

And a few programs set up to help these people into better housing are handicapped because there isn't enough money available to properly do the job. In addition, funds haven't been available at all under past programs for building homes in rural areas, in small towns and

on the farms. Believing that something must be done about these needs as quickly as possible, I have joined in spon-soring The Housing Act of 1959, which I feel will provide for them. It will extend and expand such programs as Federal Housing Ad-ministration insurance authorization, contracting authority for public housing, low-rent public housing, a revolving fund for college housing loans, and direct loans to veterans. But the biggest change in the law provided by the bill is the direct loan to veterans provision which provides credit for building homes in small towns and on the

In the past, federal credit for housing has helped force people off the farms and out of the small towns and into the cities, simply by furnishing credit for home-building in the cities, and denying it in the country. This is more than another housing bill—this is a than another housing benefits, and give the country man a square credit deal with the big city home buyer.

It will help stop the flight of people from the small towns to the cities by furnishing long time low interest rate credit for home build-

ing in the country.

The need for quick action in these programs is painfully clear. For example, there are now more than 50,000 veterans who have asked for loans to build their own homes, but, because of a lack of money available, haven't had their applications approved yet. These loans can be made only in areas where credit is not available from other sources. This bill, among many other things, proposes 300 million dollars be made available to clear up this backlog and help these veterans and their families get their





Washington, D. C. peculation in Washington centers around the Government's spending program. In the weeks and months to come we will hear a lot of talk about Government economy, but few here expect any sizeable cut in spending. Both political parties concede there is little chance of reducing spending, but seemingly each hopes to place the blame on the other for outgo in excess of income. The President has submitted a balanced budget, but it is filled with "ifs."

Members of Congress want to provide everything their constitueny requests, but they also favor economy. Most of us talk about economy in places far removed from our own State, and particularly our own Congressional District. When it gets down to home, our tone changes. The same is pretty much true of individuals and communities from North to South and East to West. For instance, the American Municipal Association, an organization of more than 1,200 mayors and other top officials, recently meeting in Boston, Mass., urged more Federal funds for urban renewal, civil defense, water pollution control, local airports, depressed areas, training public health workers and other grant-in-aid benefits from the Federal Govern-

In a similar meeting in 1958 only wo mayors of the larger cities of the country were of the opinion that Federal grants should be increas-All the others were for in-At about the same time, out of 36 of the 48 governors in a meeting, only two were of the opinion that certain taxes should be relinquished by the Federal Government to the States for the purpose of reducing grants-in-aid.

With these two forces-that is, the desire on the part of Congress to furnish more aid to local governments, and local governments demanding more aid-it would not seem logical that Government spending would be reduced.

With national defense needs taking up about 60 per cent of the entire \$77 billion budget, this makes the choice of what to reduce considerably slimmer. Considering the fixed expenditures of the Federal Government, such as approximately \$8 billion as interest on the Public Debt, there are not very many expenses to be reduced, even at best. This does not mean that the 60 per cent for defense expenditures is sacred, but it does mean there is less chance of reducing this big bite than any other

area of spending. Probably ureless information, but interesting-A survey by the Baptist Free Press, the news agency of the Southern Baptist Convention, dated January 4, 1959, reveals that the new Congress (House of Representatives and the Senate), numbering 534, is composed of numerous religious affiliations. There are 90 Methodists, the largest single eligious group. Second in number ere Roman Cathelics with 79. Baptists are third in number, with 62. Then comes Presbyterian with 56 and Episcopalians with 51. The Church of Christ has four in the House, but none in the Senate. Of the 534, 79 list no religious af-filiation. It is supposed that a fairly sizeable number of these are

of the Jewish faith, but not listed. Occupations in the Congress cover just about every human activity, but lawyers greatly predominate, The nature and disposition of the Congress as a whole is sometimes strange, but most times predictable. At times there will be almost complete unity on issues which have the appearance of being controversial, but at other times there ere about as many opinions as there are members on matters which seem routine in the beginning. At times it is a warm and receptive body, and at others cold and calculating. It is probably its own severest critic, and the test of a member is not what he has done before or what he is going to do. out what he can do right now.

By and large, the 534 members of the House of Representatives and United States Senate are dedicated men, doing what they believe to be right for their country and the people whom they represent.

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
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
