Its major effect would be on automobile insurance. It is similar to he rate regulatory law which is in ffect in most other states.

Sponsor of the legislation, Senator Jarrard Secrest of Temple sharpv criticized the present Texas law, erming it "antiquated and unfair to he insurance buying public.'

Senator Secrest said the present aw, under which all companies have to charge the same fixed rate set by the state, did not permit competition among insurers, and penalized good drivers by making them pay the same rates as reckless drivers.

"Many economically operated insurance companies could and would sell insurance at rates substantially below the rate set by the State if the law permitted them to do Senator Secrest said.

"As a matter of fact," he added, 'a recently completed study of an authoritative, thoroughly reputable insurance actuary shows conclusively that the savings for Texas policyholders would amount to some \$34 million per year." Senator Secrest emphasized two

other phases of the proposed legislation. He said it would permit insurance companies to offer merit rating plans, and would give the board sufficient authority to prevent "trick" or confusing policies.

Merit rating plans, the Senator explained, are plans under which the rate a policyholders pays for his insurance is determined by his driving record. Thus, a person with no accidents would pay a substantially lower rate than one who was accident-pront or reckless. To prevent "trick" policies the

board would be authorized to specify certain coverages that must be in all policies. This would eliminate any confusion as to the basic pol-icy content. At the same time, however, any company which wanted to do so could offer broader insurance coverage. Under the present uniform law, all companies must use exactly the same policy form and are not permitted to sell broader


coverage "Many companies could sell much broader coverage at the same or even a lower rate than they are now forced to charge for the restricted coverage, if the law permitted," Senator Secrest asserted.





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
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
