Stockmen Organize County Predator Control Ass'n.

Callahan County has just accepted a new organization. It is called the Callahan County Predator Control Association.

Twenty-seven ranchers, representing every community in the county, gathered to set up the new organization. Its purpose is to promote the control of all predatory animals, with special emphasis on those varmints which prey on sheep and goats.

As the first order of business the group elected Ray Alderman of Baird its president.

The group then voted to assess each member 3 cents per head for each goat or sheep owned.

The group passed a resolution praising the work of the government trapper, J. R. Barron, of Clyde. Mr. Barron was commended on the good work he has done in bringing several species of predatory animals under control.

The group decided that each member would contact his neighbors who own sheep and goats and influence them to join the organization.

It was felt that only through organization and pooling of funds could the mission of the group be accomplished.

All sheep and goat owners in the county are urged to contact Mr. Alderman at Baird, if they wish to participate in the program.

I hate to disabuse this fellow, and while I don't know anything about farming in this part of the country, I have to report that the supply of government oxygen tents must have run out before they got out to this Johnson grass farm. I've got plenty of oxygen out here, but it's not tented, it's right out in the open under the sun, frequently mixed with a little dust. However, agricultural oxygen tents sound good to me. In fact, if the government has got some, why don't they make enough to go around? Ain't this a democracy were living in? Riding a tractor under an air-conditioned oxygen tent would go a long way toward solving one of the worst phases of the farm problem, which is going up one row and down another under a hot sun breathing dust. 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## Oat Trouble Said to Be Yellow Dwarf

College Station.—Yellow dwarf, a virus disease of oats, wheat and barley, has hit many fields, mostly in central, north central and to a lesser degree in the Rolling Plains areas of Texas. Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist, says that oat plants infected with the disease have been sent to the diagnostic laboratory from Denton on the north to Navasota on the south and that fields in the Stephenville area seem hardest hit.

Under some conditions the disease has been called red leaf. Infected oat plants have a characteristic salmon-pink to red color and the plants are dwarfed. The degree of dwarfing, points out Smith, depends on the stage of growth reached by the plant at the time of infection.

When a plant is infected immediately after coming up, it may be dwarfed so severely that it will fail to head. Reduced spike formation and filling of kernels may result from midseason infection. Plants infected at later stages of growth may not suffer serious damage, says Smith. The disease is more difficult to diagnose in closely grazed fields, he adds.

The disease is spread by aphids. Known carriers include the corn leaf and apple grain aphids and the small grain green bug. Smith says that control measures should be applied for green bugs if they are present in large numbers, but little or no control over the virus can be expected since the plants are already infected.

Smith says no adapted resistant varieties of oats, barley or wheat are now available. Since the spread is caused by aphids, a check of oat fields in the fall for aphid build-ups

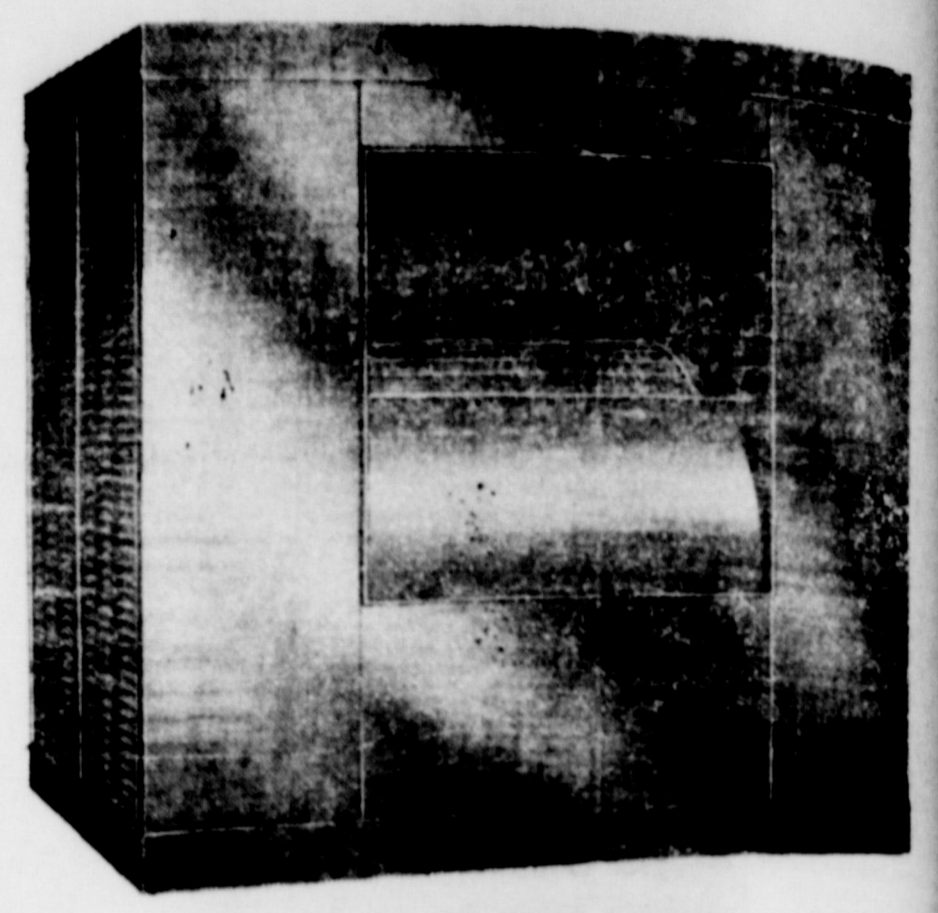

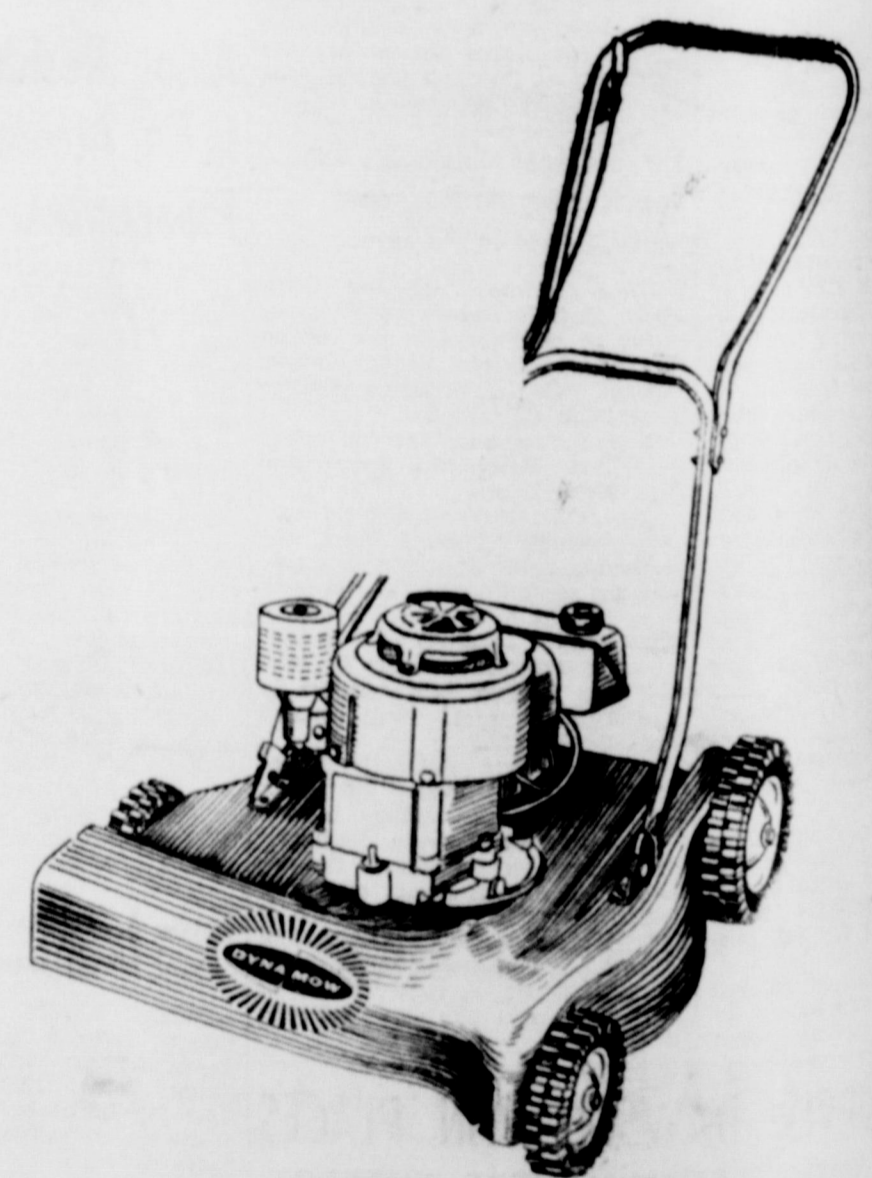

**HOMESTEAD MAY BE SOLD FOR TAXES**

Many Texans have the mistaken impression that their homestead can not be seized and sold for delinquent taxes. In many cases, this idea has led to considerable grief and monetary loss which could have been avoided. A homestead should be rendered to tax assessors, like any other property, and taxes assessed against it should be paid as faithfully as those on any other taxable property.

The deadline for rendering property for taxation is April 1, so far as mos. city taxing agencies are concerned. The last date for rendering real and personal property for state and county taxes is April 30. State taxes are collected by the County Tax Collector.

Under the Texas Constitution, each family is entitled to claim one piece of real property as their homestead. This claim must be established by an affidavit filed with the county tax assessor on or before April 30, each and every year. This affidavit must be filed by the owner himself. A lending agency can not do so, even though it may actually pay the annual taxes thereon from a fund created by the owner's monthly installments.

When the homestead affidavit is properly filed, the owner becomes entitled to an exemption of state taxes up to the value of \$3,000 or 200 acres in the case of farm lands. This is an exemption from payment, not a complete exemption from rendition and assessment. There is no similar exemption with reference to city taxes, or to county taxes, except in certain counties levying a special 30-cent farm-to-market and lateral road tax.

The homestead claimed for tax purposes need not be the property which is actually occupied by the owner as his residence.

When the homestead affidavit is not filed by April 30, the taxpayer loses his right to the \$3,000 or 200-acre exemption, and consequently becomes liable for more taxes than he would otherwise be required to pay.

Property taxes are assessed against the person who is the record owner of each piece of real and personal property on the first day of January of each year. Individuals purchasing property during the year should make sure that the taxes for all previous years have been paid. Otherwise, the purchaser may be forced to pay hundreds of dollars in delinquent taxes to protect his property. Unpaid taxes create a lien against the property which can be enforced regardless of change of ownership.

One should also keep in mind to make some arrangement for the previous owner to pay his pro-rata share of taxes for the current year. Otherwise, the buyer may find it necessary to pay the entire taxes for that year.

When taxes are not paid by the deadline prescribed for the particular taxing unit (city, county, State or district), monetary penalties and interest are added from month to month. In addition, the property becomes subject to seizure and sale to satisfy the tax lien. This lien applies to all property, whether

homestead or not.

Incidentally, there are 350,000 other North Texans who have not filed their tax return. These taxpayers owe money, Internal Revenue time to file on April 16 when a penalty is due.

The tax folks sum up their advice to the 600,000 who haven't filed their 1958 tax return with the following: "FILE NOW."

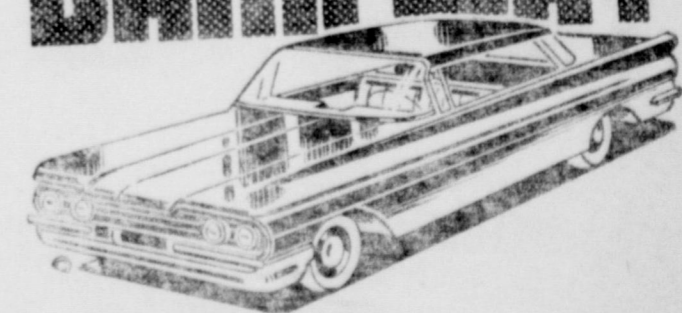

Hey, Mr. Fisherman! If you like to try out the new, see a huge expanse of water, and rough it a bit at the same time, we know the very spot for you.

It is Falcon Lake, fifty miles south of Laredo. Here a lake some 30 miles long and about five miles wide straddles the international boundary line between the United States and Mexico.

Falcon is a primitive lake, with fishing conditions unusual in every respect.

This lake was created when the International Boundary Commission built a dam across the Rio Grande. International boundary monuments were placed down the middle of the lake so that the boundary between the two countries might be well marked.

Brush, which consisted of mesquite, cat's claw, huisache and cactus was left in the bottom of the lake. Two towns were moved from the banks of the river to higher ground, but many of the old buildings remain standing. Today the old town of Zapata is almost completely inundated, while old Guerrero on the Mexican side stands about half out of water.

Some of the rock walls have tumbled down, and these old buildings now afford wonderful habitat for big bass.

At first it was feared there would be no bass in the lake. Commercial fishermen hit it heavy and haul-

ed thousands of pounds of rough fish. Then suddenly there was an explosion of bass, both blacks and whites.

Last year they were barely keepers. This year plenty of them run from two to four pounds, and quite a few six and eight pound hunkers are being taken. Also, many young bass are hooked. Sometimes you get one that isn't as big as the lure it hits.

This is direct evidence that there are at least two spawns a year in this, the southernmost Texas lake. At that rate it will continue to be a hot fishing spot despite the heavy pressure.

Up until now most of the big bass have been caught on three types of lures—Juggin' Eels, Hawk Extractors and Bombers.

However, the time is here when the bass will begin hitting top water lures. With a few days of warm weather, and provided there are no disturbing floods, the next 30 days will produce some terrific catches.

There is a perfect highway to Falcon Lake. The two towns where accommodations can be had are Zapata and Falcon Heights. Neither of these towns, however, can begin to take care of the heavy influx of fishermen. Sportsmen are going there by airplane, automobile and bus.

Motor accommodations in the area are very limited. If you plan to make a trip to Falcon Lake,

you'd better begin right now to make your reservations. And it is almost impossible to get in on a weekend even with a month's advance notice.

There also is a scarcity of boats. Many fishermen take their own boats and motors, and it's a wise procedure unless you want to fish from the banks.

Frankly, it is a lake for big motors. Unfortunately, access is very limited. Some of the planners didn't use a recreational yardstick in measuring its values. Also when the State Highway Department built bridges across arms of the lake, it failed to do enough bulldozer work in making launching ramps alongside the bridges.

Although there is plenty of fishing water on the United States side, approximately two-thirds of the lake is in Mexico. A thirty-day Mexican license costs only 80 cents, however.

One good thing in favor of Lake Falcon is that prices haven't gone sky-high, as yet. Room rent and meals are well in line.

This time next year there will be more accommodations at the lake. So many fishermen will go there this year that capital is certain to move into and provide ample facilities.

It will be interesting to watch the results for a few years. Chances are very good that Falcon Lake will produce bass equal to Florida and in numbers beyond the fondest dream of the ordinary fisherman.

Covers For Treble Hooks—Ever try to untangle a jumbled up mess of fishing lures? Fun, isn't it?

Man, there's nothing more disgusting. And that's not all. It's almost impossible to separate even a few lures without barb-marking

the finger a few times.

Then too, if you've ever stuck a treble-hook lure in your pocket, and later on tried to remove it—oh boy!

Anyway, Jack Braniff is your friend in need. Jack, who works at Mercy Hospital in Pleasanton, Texas, has come up with a simple solution that makes one wonder why he hadn't thought of it himself years ago.

Jack has invented an aluminum, triangular shaper cap that fits snugly over the treble hook. You squeeze the aluminum cap just enough to make it fit over the hook—and there you are.

He calls them Jak-etts. And he points out that they not only eliminate the messy tackle box and make lures safe to carry in the pocket, but they also clean, sharpen and straighten the hooks

Equally as important, they protect children from injury.

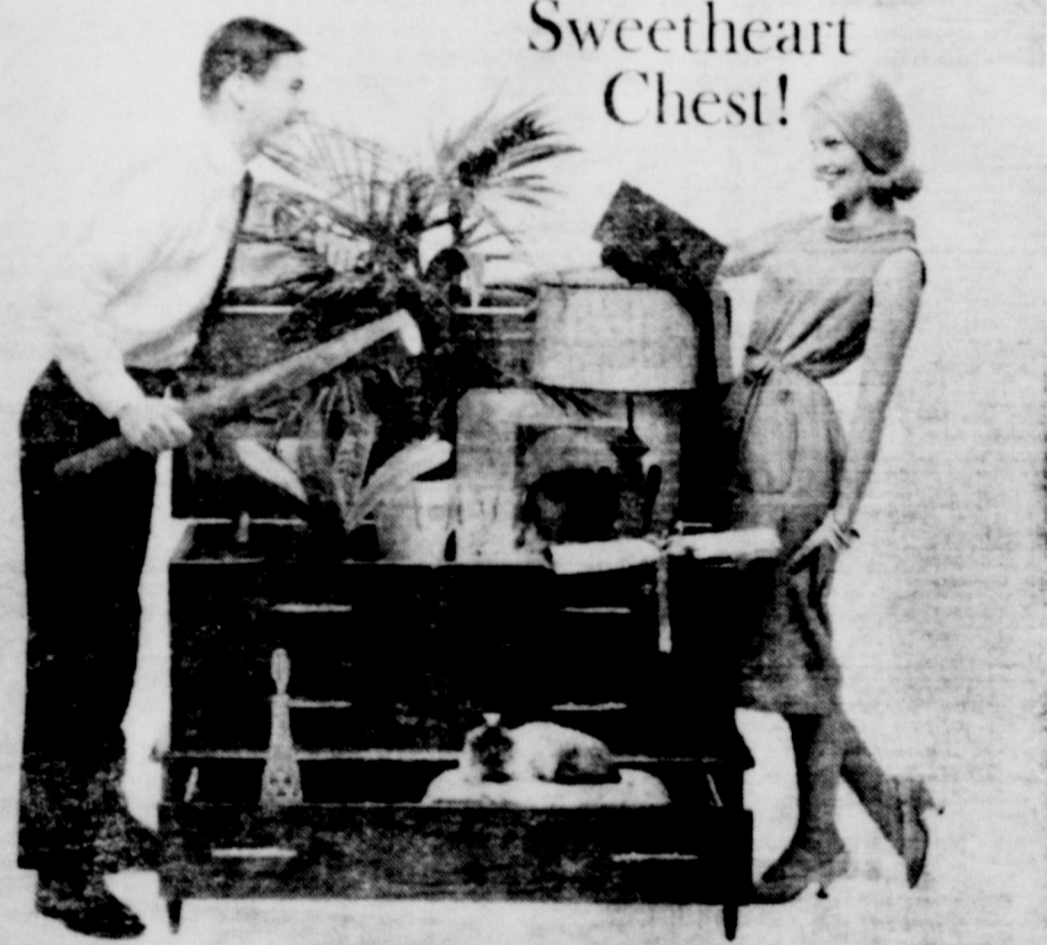

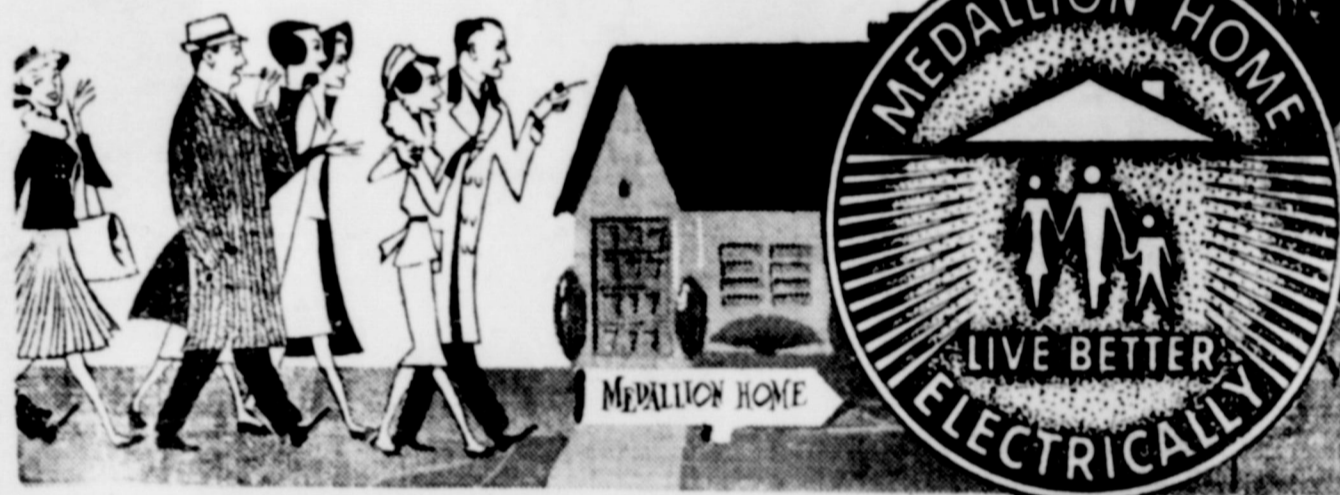

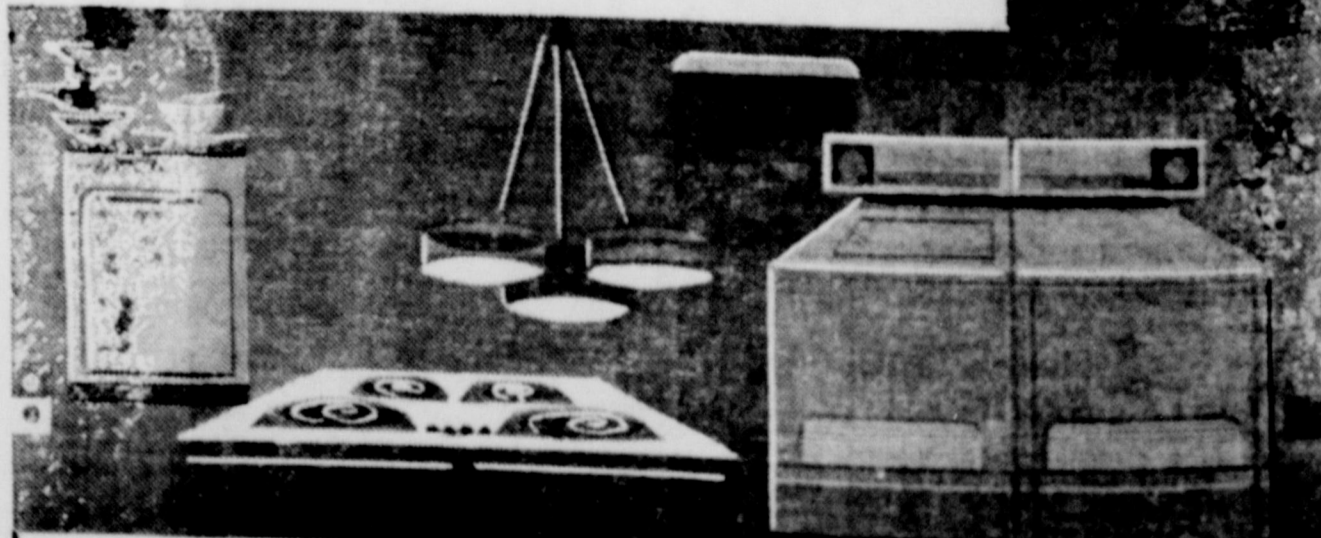

Carr told House members, Texas must raise \$300,000,000 in new money to meet its obligations, he said. On "how to do it," the speaker made these suggestions and observations:

1. A bill is needed "which will include a broad array of selective taxes—including, but not confined to—selective sales taxes."

2. A general sales tax is "out." Lawmakers will—and should—keep their promises not to pass one.

3. "Broad" taxation would include upping levies in areas suggested by the governor—natural gas, liquor, cigarettes, corporations—but at a lower rate than suggested by the governor. In addition, many new items would be added, in keeping with the "spread thin, hurt little" principle.

4. "Piece-meal taxation" is unfair, inadequate to the present challenge. State government should not "reward political favorites." New taxes should be "spread across as much of the Texas economy as possible."

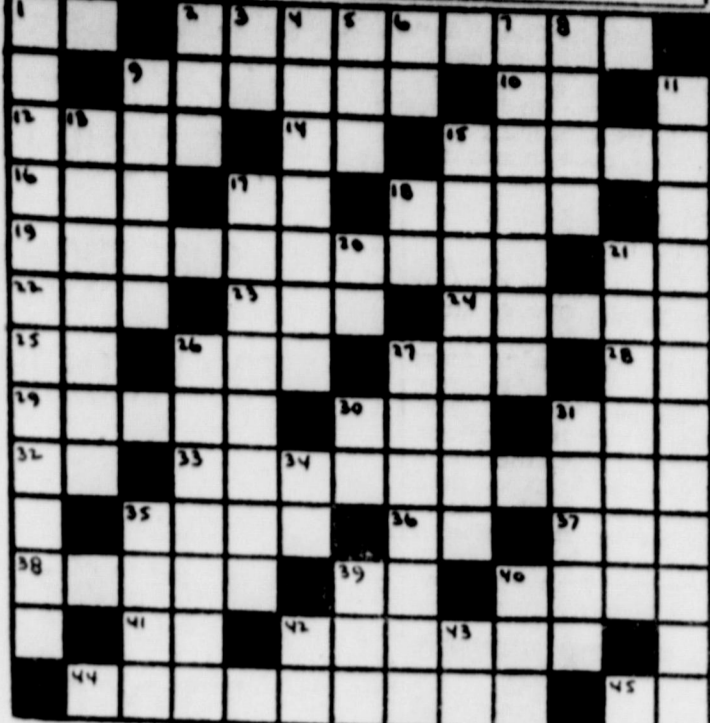
5. Likewise on appropriations. If college professors and state employees get a raise, public school teachers should, too.

Given the task are Reps. Wesley Roberts of Lamesa, H. J. Blanchard of Lubbock, Joe Burkett of Kerrville, Ben Atwell of Dallas and Warren C. Cowen of Fort Worth.

Abandoned Property Bill—Governor's abandoned property bill has been reported favorably by the House Tax Committee, but sponsors claim it has been "guttled" by committee action.

As originally proposed, the bill would have allowed the state to take over bank accounts and money and property held by banks, insurance companies, oil and gas companies, etc., if unclaimed for seven years.

As amended, the measure cut out all holdings except bank accounts and upped the waiting period to 20 years.

Rep. Marshall O. Bell of San Antonio, sponsor, said this would take away 60 per cent of the revenue raising possibilities.

Texas in 1980—Creation of a vast "government center" that would cover most of an area seven blocks long and four blocks wide is the aim of the Capitol Hill Master Plan.

Legislators, whose assent will be needed to make the dream a reality, got a preview of the 20-year plan from architect and Building Commission members.

Governor Daniel said the \$37,000,000 project could be financed with no new taxes. Income, he said, would come from the Confederate pension fund, funds of state agencies now paying rent for privately owned buildings and funds now available to the Building Commission.

Recommended steps for 1960-61 are buying up several more blocks of land and remodeling the Capitol to provide offices for House members.

Party Registration Fight—A watered-down party registration bill is in line for House consideration after approval of the Elections Committee.

Original proposal by Rep. Jamie Clements of Crockett would have required that a voter state his party preference and have stamped on his poll tax at time of purchase. Therefore, the carrier of a "Republican receipt" could not vote in a Democratic primary and vice versa.

Attorney General Will Wilson ruled this unconstitutional. He said it set up requirements for voting not authorized in the constitution.

As amended, the measure provides that a voter would have his primary or participated in party receipt stamped when he voted in conventions. This would prevent his participating in the convention of a different party until he bought a new poll tax.

Liberal Democrats, particularly DOT spokesmen, were very dissatisfied, even call the attorney general's opinion "dead wrong."

Help For Buses—In this two-car-in-every-garage age, public transportation companies say they've fallen into hard times, and need tax relief.

A bill to lower the license fees on motor buses to a rate equal to trucks of the same weight has Senate Transportation Committee approval. It is sponsored by Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas.

City transit companies are asking to be relieved of motor fuel taxes. Rep. Warren C. Cowen of Fort Worth is sponsoring a measure to do this.

Transit companies are caught in a cost squeeze, say supporters, that make it hard to continue serving people at reasonable rates. San Antonio transit lines had to give up, were taken over by city government.

Sunday Sale Ban—Senate has given final approval to a measure that would prohibit selling, buying or trading motor vehicles on Sunday.

Exempted would be persons who observe some day other than Sunday as the Sabbath, such as Seven-

th Day Adventists.

Bill had lively opposition from several senators whose argument was that it would "restrict competition in the name of Christianity."

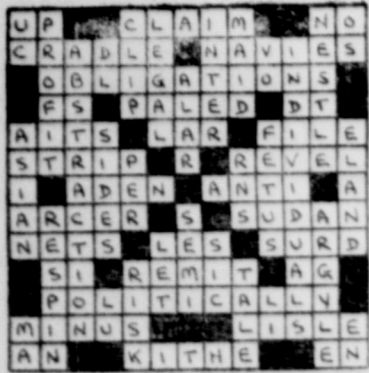
