

## BUFFS LOSE TO DELEON, 6-0; PLAY FIRST HOME GAME WITH GOLDTHWAITE FRIDAY

The Cross Plains Buffaloes lost a hard fought game to the Class AA DeLeon Bears, 6-0, in DeLeon Friday night.

DeLeon managed their lone tally with two minutes 12 seconds left in the ball game. The winning score came via a 72 yard pass from Bearcat quarterback Grady West to end Terry Barnes. Barnes hauled in the aerial on approximately the mid-field stripe and raced straight down the sideline for the touchdown.

A total of 85 yards in penalties hampered the Buff offensive effort greatly, and the host Bearcats threw up a stout defense as the Buffs penetrated deep into DeLeon territory. But the Buffs displayed a much improved brand of football. Spearheading the Buffalo defense was tackle Perry Jennings and guard Johnny Pancake. Center Doyle Oliver and tackle W. A. Morris helped hold the Bearcats to 97 yards gained rushing.

**Bearcats Threaten**  
The Buffaloes received the opening kickoff and promptly picked up two first downs to the Buff 48, but a 15 yard penalty stopped the drive and the Buffs were forced to punt. DeLeon took the pigskin on their own 36 and in nine plays reached the Buff 17. There the Buff defense tightened up, and stopped the threatening drive. Two pass plays sparked the drive covering a total of 24 yards.

**Buff Threaten**  
Cross Plains moved to their own 40 before being forced to punt. Buff halfback Claude Beeler recovered a Bearcat fumble on the first play from scrimmage on the 'Cat's 27 on the last play of the first quarter. Another 15 yard penalty moved the ball back to the Buff 41. Bill Mayes punted to the DeLeon 9.

The Bearcats moved to their own 22 in one play, but fumbled and Buff end Grady Scott claimed the ball for the locals. The locals could not crack the tough 'Cat defense and the ball went over on downs on the DeLeon 16. Both elevens exchanged punts after the Buff threat in the waning minutes of the first half. Halftime score stood, Cross Plains 0 and DeLeon 0.

**Second Half**  
Opening kickoff in the second half hit a Bearcat line man, and Buff Jennings gave him a tussle for control of the pigskin. DeLeon came up with the ball for a first and 10 operating from their own 47. In two plays the Bearcat eleven had moved to the Buff 30. There the locals defense held and the ball came into the Buffaloes hands on their own 35.

After an exchange of punts, it was the Buffs' ball on their own 46. In five plays the Buffs drove to the 'Cat 21. The drive was highlighted by quarterback Bill Mayes' 12 yard ramble around right end to the Bearcat 31, and Beeler's 10 yard blast through the middle to the 21. DeLeon's defense held at that point, and the pigskin went over to the hosts on their 22.

Continuing their threatening ways, on the next play from scrimmage, Buff end Bobby Golson and Guard Johnny Pancake recovered a DeLeon fumble on the hosts' 24. But again an untimely 15 yard penalty moved the ball back to the Buff 39. A Mayes aerial was intercepted on the Buff 13 and ended the threat.

**Buff Again Threaten**  
Early in the fourth quarter, DeLeon attempted to punt from their 37, but a low fourth down pass from center got loose in the Bearcat backfield. Buff reserve center Paul Whitted Jr. headed a host of gold shirred Buffaloes in the chase. Whitted came up with the pigskin on the DeLeon 14. But the Bear-

cats arose to the occasion and manned the barricades, and the ball went over to the 'Cats on their 22. The teams exchanged punts, and Cross Plains took possession of the ball on the Bearcat 30 after the hosts failed in four tries to gain a first down.

Another 15 yard penalty dampened the Buff offense and Mayes punted, but another 15 yards was stepped off against the Buffs and put the ball on the Bearcat 47. On third down DeLeon again fumbled and Golson again recovered for the locals, on the Buffalo 44. Mayes was again forced to punt, and the Bearcats had the ball first and 10 on their 28.

**DeLeon Scores**  
On DeLeon's first play from scrimmage, quarterback Grady West found Bearcat and Terry Barnes behind Buff defenders and planted the pass in his arms at approximately the DeLeon 46. Barnes then raced straight down the sideline for DeLeon's six points with two minutes and 12 seconds left in the game. Buff Grady Scott, angling across field made a desperate attempt to stop Barnes just as he crossed the double stripe. The kick from placement was no good. DeLeon intercepted a Buff aerial on the Cross Plains 21 to end the game.

## Rat Control Program Is Set for Oct. 21-24

A county-wide rat control program will be conducted October 21 through October 24. The Callahan County Commissioners Court, Callahan County Farm Bureau, Vocational Agriculture Departments, The Extension Service, and The Fish and Wildlife Service are co-operating in this rat control drive. A complete schedule of farm demonstration sites will be announced soon. A good non-poisonous rat bait will be available at a nominal price at the farm demonstration.

In the meantime, everyone should take all means available to control their immediate rodent problems. There are some good commercial baits available; trapping is slow but effective to control mice, and the rat and mouse harbors can be eliminated.

### RAIN HERE THIS WEEK TOTALS 1.90 TO GIVE CROSS PLAINS TOTAL OF 20.19 FOR YEAR

Rain falling here Monday and Tuesday of this week totalled 1.90 inches, according to records kept by S. F. "Fos" Bond, observer for the U. S. Weather Bureau.

According to Bond's records, this gives Cross Plains a total of 2.58 inches for the month to date, and brings the total for the year to 16.59 inches.

The moisture will be real benefit to fall pastures and was also welcomed by grain farmers who have planted or are ready to plant small grain and cover crops. The moisture will be sufficient to bring up grains already planted and will also put fresh plowed land in good shape for planting. Some late peanuts will also benefit to say nothing of fall gardens.

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou won't get anywhere with his idea this week, especially with us.

Dear editor:

People are always talking about the ignorant toiling masses in other countries, but I have about come to the conclusion they may be smarter than we think.

Edwin Baum, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the proposed Turkey Creek Water Control and Improvement District, situated in this area of the county, announced this week that directors of the organization have scheduled another public meeting to be held at the school auditorium here tonight (Thursday) and are anxious to have a large representative crowd present to hear the proposal explained and discussed by personnel of the Soil Conservation Service and members of the board of directors.

An election will be held at the city hall here Saturday, Sept. 27, when all resident landowners in the proposed district will ballot on whether or not they want to create the district on a permanent basis and temporary directors are anxious to have everyone informed on the benefits of the district.

If okayed by landowners, the district will enter into an agreement with the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District for a complete flood control program on the watershed of Turkey Creek and the Federal Government will construct a series of approximately 10 water retaining dams on the creek and its tributaries between its head and Pecan Bayou at absolutely no cost to the local district.

Notice of election on the project appears on another page of this edition of The Review, and landowners involved in the district are urged to read it. Directors are asking for the right to issue bonds not to exceed \$15,000.00 for the purpose of defraying the cost of organizing the district and to have a source for the maintenance and operation of the detention dams after they are constructed. A tax of four cents (4c) per \$100.00 valuation is asked to repay the bond issue.

Make plans to be at the meeting tonight and hear this program explained by men who are experts in the field.

## Conditions Favorable for Fall Vegetable Gardens

Recent rains have provided moisture needed for soil preparation and the planting of fall gardens, says Blueford Hancock, extension horticulturist. If planted now snap beans, lima beans, squash, and the leafy green vegetables should produce good crops before frost.

Soil should be prepared now for later plantings of turnips, collards, kale, swiss chard and broccoli, says the specialist. If only a small area is to be planted, he says a hand rake can be used to smooth the seedbed. Because most vegetable seed are small, it is necessary to break up clods and plant them in a firm smooth bed in order to obtain a good stand.

Vegetables planted now will insure a good supply through the late fall and winter months and provide the family with the green and leafy vegetables they need for a good diet, says Hancock.

The specialist advises those who may desire more information on fall and winter gardening problems to visit county extension agents for advice and free publications.

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN.—Texas Democrats now look toward 1960, the year some think they might nominate the next U. S. President.

And added to the party's tumultuous history is the 1958 Democratic convention. It was billed as a "harmony" meet, but more resembled a family reunion to fight over grandpa's will.

Gov. Price Daniel's liberal foes are hotter under their collars than ever, but despite their noisy opposition, the governor "ruled the roost" in San Antonio. And, with an executive committee acceptable to him and a platform reflecting his views, he holds the reigns of party leadership for two years.

U. S. Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson

and Speaker Sam Rayburn also were honored by the conventioners. Johnson was urged to become a presidential candidate.

Test in the struggle between Daniel's supporters and the liberal DOT faction championed by U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough came over the selection of a presiding officer. Congressman Frank Icard of Wichita Falls, with the support of Senator Johnson, Speaker Rayburn and a comfortable majority of delegates, snowed under Corsicana Judge Jim Sewell.

But the real grudge being nursed by the Yarborough faction was over the bouncing of two executive committee nominees selected by the delegates from their districts. They

were replaced, on the recommendation of the nominations committee and vote of the convention, by people regarded as more friendly to the governor.

Liberals, who haven't been "in" with a Texas governor for years, have fought bitterly against this traditional veto over the make-up of the executive committee. They feel the committee members should be like a legislature, reflecting the varying views of the sections which elect them.

Having lost out on this, as in 1956, they howled protests and finally stomped out, as before, promising revenge.

LEADERS—Jim Lindsey of Texas will serve a second term as chairman of the Democratic executive committee. So will Mrs. R. Max Brooks of Austin as vice-chairman.

J. Ed Connally of Abilene succeeds Jake Jacobsen, the governor's administrative assistant, as secretary.

Forty of the 62-member committee are newly elected.

PRINCIPALS—States rights and co-operation within the official party framework were stressed in the Democratic convention resolutions.

Delegates resolved against: (1) Unauthorized use of the name, Democrats of Texas, by the DOT, (2) "overstepping of power" by the U. S. Supreme Court, (3) use of military troops to enforce school desegregation, (4) state income or sales taxes, (5) excessive foreign imports and (6) federal aid to schools.

They favored (1) enactment of laws to prevent members of one political party from voting in the primary of another and (2) Governor Daniel's platform for the next two years.

REPUBLICANS AGREE—Delegates to the GOP convention had little difficulty uniting on a "Down with the Democrats!" platform.

Conservative Democrats, they declared, must join with the Republicans to keep the country from going completely socialistic.

With apparent nervousness, the Republicans adopted a "kid gloves" resolution on school segregation. They recommended the "solution in Texas be left to the people, the school boards and courts within this state."

Another resolution swatted at Democratic officeholders who failed to support states rights legislation in the last session of Congress.

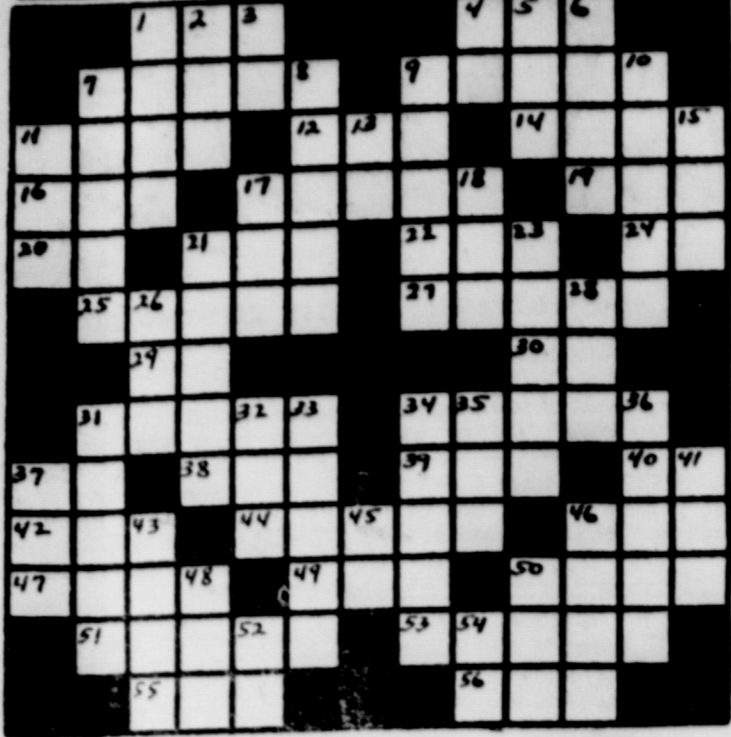
Republicans also affirmed their approval of Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson and their disapproval of federally financed hydro-electric dams.

SAME PAY, DIFFERENT WAY—Beginning this month, members of the State Board of Insurance are to be paid \$50 per working day rather than a straight \$15,000 a year.

This was Attorney General Will Wilson's ruling on a subject that was—and still is—a cause of strong feeling among legislators.

When the Insurance Department reorganization bill was being considered last session, House members

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strongly favored a full-time board. Senate was just as set on a part-time board.

Final compromise was a measure which said the board should be full-time for the first year, with each member receiving \$15,000. Beginning in September, 1958, it was to become part-time, with each member receiving \$50 per day. Up to 300 working days a year (worth \$15,000) was authorized.

Actually, to work 300 days out of 365 the board would have work Saturdays and holidays—or else give up vacations.

And an influential senator has openly implied there may be trouble if the board doesn't comply with "legislative intent" that it serve part-time. Board members object strongly, say the work involved is at least a full-time job.

"SPEAKERS" STILL SPAT—So tense and tight is the race for Speaker of the House that the possibility of winning with Republican backing has become an issue.

Rep. Joe Burkett of Kerrville has accused present Speaker Waggoner Carr of Lubbock of seeking support among the GOP candidates for House posts.

Twenty-nine Republicans are opposing Democratic nominees for House posts. Conceivably, if a few or maybe even none, of the Republicans won, his could be the deciding vote.

SERUM SHIPMENTS DEFENDED—A ban on airmail shipment of serums, vaccines and diagnostic specimens could be "disastrous," says State Health Commissioner Henry A. Holle.

A proposed amendment to postal regulations would allow airlines to refuse to carry such items. Dr. Holle said he felt danger to handling personnel was small compared to the crippling effect such a regulation would have on the machinery for combating disease outbreaks. "Numerous cases could be cited," he said, "where rapid transit was essential for diagnosis and identification."

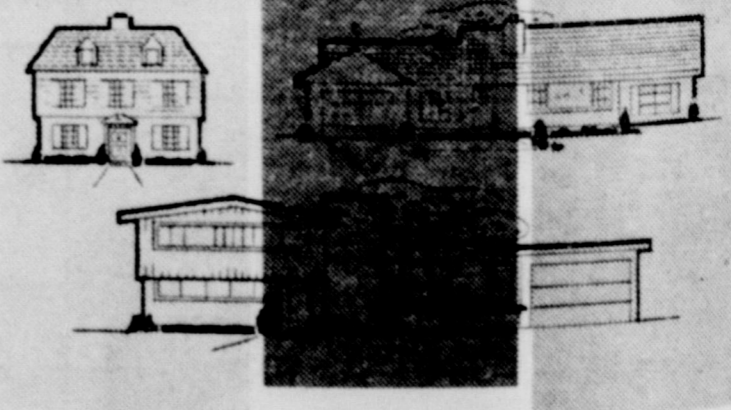
