Sterling Odom, president of the board stated that Coach Gunn has served as head coach at Goldthwaite High School for the past two seasons where he has made an impressive record as one of the district's youngest and most successful coaches.

Coach Gunn, a native of Blanket, is a graduate of Howard Payne College where he majored in math and minored in science and starred as a Yellowjacket athlete.

He is attending Howard Payne College this summer where he is working on his master's degree. Married and the father of an 18-month-old daughter, he and his family will move here about Aug. 1.

New Court House Elevator Is Now in Operation at Baird

A new, 13-passenger, 2,000-pound elevator, installed in the courthouse at Baird, at a total cost of \$35,186.00, went into operation Tuesday of last week, carrying passengers from the basement to the fourth floor.

Its first trip lifted two Callahan County oldsters to the "top." They were "Uncle Joe" Alphin, 90, Baird constable and oldest peace officer in Texas, and Mrs. Ida Carmichael, 89, first school teacher in Callahan County.

She started her teaching in 1877, at an early-day ranch and later taught at Vigo.

At the control was Deputy Sheriff Lee Brown.

According to County Judge Lester Farmer, bids on the project were opened Nov. 25, last year, and a turnkey contract was awarded to C. L. Cook & Son of Abilene.

The elevator was made possible to Callahan County residents without an increase in taxes or necessity of issuing bonds, Judge Farmer stated.

Since the building was erected more than 20 years the way up was by wide stairs. The 42nd District courtroom is on the second floor. The building is four stories high with a large basement and a penthouse on top. The fourth floor was designed for and will ultimately be used as a jail.

B. C. CHRISMAN RETIRES AFTER 52 YEARS WORK WITH SCHOOLS

A veteran Callahan County educator, who taught pupils out of McCutney's Reader, used the "blue-back" speller and the Ray arithmetics, has retired after 52 years of service.

He is Bruce Clay Chrisman, 69, who began his teaching job at Atwell in 1906. He is the son of an early-day Baird school superintendent, the late B. C. Chrisman Sr.

He has taught at Burnt Branch, Cedar Bluff, was superintendent at Putnam and Baird, and was elected Callahan County superintendent of schools in September, 1920. For 27 years he held that post, with four years out as superintendent of the Baird schools. He was appointed county coordinator for the Callahan County Vocational School in 1951, which post he held until his retirement May 1. Lately he has been helping his successor, Jack Scott of Cross Plains, become familiar with the duties.

Chrisman maintains a home in Baird but prefers to spend most of his time on his 295 acres ten miles south of Baird with his herd of Black Angus cattle. His farm tract has been leased. "I'm one cowhand that has no horse," he remarked. "I do my roundups in a flivver."

He was born at Daingerfield, Texas, Feb. 28, 1880. His father was superintendent there and also served for a time with Daingerfield College. The family moved to Baird in 1891 when the elder Chrisman became superintendent of the Baird schools. Young Chrisman attended schools at Moran, May, Rising Star and Putnam when his father served schools at those places. Later he went back to East Texas with his parents. The elder Chrisman taught at Gladewater, where the younger Chrisman resumed studies. In 1906 Mr. Chrisman returned to West Texas and studied at old Britton Training School, commonly known as Scranton Academy. Schoolmates included Joe Burnam, now a professor at Hardin-Simmons University, and Judge J. R. Black of 42nd District Court, Abilene. Summers he attended teachers' normals at Abilene.

"I began teaching at Atwell in 1906 under my father, who was principal there," Chrisman said. Successively he taught at Burnt Branch, Admire, Cedar Bluff and became superintendent at Putnam in 1919. It was while there that he was elected county superintendent. After his hitch as county superintendent and four years as superintendent of Baird schools, Chrisman took the co-ordinator position. For six years he held that post together with the work of teaching distributive education. Presently he serves as County Service Officer.

Once Chrisman had a room full of students—to be exact, 60. "I taught through the gamut from primer to Latin." Contrasting thoroughness, Chrisman inclines to the belief instruction was then more thorough than today. "Especially in mathematics," he added.

He believes consolidation of rural schools with town schools has been good for the pupils but hard on community life. "Some of the smaller schools could not have been maintained," he asserted.

Teaching, he admits, was enjoyable. "But from a financial standpoint, I'd get into something else besides teaching if I had to start over. My first teacher job paid \$35 a month. At Admire I got \$60. The late R. D. Green, Abilene superintendent, helped me to get the Admire school."

Chrisman was teaching when "free" school texts were supplied. "I think it was about 1916."

Plans are complete for the second annual Chamber of Commerce banquet to be held in the school auditorium Friday night of this week.

Dr. Paul Southern, professor of Bible at Abilene Christian College, will be the principal speaker of the evening. Other features of the program will include the introduction of new officers and recognition of the "Outstanding Citizen" of Cross Plains.

Officers and directors elected to serve during the new year, which starts July 1, include: W. J. "Son" Sipes, president; J. C. "Doc" Claborn, vice president; Doyle Burchfield, secretary-treasurer, and L. D. Bayless, Paul Whitton, Jack Tunnell, A. J. McCain and Teddy Souder, directors.

Selection of the "Man of the Year" will be made by a secret committee of three members, and his identity will remain secret until he is honored at the banquet, at which time he will be presented a plaque in appreciation of his civic work in this community.

Program committee members state that Dr. Southern is a forceful and entertaining speaker, and guests are sure to enjoy his address.

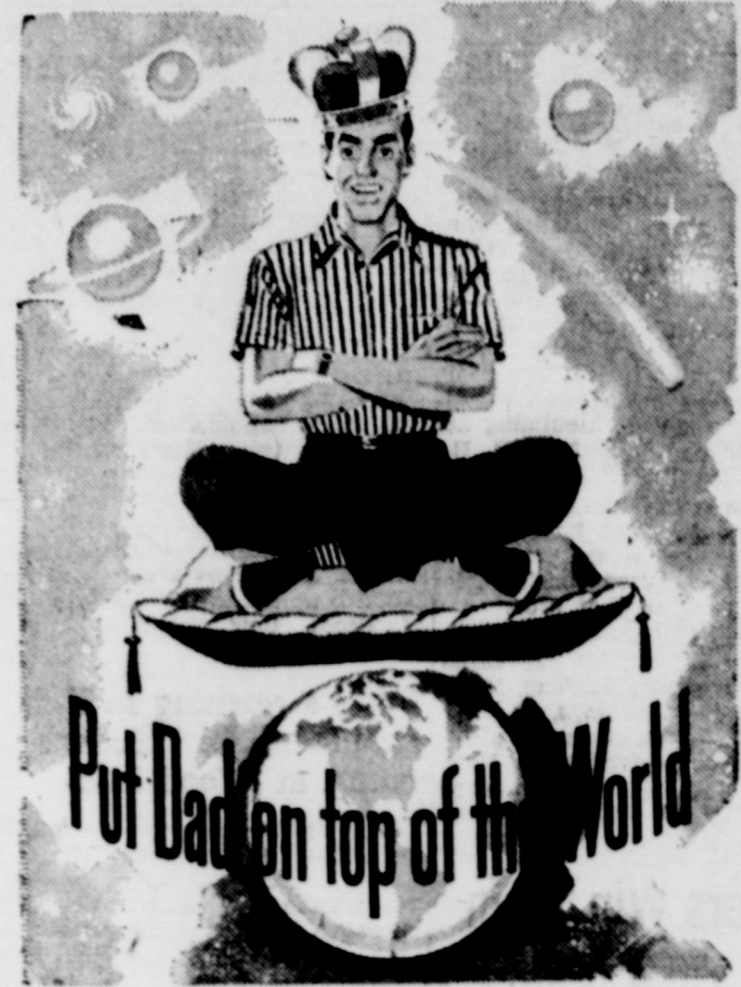

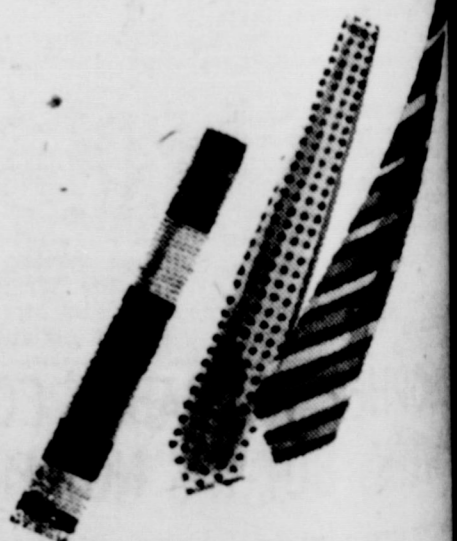

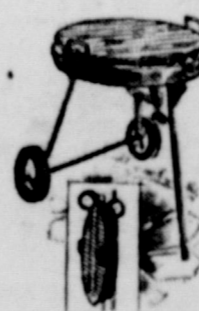

action may mean the difference between destruction and survival. In dollars and cents, our National Security Program now consumes more than 60 cents of every tax dollar. Of the approximate 72 billion dollars budget request, 46 billion dollars goes to national security. This is more than one-half of all the taxes collected by the Federal Government from all sources. Until some of the unnecessary activities of all the military services Washington, D. C.—The Department of Defense and all the military services under it, sometimes

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appear as a centipede with a thousand legs all going in different directions. How important is the President's proposal to reorganize the Defense Department? Perhaps the importance can not altogether be measured in dollars and cents. Even more important, is the ability to make decisions when immediate are curtailed, the bill to the taxpayer will continue to be high. As long as we continue to prepare to fight a war of the nature of World War II, and at the same time prepare for nuclear war of the future, there is little hope that something less than two-thirds of all the income of the Government will not go into defense.

The President's proposal to reorganize the Defense Department places emphasis on decision-making authority and authority to carry out those decisions when made. Under the President's proposal, the Secretary of Defense is to make the great strategic decisions and direct the control of their application. Once a decision is made, it is to be carried out without vetoes or obstructions on down the line. Under present Law and practice, the Secretary of Defense does not have full authority to enforce a decision upon the separate services.

But how are these great decisions to be made? Secretaries of Defense come and go. They are selected from a political list. They may come from banking, law, from professional politics, from the automobile business or the soap business. How does a man who has spent his life in some other endeavor go into the huge Pentagon organization of approximately 39,000 (not including the Armed Forces), hang up his hat, and make proper decisions?

The only way he could possibly know what to do would be to hear the problems explained by qualified experts. If he can not hear and understand the thousands upon thousands of issues involved, he merely endorses the decision of some subordinate. It seems the very real question devolved down to this proposition: Does the proposed reform of our military establishment make it more or less likely that the Secretary of Defense and the President of the United States will hear the great problems argued out thoroughly? Will it enable him to come to a de-

Guard Your Plants Against Bagworms

Ornamental plants infested with bagworms must be treated while the worms are small if effective control of the pests is to be achieved, says Extension Entomologist C. F. Garner. Chemicals applied after the worms are grown give no control.

The worms hatch in the late spring or early summer and the larvae feed on the foliage of ornamental plants. The young worm spins a silken sack and attaches bits of leaves to it as it feeds. The bag is carried by the worm as it moves about. A full grown worm may produce a bag from one and a half to two inches long and once inside the bag, the worm becomes most difficult to control.

The female bagworm remains in the bag and dies after depositing her eggs. The bags should be picked from infested plants and burned because the eggs for next season's worms go through the winter inside the bags. Garner recommends the use of either chlordane or toxaphene as a 10 percent dust. For a spray, he says 40 percent chlordane emulsion concentrate or a 60 percent toxaphene emulsion applied at the rate of one to two tablespoons per gallon of water will give good control if used while the worms are small. Lead arsenate used at the rate of one to two tablespoons per gallon of water is a good spray.

The entomologist suggests that a copy of L-199, Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants, be obtained from the local county agent. It lists controls for insects which normally cause the home gardener the most trouble.

finite and authoritative conclusion with the power of enforcement all the way down the line, resulting in action to carry out that decision? The Congress will soon have before us a bill to enact into law these reforms. The controversy centers on the amount of authority which should be given one man—the Secretary of Defense. Some are saying that to place such authority in one man is embracing the old Prussian type of militarism. The bill voted out of the Armed Services Committee does not give the Defense Secretary the authority requested by the President, but is supposed to give him much of the authority needed to carry out direction.

The proposition that something needs to be done is clear enough. The fact remains that this proposal is not going to appreciably reduce the cost of our military establishment. This will only be done when we finally decide that the next war will not be fought with rifles and bayonets, with huge aircraft carriers like sitting duck, and all the frills now attached to every branch of the military.

move pinpointed the spot where the state's money shortage is expected to pinch hardest—administration of state's services.

A revenue shortage in excess of \$100,000,000 by next year has been freely predicted by various authorities for months.

A survey of the platforms of legislative candidates over the state shows a fairly consistent approach by those making statements on the revenue dilemma. General pattern of promises to voters:

(1) Continuation or, often, increase in state obligations for education, welfare payments, road building, soil and water conservation, etc.

(2) Opposition to certain new taxes or sometimes new taxes in general.

(3) Cuts in state spending by "elimination of waste, duplication and needless services by state agencies."

Actual achievement or near-achievement of this fiscal magic will put a real squeeze on every state department.

NOT ME—Likelihood that someone may draw the "black bean" of new state taxes has group after group telling the State Tax Study Commission how overburdened they are already.

A spokesman for the Texas Motor Bus Association told the commission taxes on that industry are heavy and discriminatory. He said many smaller lines were having to go out of business.

A representative of retired people

asked tax relief for people living on pensions.

"We are no longer concerned with saving the goose that lays the golden eggs. Our goose was cooked when we lost our ability to work and earn," said W. B. Wood of Port Arthur.

On behalf of the Texas Association for Tax Relief for Texans over 65, Wood asked for tax exemption for the first \$3,000 of property owned by oldsters. He also opposed a sales tax.

Discrimination is charged because the law applies to wholesalers but not to producers who sell only the output of their own flocks. Suit also objects to the provision that makes violations a criminal offense and the requirement that eggs kept unrefrigerated for 30 days or more be labeled "cold storage eggs."

REPUBLICRAT—Texas Supreme Court is considering the question of whether a former Democratic candidate is entitled to a position on the Republican primary ballot.

Grover Cantrell, Dallas labor leader and one-time Democratic candidate for the Legislature, attempted to file against Texas' only Republican Congressman, Bruce Alger. He called himself a "Stevenson Republican," an apparent parody of Eisenhower Democrats.

A lower court rules that Cantrell, as a member of one party, was not entitled to seek nomination in another party's primary. Cantrell appealed to the high court.

Since there is usually only one nominee for each office, Republican primaries do not ordinarily attract a heavy vote. It is widely assumed that many Republicans cross party lines to vote in Democratic primaries, where most state offices are decided.

Cantrell's candidacy is generally interpreted as a move to force Republicans to stay in their own primary.

DIESEL TAX CHANGE—Proposed revisions in the diesel fuel tax law are being planned by the State Comptroller's Department.

Next Legislature will be asked to change the law so diesel fuel taxes would be collected from the wholesale distributor rather than the user, said a department official.

This is expected to make it easier for tax agents to keep track of consumption and purchases.

Comptroller's Department staffers admit that there are some evasions of the state motor fuels tax, but contend that Texas collects more per vehicle than any other major state. They discount as too large Senator Charles Herring's guess that some \$25,000,000 in fuel taxes went uncollected.

Senate investigating committee looked into records in the Houston area to discover if small staffs, vague laws or insufficient penalties were causing the state to lose revenue.

HEALTH NOTES

New bread standards go into effect July 1, to assure that you get the kind of bread you pay for.

After that date, if you buy a loaf of cinnamon-raisin bread and it doesn't have raisins in it, the baker is subject to action.

The standards will require all bread and rolls to be properly labeled so as to truthfully reflect their ingredients and nutritious qualities.

Patterned after federal food standards, they will be administered by the State Health Department's Food and Drug Division. A majority of the baking industry fully supports the standards.

Labeling means much more than a colorful wrapping around a loaf of bread. It includes, among other things, the advertising claims made by the baker for his product.

A food is misbranded when its labeling is false or misleading in any particular, if it is offered for sale under the name of another food, or if it is an imitation of another food (unless its label bears in prominent type the word "imitation" and immediately thereafter the name of the food imitated).

Bread is also mislabeled if it purports to be or is represented as a food for which a "standard of identity" has been described and it fails to conform to that standard.

Standards not only protect consumers in the marketplace, they also protect honest manufacturers by assuring fair competition. The consumer may select and serve standardized foods with complete confidence in their composition and integrity.

The law's basic requirement for clean handling, informative labeling and no adulteration gives consumers an insight into the purity, wholesomeness and nutritious quality of the product.

Bread labels must show net weight or numeral count of the product, such as "net weight, one pound," or "one dozen doughnuts," and the name of the product such as, "Smith's Enriched Bread," or "Jones' Raisin Bread."

While there is no specific requirements as to type size, the standards do provide that the label shall be considered false if the information is not prominently displayed in such a manner that it can be easily read.

You, as a consumer of bread and rolls, can help make the new standards work by carefully reading the label on the bread you buy.

Motorists Urged to Help Reduce Highway Mishaps

"Everyone can do more to reduce the appalling number of deaths and injuries on our nation's highways."

In those words, J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association, launched the June phrase of the Slow Down and Live program which is being supported by the Texas Safety Association, with the cooperation of the National Safety Council, to give further support to the nation-wide Back the Attack on Traffic Accidents campaign.

Musick said that every motorist in Texas can help two ways—one, by starting his own personal campaign to cut down on traffic injuries and fatalities by adjusting his driving speed to the conditions of the road, weather, vehicle and himself, and two, by backing stepped up speed control measures by the traffic agencies or police department.

He said that even though drivers stay within the posted speed limit they are still considered speeders if they are driving with their brakes in poor shape or on roads that are wet or crowded. Urging drivers

to keep alert behind the wheel and not to let sleepiness, anger or impatience influence their actions while driving, he also advised against mopey driving which creates traffic delays and sets up accident-causing incidents.

"Improper speed can be a murderous act," Musick said. "Control it and you'll be helping to cut down on deadly and tragic traffic crashes. Speed violations were factors in 57 per cent of all rural Texas traffic accidents in 1957.

"It's better to be outdistanced than outlived, so drive with care."

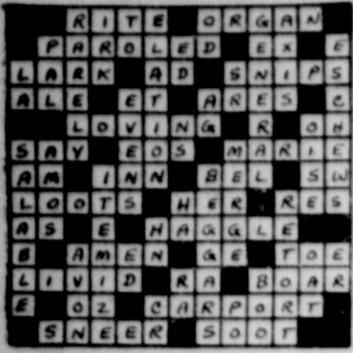
