



# **HIGGINBOTHAM'S**

We have all seen and have been concerned about the towns of Texas which prosperity has passedthose communities that are growing maller instead of larger.

Unfortunately, we have quite a umber of little Texas towns where people are having a difficult time naking ends meet. Boarded-up store windows and deserted farm nomes are mute evidence of a byone better day for these areas. The best way of stopping the slow death of these once prosperous communities is to help each town help tself. Since our state is blessed with rich natural resources, many these communities could build or attract substantial new indus-But it is frequently impossible for a town that has gone downhill to raise necessary funds for surveys, sites, and construction necessary for establishing new industry. Ye: new industry mean vital new jobs and new payrolls. Loan funds needed to help get these towns and areas back on their feet are provided in a bill which I am co-sponsoring called the Depressed Areas Act. The portion of this act applicable to rural redevelopment establishes a \$100 million revolving fund from which loans could be made for local industrial development projects.

Under this plan, the town's leaders would decide what type of industry could best be located in the area, and then can apply for a loan to set up or attract such an industry. This bill is especially deigned to help these small towns which cannot obtain industrial capital from other sources.

The loan would help create the factory which would create the jobs which would give the city's residents more money to spend with their hometown businesses, thus improving the town and our state. Please notice I am speaking of loans. There are a few grants for public facilities included in this measure, but primarily the assistance would be provided in the form of loans. These loans must be repaid. This means this is an investment program rather than a pending program. In my opiaion, this bill would be

of great benefit to some areas of Texas.

If you are interested in wildlife photography, you can really have a field day around one of these parks.
