In the new line-up of districts Rising Star was dropped back to Class B and will play Baird, May, Gorman, Early and Bangs. Eastland was the only area team advanced to Class AA. They will be in a district with Cisco. Ranger, Coleman and Winters. District 9-A, of which the Buffs are members this year, will be made up of Burnet, Llano, Goldthwaite, Mason and Santa Anna.

Enrollment requirements for Class A schools were changed from 125-200 to 120-200 students in high school. Schools with less than 120 students in high school will be Class B and those over 200 will be Class AA. No changes were made in the enrollment requirement in other classes.

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


