PHILOSOPHER THINKS POLAND'S FARMERS USING HORSES MAY NOT BE SO DUMB

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou discusses the foreign situation this week, you might say.

Slow, soaking rains have fallen over this community almost daily for the past week, and totaled 4.98 on the U. S. Weather Bureau gauge kept here by S. F. (Pos) Bond. The rains started falling here late Wednesday afternoon of last week and precipitation in some amount has been gauged daily through Tuesday of this week, with 92 reported Tuesday afternoon.

The fall here was so slow and gentle that Turkey Creek did not catch enough run-off water to "run."

The fall varied a great deal over this territory with some communities reporting much heavier rains. The Sabanno and Cross Cut communities reported heavy rain Tuesday. A. C. Evans of the Sabanno community reported 4.90 inches Tuesday morning for a four-day total of 7.80. E. L. Buzbee of Cross Cut reported 6.50 inches fell there Tuesday morning to give that area a four-day total of 9.00 inches.

Heavy rains falling in the Pioneer area sent creeks on the rampage and flood waters swirling over the spillway at the lake at Lakewood Country Club in that community threatened to wash out the earthen spillway.

A deluge measuring 3.80 fell in the Rising Star area between 8:00 a. m. and noon and sent Coppas Creek which winds through that city on a rampage. Flood waters swirled into three business buildings and at least one home before receding.

Buildings flooded included the office of West Texas Utilities Co., the office of Mrs. Lucy Bonas and the old post office building. Some water entered other buildings there but caused little damage. Flood waters also entered the W. E. Teague home located near the hospital there, it was reported.

SPORTS AFIELD

It is not always the size of the fish or the quantity we may catch that gives us the most fun from fishing. The weight of tackle that we use for a particular size fish and the fighting ability of a certain species of fish should often be the primary considerations, says Robert O. Hall, Salt Water Fishing Editor of Sports Afield Magazine. An angler does not derive the utmost enjoyment from fishing until he has reached the stage where he is matching his skill as an angler against that of the fish. The increasing popularity of using fresh water fishing equipment for salt water fishing has taught us a great deal about light tackle fishing. Not so many years ago the 3-6 outfit was considered ultralight even for bonefish on the Florida flats. Today when weather conditions are favorable the fly rod is used extensively by some expert anglers for bonefish and tarpon.

An increasing number of anglers are discovering that fresh water fishing equipment can be used for many species of marine fishes. In using fresh water equipment in brackish or salt water it is very important to wash your tackle in fresh water after it has been used.

Of course, there are certain limitations that control the practicality of using fresh water gear for salt water fishing. However, if you keep the terminal tackle within the weight limit that a particular rod was designed to cast, you should not have any trouble.

George Bonbright was one of the first to introduce fly rod fishing in salt water by using one for tarpon. The rod was designed along the weight and action of an Atlantic salmon rod. To overcome the usual weakness that exists around the ferrules of a three-action fly rod he had Edward vom Hofe, an old-time rodmaker, build a two-piece 9 1/2-foot 13 1/2 ounce split bamboo rod with a fixed metal reel seat situated between two long cork grips. The metal parts were of nickel silver and the guides were of stainless steel. He knew full well the corrosive action of salt water and took every precaution to prevent any deterioration that might take place.

It is very important to remember that the rod tip acts as a

spring or cushion between the rod and the fish. The is exerted by the fish, the body of the fish, the tug-of-war in direct contact with every leap and turn may make.
To get the utmost enjoyment from fishing remember that the fish is in the boat the angler ceases.
