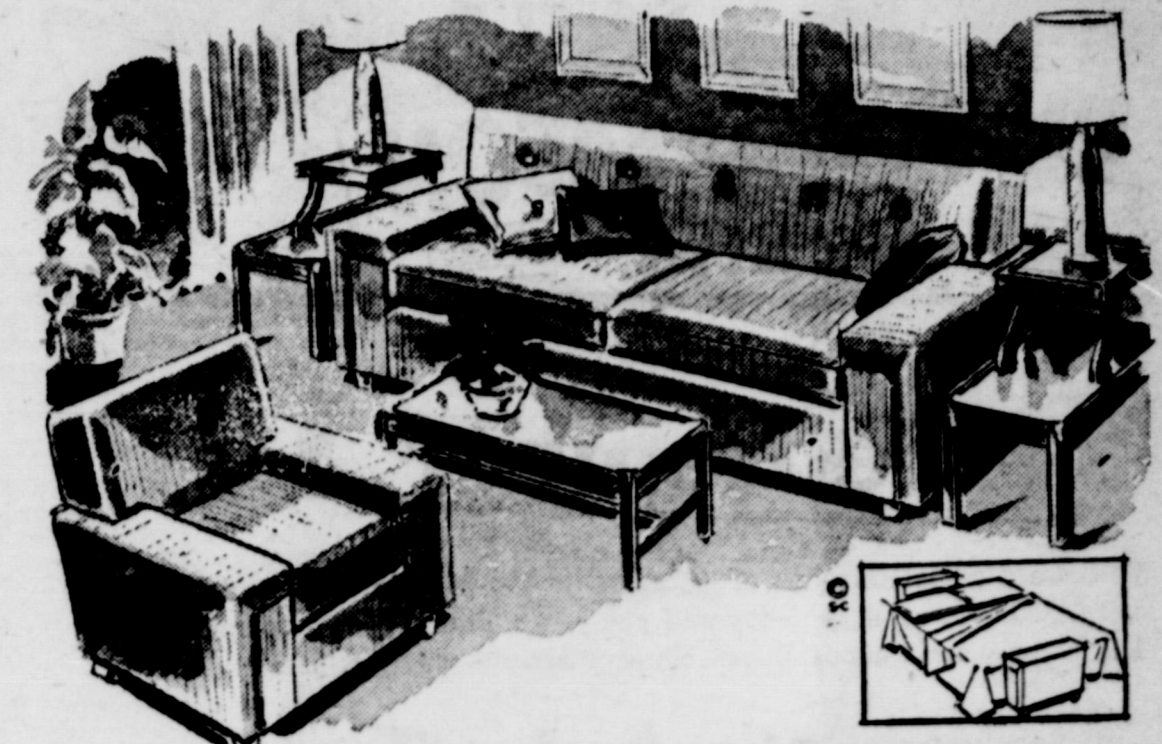

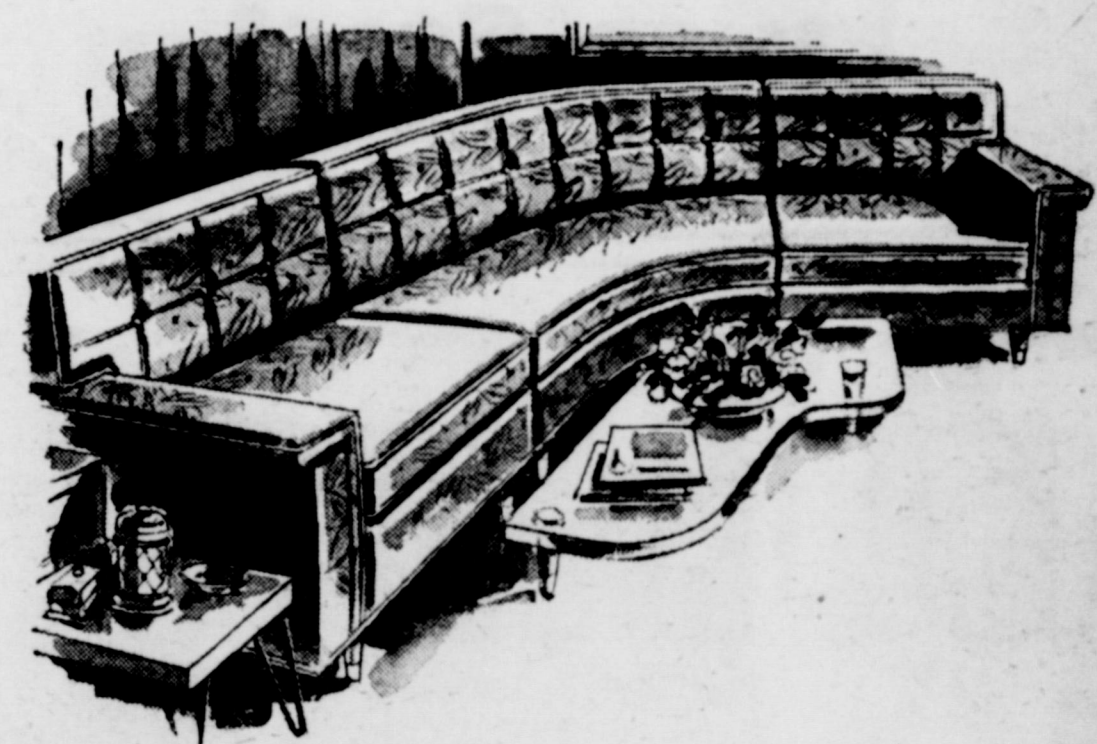

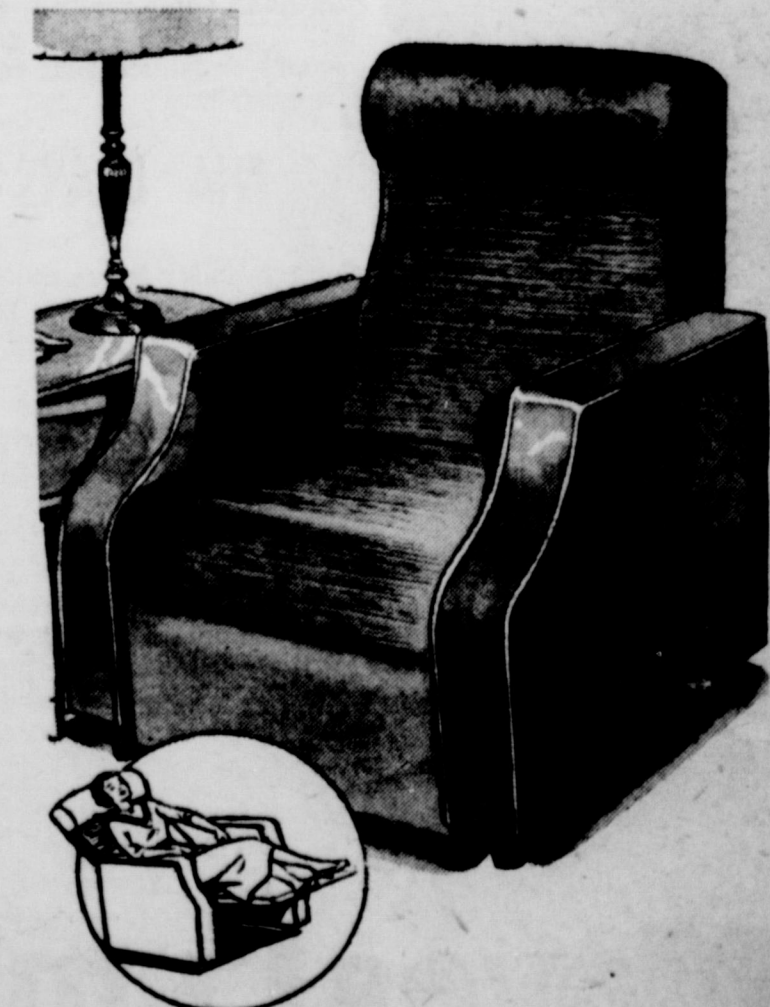

Drug Firm Plans Vaccine Shipment In September

One of the nation's largest drug houses has promised physicians of this area that a supply of vaccine to combat the expected outbreak of Asian Flu will be available by early September.

The firm, Eli Lilly and Co., said in a letter received by City Drug Store that it intends to produce vaccine in excess of one million doses per week by the end of Sept.

The United States Public Health Service has announced that distribution of the vaccine will be effected through regular sources without any governmental regulation.

The letter said in effect that a one-cc. dose of 200 CCA units of Asian strain vaccine given in a shot will stimulate the rise of virus antibodies in a majority of individuals.

Reactions are sometimes encountered with the vaccine, but these are usually short-lived and last only 12 to 24 hours. These reactions include most commonly soreness, redness, and occasionally aching and fever.

The expected flu outbreak is likely to begin any time this fall in Texas, most experts agree. Already the disease has been noticed in several communities in the Lone Star State, but cases thus far have been relatively mild.

## MOURNING DOVE — WHITE-WINGED DOVE

Open Seasons 1957

-  NORTH ZONE: Sept. 1 to Oct. 17, both days inclusive.
-  SOUTH ZONE: Oct. 1 to Nov. 17, both days inclusive, except in those counties having white-winged season—Oct. 1 to Nov. 14, both days inclusive.
-  WHITE-WINGED DOVES and mourning doves: Sept. 13, 15, and 17.



BAG LIMIT: 10 per day in the aggregate. Whitewings (in season) and mourning doves. Possession limit: 10.

SPECIAL NOTE: Unlawful to take white-winged doves or chachalacas South of U. S. Highway 83, formerly State Highway 4, in southern tip of Texas, marked on map as "Game Sanctuary."

SHOTGUNS must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity, may not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.

SHOOTING HOURS: White-winged and mourning doves, in season, 12 o'clock noon to sunset.

KAUFMAN COUNTY: Dove season closed in Combine Community.

McMULLEN COUNTY: Open season by State law Nov. 1 to Dec. 15; by Federal Law Oct. 1 to Nov. 17.

NO HUNTING permitted in game refuges and game reserves.

Texas Game and Fish Commission  
Austin, Texas

Austin.—It's time to drag the shotgun from the corner in the closet and wipe off the lint. The 1957 shooting season will begin Sunday noon, Sept. 1, for mourning dove in the north zone, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game & Fish Commission.

Thirty days later the season will open in the south zone.

The seasons extend: north zone, Sept. 1 to Oct. 17 inclusive; south zone, Oct. 1 to Nov. 17, inclusive.

The white wing season has been authorized for the Rio Grande Valley area for Sept. 13, 15, 17.

The dove bag limit is 10 per day, with 10 in possession.

Shooting is allowed from noon until sunset.

Under federal and state regulations all shotguns must be plugged to three-shell capacity. Shooting from vehicles or across the highway is prohibited.

The directors issued warning to hunters to make arrangements with land owners for their hunts.

Three East Texas counties, Jasper, Tyler and Newton, will have no open season. In a local bill, these counties were excluded from the general laws and a special season was set up. This special season is in conflict with the federal laws.

Reports from all over the state indicate the largest dove crop in

years. It is estimated that some 600,000 whitewings will be available for the Valley hunt.

Mourning doves are plentiful now in every area. Unless there is a drastic change in weather conditions before Sept. 1, they are expected to remain in the local areas. Cooler weather or rains could change this condition. Water hole shooting also can be affected greatly, especially if heavy rains fill new water holes, providing too much water in various areas where food is available.

"Every safety precaution should be used," the director said. "Hunting season usually brings on several accidental deaths due entirely to carelessness."

He also warned that all persons between the ages of 17 and 65 need licenses when hunting outside their home counties. These licenses are now available from wardens and other authorized license dealers throughout the state.

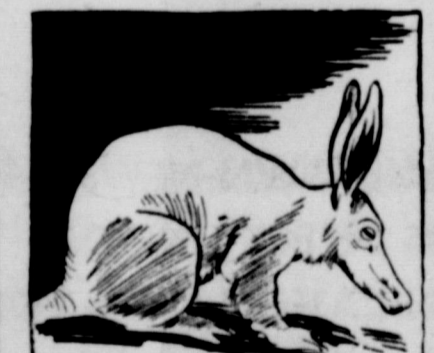
