Mr. Garrett stated that considerable discussion was given to recent developments in feeding laying stock. More emphasis is currently being placed on the addition of Choline and Vitamin K to rations.

While Mr. Garrett was at A&M he visited the newly established random sample tests for caged layers at the College Poultry Farm. This is the first test of this type to be conducted in Texas. Results of these tests will be of value to cage operators in Texas in selecting replacement birds, he says.

PHILOSOPHER WILLING TO HAVE TAXES CUT STRICTLY IN INTEREST OF ENDING RECESSION

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou is off on the subject of economics this week, with what success you'll have to decide for yourself.

Dear editor:

For the past few weeks I've been reading everything I could get my hands on about the cause and cure of recession, and so far all I've been able to figure out is that a recession is like a virus—medical science isn't sure what causes it or what cures it, but it has no trouble discovering when you've got one.

However, there's been an argument going on over one of the proposed cures of the recession that interests me.

According to one expert, the way to cure the recession is to cut income taxes 20 per cent, starting next week. This way, he says, everybody who gets paid by the week and has his income tax withheld from each pay check, which is the installment method of paying taxes, would have a little more money to spend, and any close student of human nature knows he'll spend it, which will increase the demand for goods, stir the factories up, and get things rolling again.

Another expert thought argues that if you cut income taxes 20 per cent now, just intending to keep

em cut for the duration of the recession, you'll hit a stump when you try to restore em later on when things are booming again. He says it'll be dangerous to tamper with the tax rate.

Frankly, I can't follow this line of reasoning, and it demonstrates a gross lack of confidence in the government. I have never seen a government, from the local level to the state to Washington, that couldn't manage to raise taxes when it really put its mind to the job. People have been running for office on a platform of more economy and getting elected since elections were invented, and the cost of government has been going up steadily from the same date.

Understand, I'm not saying government ought to cost less, or more, I'm just saying that anybody who thinks any government can't figure out how to restore a tax, is just not familiar with modern governmental leaders, regardless of which party he runs under.

If cutting taxes for a few months will end whatever recession we've got, I say go ahead and try it and don't be worrying about Congress' ability to restore it later on. I've got confidence in Congress. I figure it figures I can pay it, and frequently it jumps the gun and does it before I'm ready.

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AUSTIN, Tex. — It's "needling" time in Texas. That is the period when those in office start feeling the barbs of those who have their eyes on the same office.

Filing deadline for the summer's primaries is May 5. In any pre-election period the "outs" have a busy season of looking for "bugs under chips." Any likely looking "bug" is hauled out to test public reaction on its value as future campaign fodder against the "ins."

But this year no one has to look hard. Texas' problems are all too obvious. Unemployment highs persist stubbornly into spring weeks. Oil, the state's No. 1 moneymaker, is seriously bogged down. A multi-million dollar deficit in state revenues is in prospect.

Hence, an open season for "viewing with alarm" and prospect of lively campaigns if some hard runners line up for major offices.

NO MORE SPECIALS—He sees no need of a special legislative session now, says Gov. Price Daniel, because the state government is already pushing an anti-recession program.

Governor Daniel's statement was in reply to a demand by the president of the Texas AFL-CIO for an 8-point program to combat unemployment. Jerry Holleman challenged the governor to back up his philosophy of "states rights" by meeting "states responsibilities." His "points" included revision of unemployment compensation laws, speeding up spending program for buildings, highways, water projects etc.

Daniel reported that Holleman's demands took no note of work already moving apace. Texas, he said, "did not wait for a recession to exercise its responsibility of providing highway, water conservation, attraction of industry, increased salary and building construction programs."

"This is one reason the situation in Texas is much better than in most other states."

"I have every confidence," said the governor, "that the prophets of gloom and doom will not talk

us out of a continuation of our unparalleled progress."

WATER BOARD COMMENDED—Governor Daniel fired back a specific reply to the AFL-CIO's urging to "push the water conservation program."

Water conservation has been on Daniel's "most pushed" projects since gubernatorial campaigning days.

Daniel said, in effect, the new Water Development Board had moved in a cloud of dust to get organized, set up rules, establish procedures, begin hearings and give preliminary approval to two projects—all within 90 days after taking oath of office.

Two projects, if finally approved, would lend \$5,000,000 to the Sabine River Authority for a new lake and \$350,000 to the Williamson County Water District No. 1 for a water diversion project.

TEC IN FUSS PARADE—Internal fusing contagious with state boards has spread to the Texas Employment Commission. AFL-CIO is stoking the fire from outside.

TEC's member representing labor, R. F. Newman, blasted the fuss into orbit by accusing the other two members, Chairman Perry Brown and Maurice Acers, of dealing him out of policy decisions. Brown represents the public and Acers the employers.

Arguments focused initially on policy toward employees within TEC itself. Newman contended morale of TEC's 2,000 employees was shot. They live in fear, he said, of "knife-in-the-back retaliations, salary cuts and demotions when their decisions offend trade groups, corporation lawyers or volunteer legal counselors."

Acers retaliated in a letter to trade organizations and employers charging Newman and "representatives of organized groups" with using the recession to gain their own ends.

That brought AFL-CIO leaders into the fray. State President Jerry Holleman fired back that Acers was flagrantly wasting state funds for propaganda purposes. Acers was

also accused of denying just claims for unemployment compensation and forcing workers to go to court for rightful benefits.

Acers had a reply for that, too. Merely another attempt by AFL-CIO to influence commission policies, he said.

TEC supervises collection of unemployment taxes from employers and payment of benefits to unemployed workers.

NO HELP FROM IKE—More tears than oil flow these days in Texas petroleum circles. President Eisenhower's token tightening of the voluntary oil import quota plan just won't help, oilmen say.

They had pled for an import crackdown to relieve the slump in demand for domestic oil. What they got was "much too little and much too late," said J. J. O'Brien of San Antonio, president of Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association.

Governor Daniel called the action from Washington wholly inadequate. Railroad Commissioner William J. Murray didn't see how the effort could be effective.

Eisenhower's plan called for a minute curtailment of voluntary imports of crude oil but left products untouched and the import door wide open to newcomers.

Texas fields were on a nine-day production pattern throughout March with an eight-day pattern ordered for April.

TWO PLUS TWO—In most educational circles, prime interest has shifted from "Why Johnny Can't Read" to "Why Johnny Can't Calculate the Orbit of a Satellite."

But even before Sputnik, the

State Board of Education set up a special 20-member commission to study the effectiveness of mathematics teaching in Texas public schools.

School administrators, teachers and board members making up the commission began their one-year study at a meeting in Austin. Broad aims are to discover whether requirements are adequate, courses sound and teaching methods effective.

NO BREAK YET—Payments to jobless hit a record high of \$1,568,958 in one week, according to the Texas Employment Commission's latest report.

Number of persons filing compensation claims inched up from 89,309 the previous week to 92,435.

TEC's mid-February report showed some 75,000 persons covered by unemployment insurance out of work. At that time it was hoped that approach of spring would bring the usual pick-up in jobs.

Instead, unemployment has increased more than 20 per cent.

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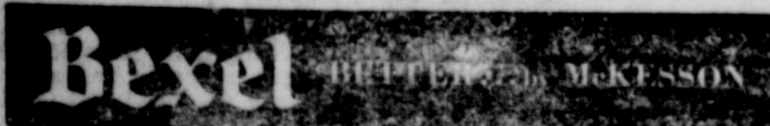

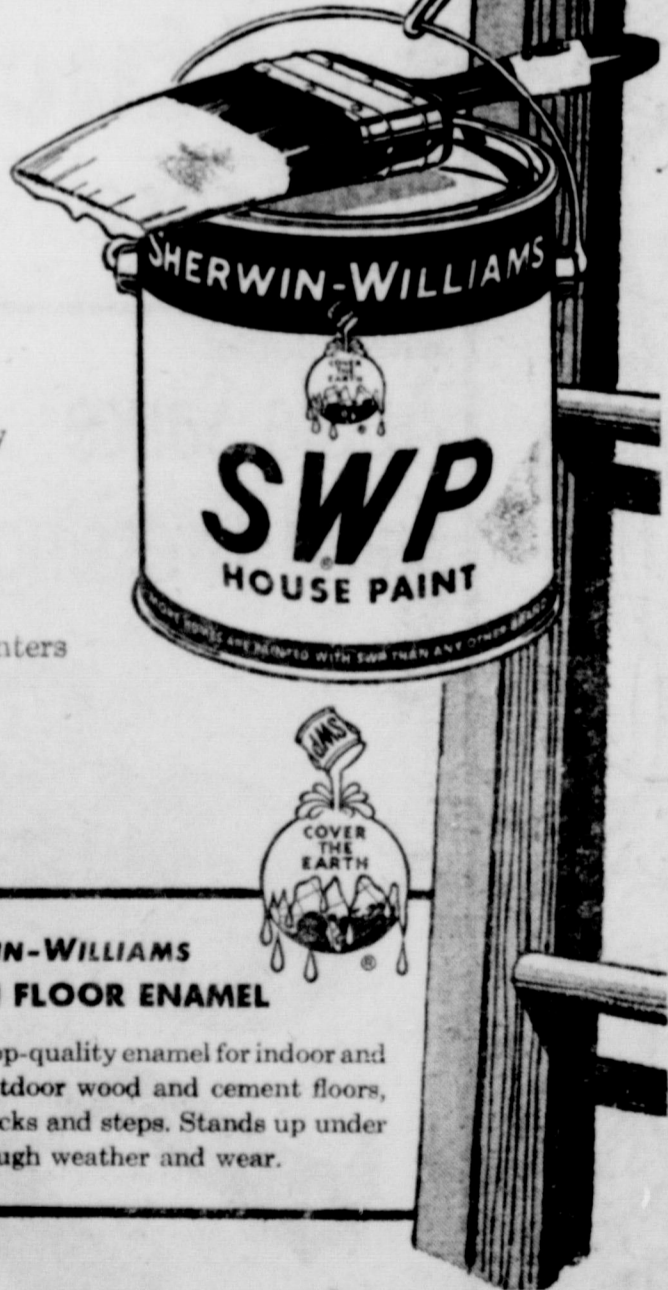

External Parasites Should Be Controlled

College Station—External parasites are a constant menace to livestock and poultry and lower the producers' profits by decreasing production by sucking blood from the animals, transmitting diseases, and causing loss of energy by annoyance.

But there is little excuse for letting these pests exist—something can be done about them, according to a leaflet just released by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service entitled "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry."

The leaflet gives detailed information on some of the more common pests including some of their characteristics and the nature of the damage they do.

It also contains a chart which gives some of the more serious and common parasites of beef cattle, dairy cattle, sheep, goats, swine, and poultry as well as the treatment for these parasites and some interesting remarks about them.

Too, it contains a direction sheet for mixing sprays and the instructions for residues of DDT, methoxychlor, malathion and aversolene in the treatment of certain animals. These substances have been approved by the Pure Food and Drug Administration.

This leaflet can be of much value to any operator who is faced with the problem of controlling external parasites of livestock or poultry. It may be obtained from local county agents or from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Request L-254.
