SCHOOLS GET OFF TO GOOD START TUESDAY WITH ENROLLMENT OF 499 STUDENTS

Paul L. Whitton, Superintendent of Schools here, announced Tuesday afternoon of this week that the local schools got off to a good start with a total enrollment of 499 students, and one of the best years in the history of the school is expected.

Ferrell Newton, high school principal reported an enrollment of 181 students in high school and Principal Jack Watkins announced that his enrollment stood at 318. This is a loss of 23 students in the schools, as compared to last year's opening day enrollment of 522. The high school enrollment gained four students over last year when 177 students were present. However, the ward school enrollment dropped 27.

School officials stated that several additional students are expected to enroll during the first week to bring the totals up some, but it is not possible to attain the enrollment of last year, it was said.

School Plant Improvements

Students and faculty members found many improvements in the school facilities on opening day, including: New desk chairs in the sixth grades, new furniture in Mrs. Bunnell's room in ward school and new desks for teachers in the sixth grades.

Three rooms in high school also were refurbished with all new and modern desk chairs and nine rooms in the school were provided with all-steel storage cabinets for supplies.

The offices of Supt. Whitton and High School Principal Newton were redecorated and both buildings were completely renovated, providing a clean and cheerful atmosphere for the student body.

New outside doors were installed on the ward school building and extensive remodeling and redecorating was completed on the home economics cottage. Thirty new chairs were purchased for the cottage and four new table-type sewing machines were added, giving student homemakers one of the finest plants in this section.

Whitton stated that a large and enthusiastic crowd of parents were present for opening day and he invites all patrons of the district to visit the schools at their convenience.

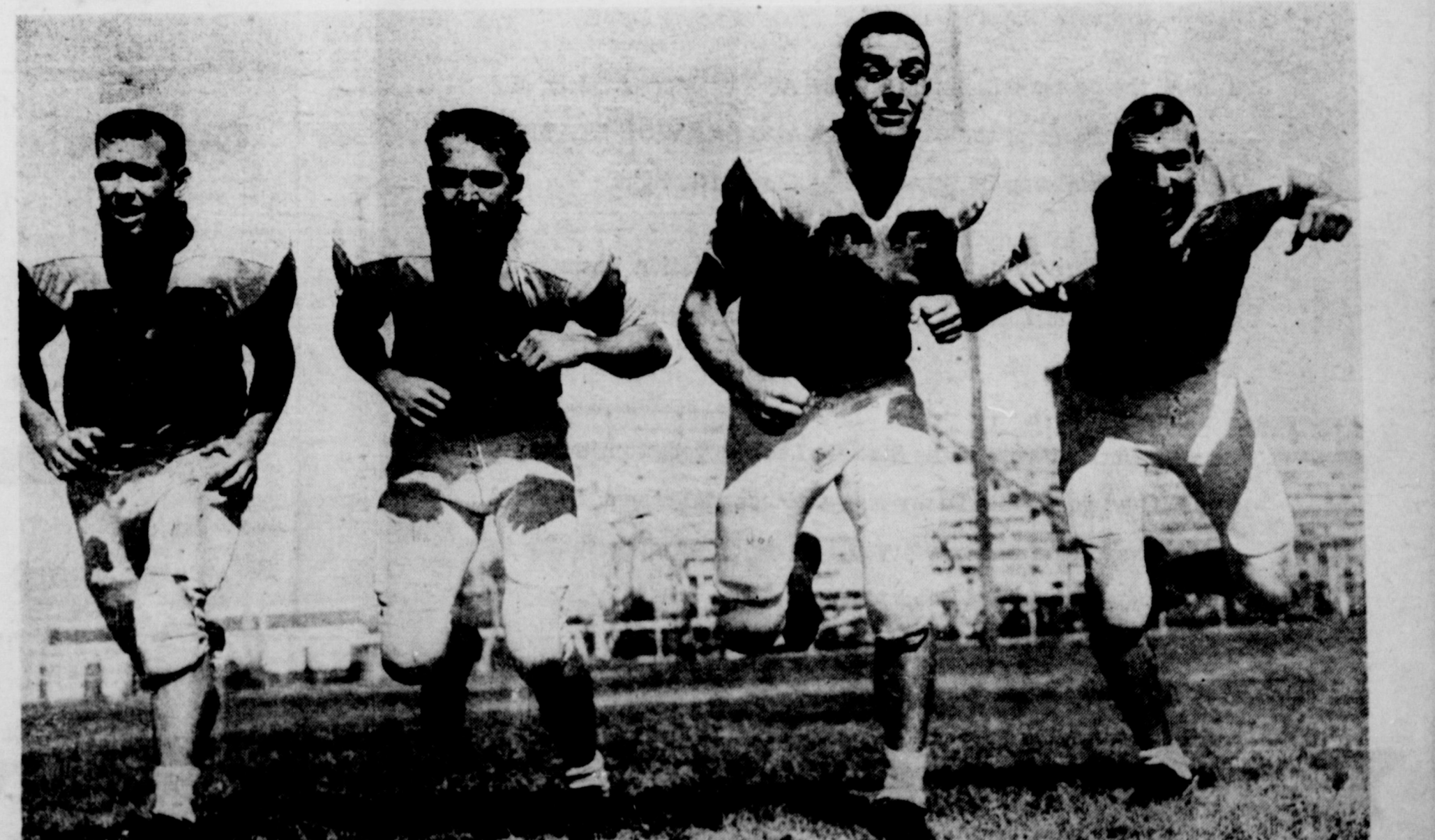

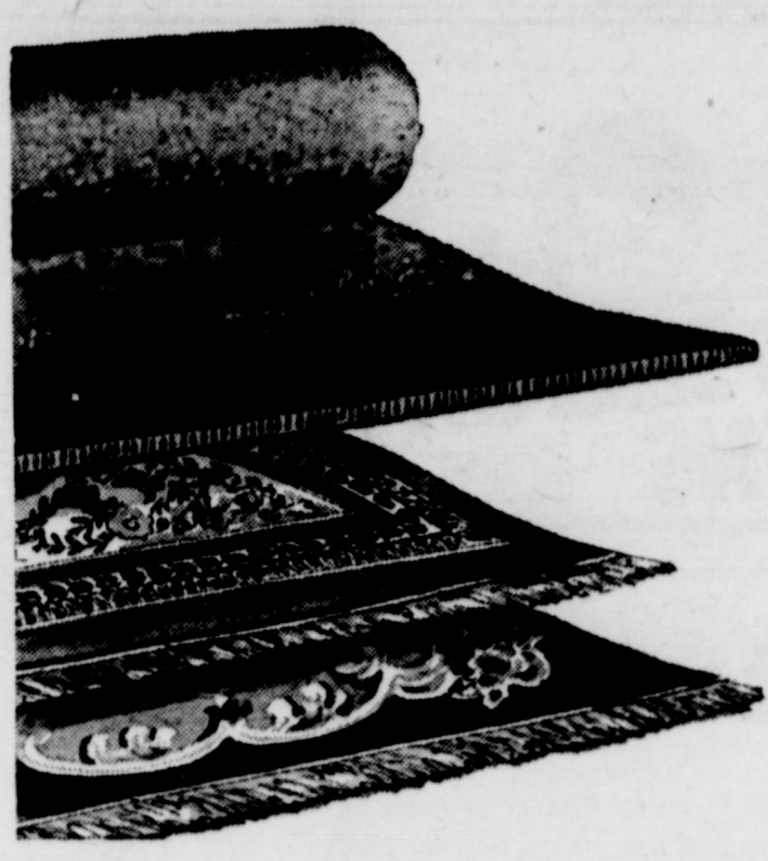

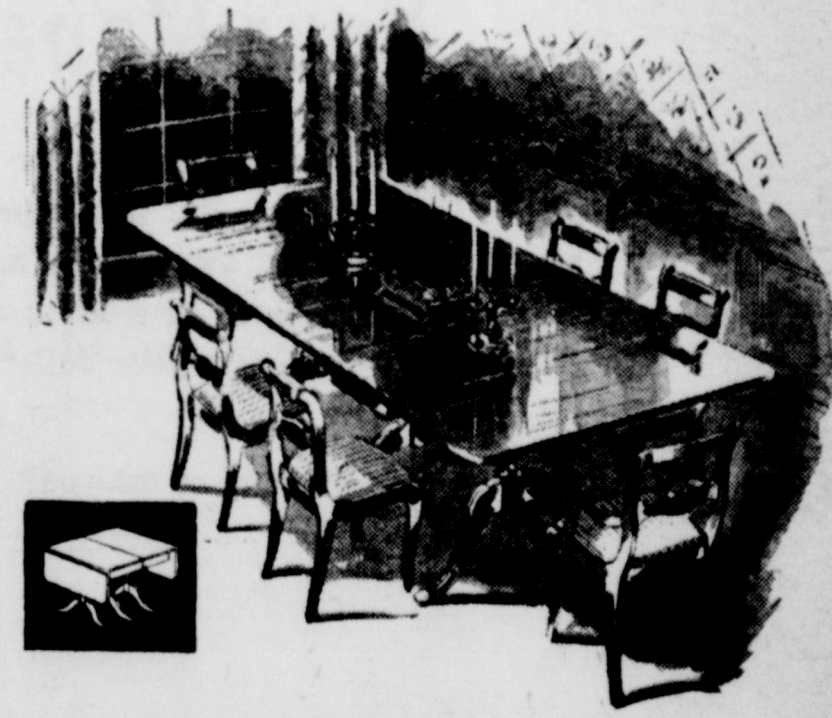

SS Benefits Payable for Some Disabled Children

Some disabled children over age 18 received their first monthly social security benefits early in February, according to C. M. Vaden, Jr., Field Representative of the Abilene Social Security office. Recent legislation provided for these payments to start for the month of January 1957. A number of applications have already been filed, and more are being received.

Under the new provisions, children who are disabled may receive social security benefits after they reach age 18, if they were disabled before age 18, are unmarried and dependent upon a living parent who is drawing social security benefits, or were dependent upon a deceased insured parent. The term "parent" includes natural parent, and in many cases, step-parent or adopting parent.

It is not necessary that the child himself have any record of work under the social security law to be eligible for benefits as a disabled child. However, he must have a disability severe enough to prevent him from engaging in any substantial gainful activity. The disability must be medically determinable.

Disabled children over 18 who believe they qualify, or persons caring for them, should inquire regarding benefits by writing the Social Security Administration, P. O. Box 1641, Abilene, Vaden advised.

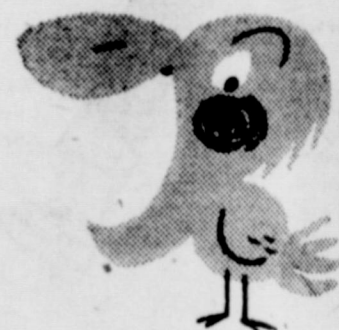

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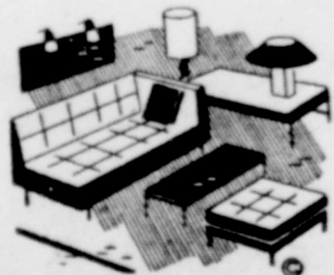

Austin. - Students are trooping back to school for another year of readin', writin' and 'rithmetic.

But the knottiest school problems are not in the math books.

For parents the problem is the high cost of practically everything. Tuition at state colleges has doubled. Even the parents of first graders are wincing as they add up the "outfitting" bills. Cost of blue jeans, plus crayons, plus lunch money, takes an ever growing bite out of most family budgets. Many mothers will go back to work this fall to help balance the income-outgo equation.

On a bigger scale Texas school agencies and administrators have the problem of the "old woman who lived in the shoe." They have so many children they don't know what to do. Their problem of trying to balance school faculties against school needs is complicated by the fact that one side of the equation - needs - keeps on growing.

Some 1,000,000 children are expected to enroll this month. That is 70,000 more than last fall. To keep the education mills grinding, Texans will spend an estimated \$526,000,000 this year. It's twice as much as was spent eight years ago. Local districts are pouring some \$40,000,000 into new buildings this year.

Showdown on Water. - It's now or never for Texans to solve their water problems in an orderly manner.

This, in effect, is the attitude of Gov. Price Daniel as he sets the wheels in motion for a "big push" this fall.

First attack will be by a 100-person statewide water planning committee appointed by the governor. It is to meet in Austin beginning September 9 to develop planning and leadership for a master plan for water conservation and flood control over the state.

Committee members include civic leaders and persons interested in and acquainted with water problems from all parts of the state.

They'll also be asked to help plan future legislation and develop support for the proposed constitutional amendment that would provide a \$100,000,000 bond issue for waer projects.

Second phase of the governor's plan is the special legislative session to pass needed additional laws. Target date for the session still is October, the governor has indicated.

Two pieces of water legislation are proposed by Governor Daniel: (1) Creation of a state water planning division to draw up a master plan and (2) a law enabling the state to purchase water storage space in federal reservoirs (a measure which failed last session).

Planning division probably would cost from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000 says Daniel. This can be obtained, he says, but not used for other purposes.

If Texas doesn't face the responsibility for its water planning itself, declared the governor, the federal government will take over with a "take it or leave it" plan.

Greenhill of Austin will become an associate justice of the State Supreme Court on Sept. 30.

Greenhill was appointed by the governor to replace Judge Few Brewster, who is resigning because of ill health. A former Houstonian, Greenhill, 43, will be the youngest judge on the high court.

He is a former assistant attorney general to Daniel and was the governor's campaign manager in '56. Daniel termed him "one of Texas' ablest lawyers."

Cotton Crop Slow. - Ginning of Texas' cotton crop is lagging behind 1956, but a larger yield than last year is still expected.

By mid-August only 365,504 bales had been ginned, reports the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. Last year at this time almost twice as much had been ginned.

But crops in many areas are late due to prolonged rains. USDA still predicts the '57 crop in Texas will be 3,775,000 bales compared to 3,615,000 last year.

More Errors Found. - All the excitement over moving the State Insurance Department out of the International Life Insurance Co. building in Austin was for naught.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has ruled invalid that part of the reorganization bill which ordered a new building.

Wilson says the bill was improperly drawn.

Most Afe Sound. - Most Texas insurance companies are strong. So said Judge Penn Jackson in his first public speech since becoming chairman of the Board of Insurance Commissioners.

But, he added, "a smaller number are losing ground and may not be able to survive."

New Courts. - A new district court in Austin and one in Dallas now are open for business.

Judge Mace B. Thurman, formerly of Travis County's Court-at-Law, was named to the new bench in Austin.

Judge Claude Williams, Dallas, attorney, was appointed to the new court there.

Short Snorts - Texas ranked seventh in the nation last year on per capita income, reports the Bureau of the Census. Texas per capita income, \$1,686. National average, \$1,940.

Dr. N. Jay Rodgers of Beaumont and Dr. Ira E. Woods of Grapevine have been reappointed by the Governor for six-year terms on the State Board of Optometry.

Another motor vehicle inspection period has arrived. You have until next April 15 to get your new sticker but early inspections are urged by the Department of Public Safety.

Texas draft calls continue to shrink. October quota is 338. It compares with 387 for September and 347 for August. Inductees will be taken from age 22 and over, except for delinquents and volunteers.

Texas has 308 new nurses. They passed the recent statewide examination for vocational nurse licenses. Two schools have been newly accredited to teach vocational nursing - Marcom Hospital of Vocational Nursing at Ladonia and Permian General Hospital School of Vocational Nursing at Andrews.

Cross Plains Review SCS NEWS

John D. Isenhower has about 12 acres of Sorghum Alnum growing on his ranch south of Putnam. He plans to harvest seed from this grass in the near future.

The grass was planted in May of this year and has grown off extremely well. Mr. Isenhower is well pleased with his Sorghum Alnum, and plans to seed several acres next year.

W. T. Moore has cut and shocked about three acres of Sorghum Alnum on his farm 1-2 miles northeast of Eula. He plans to thresh seed from these bundles. These seed will be used to plant several acres to this new grass next year.

C. L. Brandon now has about 49 acres of Blue Panic and 22 acres of Sorghum Alnum growing on his farm east of Putnam. These grasses were seeded this past spring and have made excellent growth.

Many farmers are now making preparations for the seeding of fall and winter cover crops. Vetch and winter peas will be used in most instances, either with or without small grain. These cover crops will be seeded to protect the land against wind and water erosion and as soil conditioning crops.

Vetch and winter pea seed are available from most of our local seed dealers.

Spring rains have in the main done wonders to the pastures in the Brown-Mills SCD. If for no other reason, the cover crop they have added to the land has been of great value in several ways.

First, vast amounts of water was stored in the ground this spring as a direct result of this added cover. Secondly with this cover the ground has been shaded and therefore protected from the direct rays of the sun.

Temperature readings as high as 140 degrees F have been made in the district in previous years. This year on similar ground, readings were 10 to 40 degrees lower due primarily to the added cover growth this year.

In digging throughout the district this spring showed that moisture had penetrated to a depth of seven feet under a good cover of grass, but on a similar soil only 100 feet away where there was little or no cover on the ground the moisture had penetrated only eleven inches.

Last week diggings revealed that under a good cover of grass, moisture was still present down to four feet but on bare ground no moisture was present.

Many cooperators with the district have applied deferred grazing this year, and in doing so are properly using their ranges.

Along with this proper use comes another problem - That of fire. Since most ranges are cured out and dry now, it is especially danger-

ous to have any kind of fire. One burn can send all the grass up in smoke. It is a tossed cigarette, burning pile or driving through with a pickup has been known to start a fire.

The Supervisors of the district urge sportsmen to be careful during the coming season. Sportsmen can help the importance of wildlife. So not only can help themselves by being careful with fire, but they can help the farmers and the district.

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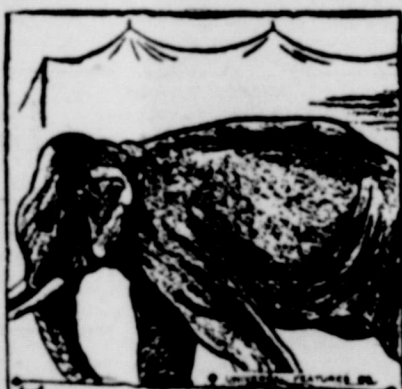
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
