Two Cross Plains FFA Boys Receive Lone Star Farmer Degrees

Sidney Shirley and Jesse Harris received Lone Star Farmer Degrees at the District FFA awards banquet, held at Abilene High School, Wednesday night of last week.

The Lone Star Degree is the highest honor an FFA member can earn on the state level. The awards were presented to five boys in the district by Bill Anderson, of Albany, district FFA advisor. Anderson is a former Cross Plains boy and is a son of Mr. and Mrs. F. R. Anderson of this city.

The Cross Plains Chapter won second place in the radio and Senior chapter conducting contests, and was recognized by Malcolm Strode of Abilene, district president who presided over the banquet program.

Among the requirements for the Lone Star Farmer degree is an accumulation of a net worth of \$1,000 or more from chapter projects. The records for the five candidates receiving the degree indicate that they are leaders in other phases of vocational agriculture and FFA activities. Their records also indicate that they are interested in agriculture and livestock and are prospective future farmers in fact as well as in name.

Following are some of the attainments, which qualified Sidney and Jesse for Lone Star degrees:

Sidney Shirley—Projects have included cows for calf production, cows for milk production, barrows for meat production, hens for egg production and peanuts for cash production.

Leadership activities include membership on the dairy judging, Greenhand chapter conducting, and land judging teams, program committee, poultry judging, executive and livestock committees, and sentinel and treasurer of his chapter.

Jesse Harris—His projects have included dairy heifers for development, dairy cows for milk production, one calf for meat production, and 11 acres of peanuts for cash production.

Leadership activities have included secretaryship and reporter of chapter, member of Greenhand and senior chapter conducting teams, poultry and dairy judging teams, program committee, executive committee, chairman of finance committee, treasurer of sophomore class and chapter historian.

Sidney is one of the most popular girls in school here and is an honor roll student. She also serves as majorette in the Buffalo Band and plays first clarinet in the band and saxophone in the Stage Band.

Mr. McGowen was born in Cross Plains November 13, 1901 and was married to the former Anna Myrtle Scott. He was associated in business with his father, the late Will McGowen, a pioneer grocerman, here for sometime and was later employed by the Farmers National Bank.

In 1938 the McGowens moved to Monahans and he opened the West-Tex Grocery. He sold the grocery after World War II and built West-Tex Courts. During the last few years he had been dealing in stocks and securities, and also had real estate interests.

Survivors include his wife; one son, R. B. Jr., Monahans attorney; one brother, Murman McGowen of San Angelo; five sisters, Mrs. Sidney Hughes and Mrs. Roy Reynolds of Dallas, Mrs. C. W. Brown of McCarney, Mrs. J. B. Williams of Lufkin and Mrs. C. V. Bomer of Houston and two grandchildren.

Mr. Vestal took an active part in civic affairs here. He was a director of the now defunct First State Bank and a former director of the Citizens State Bank.

He was a school board member for 20 years and served as president of the board for a number of years and was a former member of the county school board. He was a member of the First Methodist Church and the Masonic Lodge.

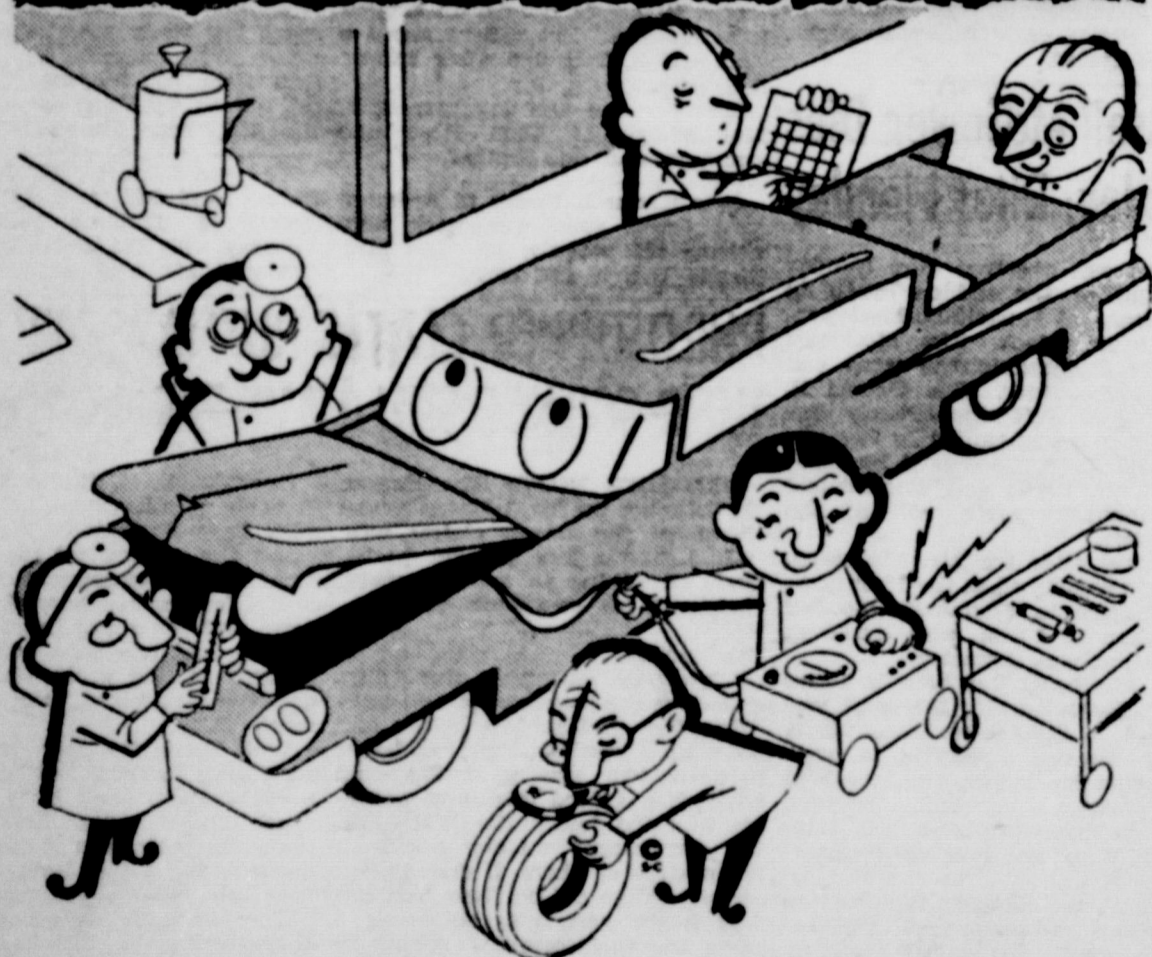

**HEALTH NOTES**

Progress in medicine and public health are difficult to measure. As each succeeding generation grows it falls into its own pattern of development, forgetting all too easily that only a few years earlier many of the conveniences of "modern" living—particularly of good health—simply did not exist.

How many of us recall the scourges that swept over whole communities in the form of small-pox, malaria, typhoid, and other diseases of which we are only vaguely aware today?

In fact, the only information most of us have of these diseases is gained from reading of epidemics in foreign lands, of tasting the protective chlorine in our water, and of the small scar left by a long past vaccination.

Even today we modernists are witnessing the decline and fall of still another ominous disease foe—paralytic polio. Since the advent of Salk vaccine, the drop in incidence has been so dramatic that the odds are good that tomorrow's children will be as safe from paralytic polio as our children are from smallpox.

Our ability to control infectious disease has been attained in a period of history marked by wide and intensive scientific and technical progress, accompanied by profound social change.

New stresses have been created that lead sometimes suddenly and at other times slowly to disease and premature death unless there is someone to stand guard.

As an example, the chemical stresses to which we are exposed are legion, and are mounting rapidly. Thousands of industrial plants discharge chemical wastes into rivers and streams that provide our drinking water. Many chemicals that have not been adequately tested for their effect on man are added to food in order to preserve, color, and flavor it.

A recent Railroad Commission survey shows that well over five million barrels of salt water are produced each day in Texas oil drilling operations. Some of that amount finds its way into river systems and underground water supplies, altering the chemical quality of the water.

More than a thousand million pounds of chemical insecticides are used annually throughout the world in the cultivation of fruits and vegetables. Some three million pounds of gases are discharged into the air of a single large American city each day by motor vehicles and industry.

These are the new stresses with which we must now contend. Solutions will come slowly and with difficulty. But they will come.

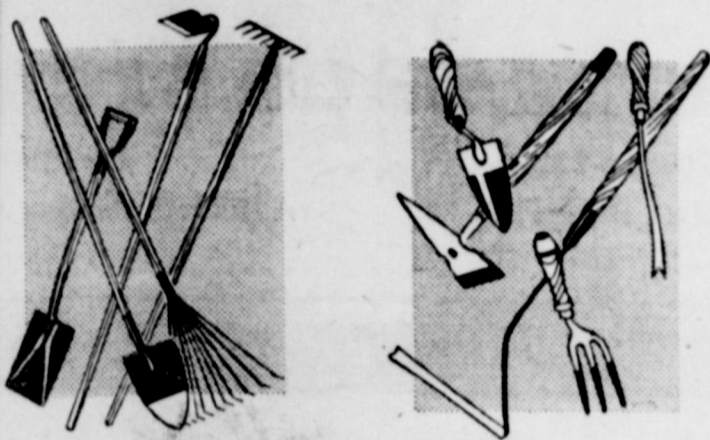

Figures compiled by The Outboard Boating Club of America reveal that there are more than seven million pleasure craft in the United States today.

Of these seven million, over half of them are outboard motor boats. You can find a goodly number of boats on any lake in Texas on any sunny Sunday afternoon. That's one of the joys of living in Texas. Actually, boating goes on in the Lone Star State practically every day of the year.

Another advantage of the wonderful Texas climate is that most boat owners don't have to resort to dry docks and winter storage. Very few Texas lakes and rivers ever freeze over.

If you don't believe that boating really has become big business, just ask your local boat dealer. He can give you plenty of facts and figures. Also the names of many persons whom you know who right now are enjoying the great outdoors.

He can tell you, too, that in 1957 Americans pumped 397,000,000 gal-

lons of gasoline and 19,000,000 gallons of lubricating oil into their outboards.

Furthermore, he can tell you that these same Americans spread 9-800,000 gallons of marine paint and varnishes during the same time. Also that they used 149,000,000 square feet of plywood; 45,000,000 pounds of aluminum; 29,300,000 pounds of fiberglass; 6,800,000 pounds of rope; and 8,000,000 square feet of sailcloth.

ASTOUNDING, ISN'T IT? And, there'll be more of it in 1958. So, if you don't have a boat you'd better get in the swim. It's the popular thing to do.

**Buying A New Rod?**  
In buying a new rod this year you'll be impressed with the number of popular brands now being made in two pieces. They also have medium size guides. Generally they are known as "spincasters" because you can use either a conventional reel or one of the new enclosed models.

Pfueger has just announced a new enclosed reel, the 85, with immediate line control. The company has solved one of the troubles with enclosed reels. By limiting the free flow of line from the cone, smoother operation is had. Pfueger is one of the old-line tackle manufacturers, being famous for its Supreme reel for many years.

I don't know why tackle manufacturers were slow to get around to the two piece rods with large guides. For a number of years I've been fishing with a home-made one. Really there is nothing new in the idea. Nearly all of our original steel rods were two or more pieces. I still have the old Bristol rod I learned to cast with. It is a 4 1/2 foot three piece rod. While it wasn't much for casting, it was easy to take along and it has caught plenty of fine bass.

Nowadays these new piece rods can be cared easily and transported without danger of breakage. With a light action rod, a smooth operating reel, monofilament line, and light lures, you have just about the ultimate in tackle.

In buying one of these spincaster rods I'd suggest you look for one where the two sections are about the same length. Then you are less likely to break a tip, either in the case or in transporting the equipment.

**It's Crow Killing Time**  
This is the time of the year when you can do a lot about protecting next season's quail, young turkeys, peacocks and roasting ears.

If every hunter in Texas would kill a half-dozen crows it would mean a great deal to the protection of game birds and crops.

I don't think I ever have seen more crows in Texas than there are right now. In driving across the state I have seen hundreds following the plows in the field or squawking about their looting. In the late evenings great hordes of them can be seen flying from fresh plowed fields back to their roosts in river bottom tree tops. In some areas game wardens assisted in dynamiting crow roosts. In others, crow shoots have been arranged.

Crow shooting offers a very good practice for shotgunners. Two or more gunners can stack up a big pile of crows in a short time of good shooting, in a very simple way.

For shotgun shooting it is desirable that the shooters find a good clump of trees near a freshly plowed field, or where corn or peanuts have been left in the field. With a crow call, which sells for a dollar or two, you can call them in quickly. Crow calling is much simpler than calling ducks or geese. Almost anyone can attract crows with just a few minutes practice.

If you have a stuffed owl and will mount it on a fence post, then

use your crow call like a crying call for help, crows will flock in to you. That's the time to get in some real shooting.

You don't have to have any particular size shot or load for crows. You can shoot them with duck loads, or bird loads. Either is very effective.

One of the nicest shooting guns I've seen lately for this work is that over-under double-barrel Marlin. This fine o/u is equipped with anti-doubling single trigger mechanism. For a shooter who is partial to a double gun, but still likes to sight down a single tube, this is the answer.

Somehow I have a tender spot in my heart for Marlin guns. They are the oldtimers. The company has been making rifles and shotguns for many years. Currently it is the only American company making the o/u shotgun, which I think is a real beauty.

Of course you don't have to use a shotgun on crows. They afford wonderful targets for rifle shooting. There is more darger, however, in rifle shooting. Bullets from rifles, even the modest 22, will travel a long way. For that reason utmost care should be used. In fact, if anything larger than a 22 rim fire is used, the caliber should be limited to one of the high speed varmint loads. They break up on contact and are less likely to kill someone in the next county.

**Taxpayers Urged to Keep Records of Deductions**

Importance of adequate records to back up claimed deductions was stressed Friday by A. E. Fogle, Jr. of Internal Revenue Service.

"A taxpayer's statement that he gave 'about \$100' to the Blank Charity won't satisfy Uncle Sam," Mr. Fogle said.

"The keeping of a few casual notes or records which only enable a taxpayer to approximate his income is not adequate. All taxpayers, including farmers and ranchers, must keep records that will accomplish two purposes: First, help the taxpayer file an accurate tax return for 1957. Second, records that, if examined closely by Revenue, will help us determine if the law has been fulfilled."

Mr. Fogle added that records should include sales slips, invoices, receipts, canceled checks, and any other document which may be needed as legal evidence.

"I wish to correct an error. I was represented as having plans to put a dam on Turkey Creek for a water supply. I wish to clear my position in this matter. The facts are that the Soil Conservation and Flood Control Commission are tentatively planning to make a survey of the water shed of Turkey Creek with the idea of building a series of small dams on its tributaries to control flood waters.

"The engineer has been asked while making the survey to try to locate a dam site that would be suitable for the city to add to said dam and impound additional water for the use of the city to supplement our present supply. In the event such a place is found and recommended by the engineer, the mayor and council will submit this proposition to a vote of the citizens.

"The city has made progress the last few years. Meeting all payments on our outstanding indebtedness and have retired bonds that were due in future years, thereby saving the city a considerable amount of interest. Our original bonded indebtedness was refunded March 1, 1952 at \$104,000.00 and after meeting the payments of March 1, our bonded indebtedness will stand at \$66,000.00.

"The city has made considerable improvements on our streets and other city property and have had sufficient water and gas, and at the present time the city does not have any outstanding indebtedness except the bonds described above and current bills.

"I would appreciate your vote again this year. Each citizen should take it upon themselves to vote in city elections, thereby taking an interest in our city affairs. Yours very truly, "W. D. Smith."

The program for the annual Eastland County Orchard Field Day to be held at Carbon on March 6 has been completed according to a recent announcement from the County Agent's office.

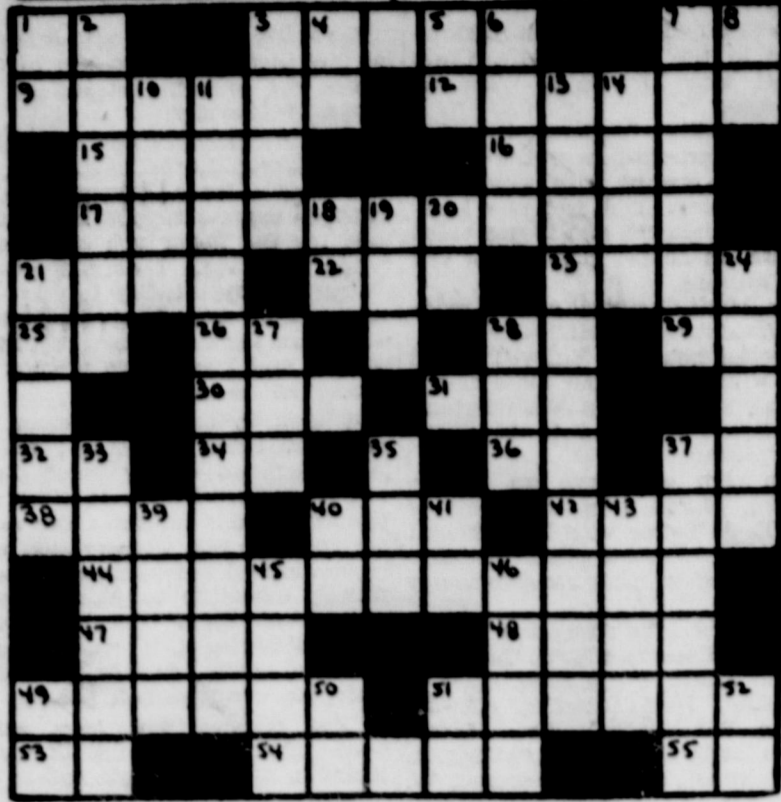
