Deputy Sheriff Warns of Big Thievery Ring Operating in This Area of State

Alex Shocklee, Deputy Sheriff here, asked The Review to warn residents of this area to take precautions against thieves who working daily in this section of the state, ransacking homes where occupants are not at home.

He states that the thieves particularly like guns, cameras and loot of this type as it is easy to convert to cash and he recommends that owners record serial numbers of their guns, cameras, etc., and place the record where they can find it in event that these items are stolen. According to him, this is the only positive way to identify the possessions in the event they are located by officers.

It would also be a good idea to lock your home when you leave it unattended. The ring of thieves work in the daylight hours and enter homes where they determine that the occupants are away and the house is unlocked.

Peanut Growers Are Reminded of Support

Peanut growers were urged today to find out about the income protection the government price support program can offer before they sell their crop.

According to Tommie J. Harris, Chairman, Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, the average support price for 1959 crop Spanish peanuts has been announced at not less than \$189.83 per ton. The support is available to "eligible" growers through three methods—farm storage loans, purchase agreements and loans through grower association.

"Eligible" growers are those whose farm acreage of peanuts harvested for nuts does not exceed the farm allotment.

Eligible growers who wish to store the peanuts on their farms may obtain a farm storage loan or enter into a purchase agreement at the County ASC Office. Under a farm storage loan, the grower receives the support price (less a service charge) for his crop, which is stored in approved facilities and he may either repay the loan before the maturity date and then sell the crop himself, or he may deliver the crop to the Commodity Credit Corporation in payment of the loan. Under a purchase agreement, the grower receives no immediate income, but CCC agrees to purchase a stated amount of eligible peanuts at the support price toward the end of the season.

A loan through a grower association may be obtained by an eligible grower by delivering his peanuts to an "Approved" warehouse. There the peanuts will be weighed and graded, and the loan value of the loan will be determined. The grower should compare the loan value with the amount offered by the buyer and then decide whether to use the loan or sell his crop. The association may later redeem and sell the loan peanuts, and any profits above the cost will be divided among the growers of the peanuts.

Mr. Harris pointed out that letters are being mailed to all peanut growers whose names appear on the ASC office mailing list, informing them of the price support protection available on their crop. If a buyer or warehouseman does not furnish loan information and assistance when requested, growers are asked to bring the matter to the attention of the County ASC office.

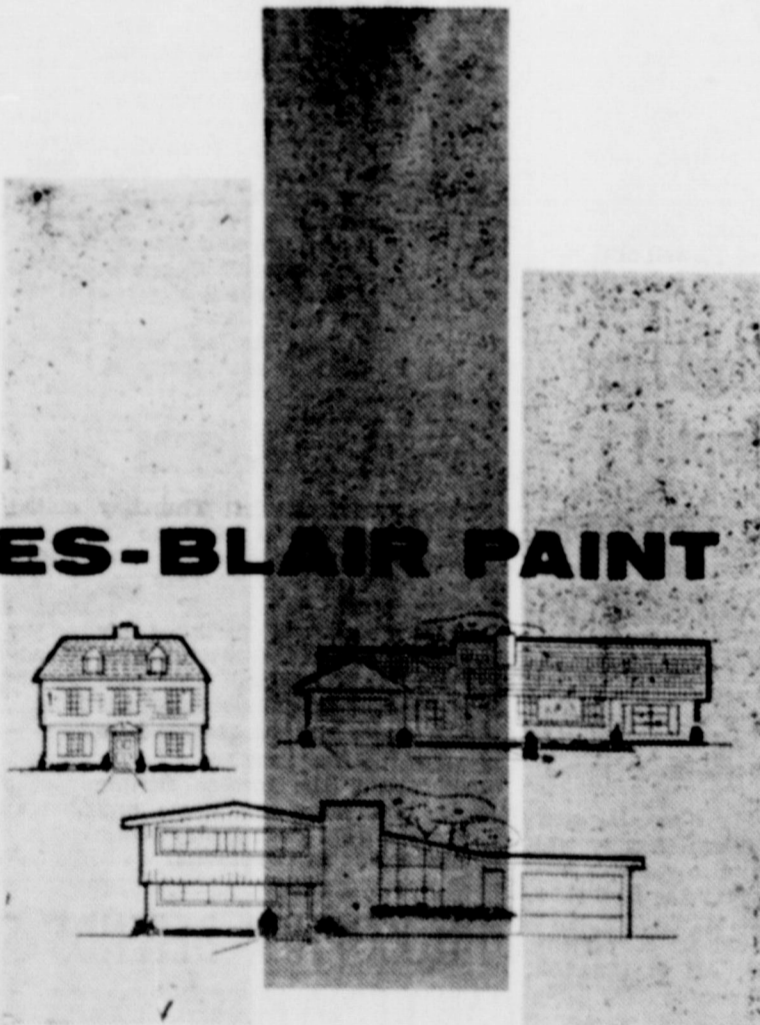

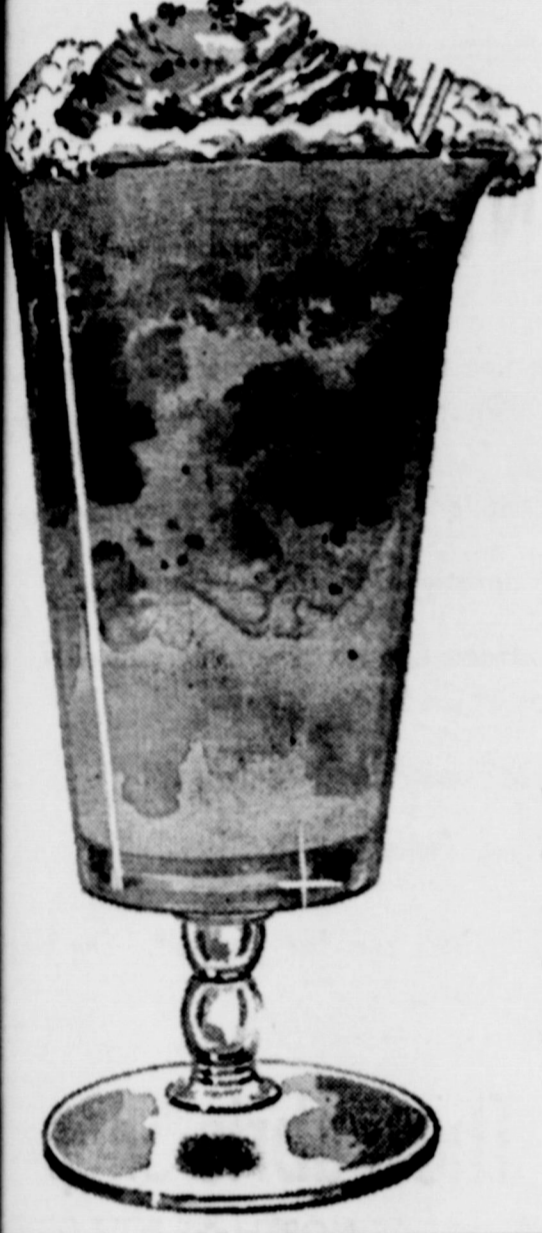

Austin.—Texas will have a virtual "government on wheels" for the last part of this month as 31 state agencies pick up their filing cabinets and move into the new State Office Building.

This is the second new headquarters building to be completed this year. First to be occupied was the Texas Employment Commission building, completed only a few weeks ago.

Transferring into the new State Office Building undoubtedly will be the biggest move of state agencies since horse-drawn dray wagons moved the government into the present Capitol Building in 1888.

First to move will be a host of commissions, boards and divisions which have been in rented quarters scattered over Austin.

Later, probably October or November, another big move will take the Supreme Court, Court of Criminal Appeals, Attorney General's Department and Supreme Court Library out of the Capitol into the new State Courts Building... third state building to be completed this year.

It has been the dream for some time of the Supreme Court's elderly Chief Justice John E. Hickman to stay on the job until the day he could preside in the new Courts Building.

Build of granite similar to that in the Capitol, but with modern styling, the new buildings are to the north of the Capitol. Combined cost of the two buildings is some \$7,000,000.

With all the happiness over the prospect of splendid new quarters, there are some regrets. Many employees are worrying about where they'll park their cars once all the scattered agencies move into one building.

Supreme Court jurists feel a touch of sadness at leaving behind

the historic walnut bench, inscribed with Latin phrase, "As God was to our Forefathers, so may He be unto us." It has been in use practically since the memory of man. Replacement is a handsome marble piece which the judges compare to a soda fountain.

Progress and Property.—A tingle of excitement, fear and hope runs through landowners and business people when they learn that a new super-highway is to come through their area.

Some residents fret over the prospect of losing the old home place. Others dream of wild profits. Businessmen worry whether the motorists will be able to get to their places.

As more and more expressways pierce the countryside, the State Highway Department is making every effort to explain the procedure for acquiring highway right-of-way.

Samples from recent official Department statements:

1. Although its first responsibility is to the public—the taxpayers and millions of highway users—the Highway Department "tries to create a minimum of private injury."

2. When private lands are needed for public roads, the law guarantees "adequate compensation" to the owner. Independent professional appraisers are hired, and an "approved value" figure determined.

3. Once the "approved value" is settled on, the Department negotiator can't "horse trade" with the landowner. This might reward the greedy and tough-minded at the expense of the timid or public-spirited person. But a dissatisfied owner can have the matter settled in court.

4. When part of a piece of property is taken and the rest left isolated or of little value, the state will make payment for the loss of

value. Owners will be given ample time to move buildings to another site or find new buildings.

6. If an owner with a GI mortgage has to sell, the Veterans Administration will restore his GI loan privileges for getting a new piece of property.

7. An owner who sells property for more than he paid for it will not have to pay income tax on the profit, providing he uses the money to buy similar property within a year.

8. Controlled access highways can not have an entrance and exit for every piece of property along the way. Real estate developers are urged by the Department to contact the local planning engineer before making any commitments based on access to the through lanes of a controlled access road.

Water Fight Due.—State Board of Water Engineers has scheduled a hearing for Aug. 31, on the City of Houston's controversial bid for Trinity River water.

Houston seeks permission to build two reservoirs near the mouth of the Trinity, one near Livingston and one near Wallisville, and divert more than a billion gallons daily.

Trinity River Authority and a number of upstream cities—Dallas, Fort Worth, Huntsville, etc.—are protesting that Houston is trying to grab the water supply from the whole river.

Show Up for Holiday.—With Texas' 1959 traffic deaths running six per cent higher than last year, Gov. Price Daniel issued an urgent plea for safety by Labor Day motorists.

He called on law enforcement agencies, civic organizations, safety councils and "most important of all, drivers, to help in this most important of all Texas efforts, the saving of human lives."

Department of Public Safety reported traffic deaths for the first half of 1959 at 1,097, compared to 1,032 for the same period in '58.

Short Shorts.—Texas range and pasture land is in the best condition since 1941, reports the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Good winter feed prospects for cattle are predicted.

Texas construction activity for the first half of 1959 totaled \$1,123,332,000, an increase of 11 per cent over last year. A 1959 pecan crop of 27,000,000 pounds is forecast for Texas by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. This would be slightly better than the 26,000,000-pound crop in 1958.

Governor Daniel has appointed Otha F. Dent of Littlefield to a new six-year term on the Board of Water Engineers. Dent is a former Lamb County judge. J. T. Ellis Jr., former administrative assistant to Governor Daniel, has been appointed the top non-medical administrator for the State Department of Health. Ellis is a one-time state representative from Weslaco.

Texas Highway Department Cautions Against Planning Along Controlled Highways

Austin.—The Texas Highway Department today urged all individuals and corporations who are engaged in the development of lands to study their individual problems in relation to the traffic-handling problems of the Department.

Specifically, the Department cautioned that developers should contact local planning engineers before making commitments based on access from the through lanes of a controlled access highway.

"It will be impossible for the Department to comply with requests for entrances and exits to the main lanes to accommodate private developments. Entrance and exit accommodations will be provided solely for the accommodation of the traveling public for ingress and egress to other public facilities," State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said.

Greer explained that it is possible to develop an "at grade" intersection with adequate access to abutting properties. However, it is almost impossible to properly serve the abutting property where highway grades are separated, particularly where one or both intersecting highways is a controlled access facility.

In the intersection area, all on and off ramps must be used to accommodate traffic interchanging between the intersecting highways. To provide additional entrances and exits into private properties would create congestion on the through lanes themselves and also a very unsafe condition would result, Greer added. Greer expressed the opinion of Highway Department engineers that, due to the Department's inability to provide access to abutting property within an intersection area, there will be a changed concept for the development of property in these areas where controlled access highways intersect.

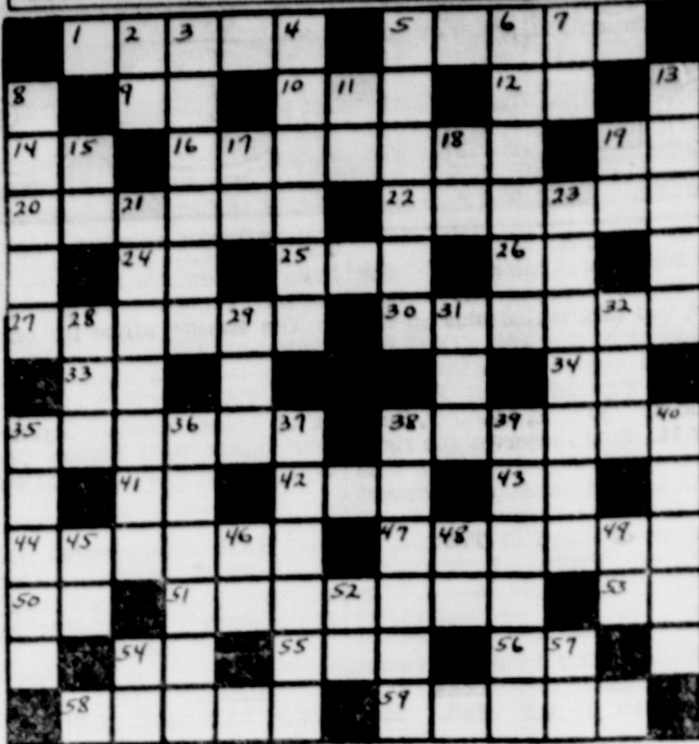

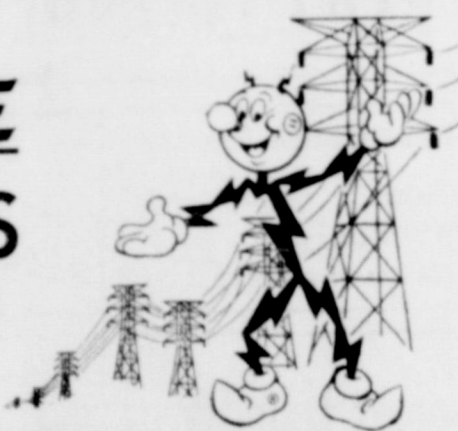

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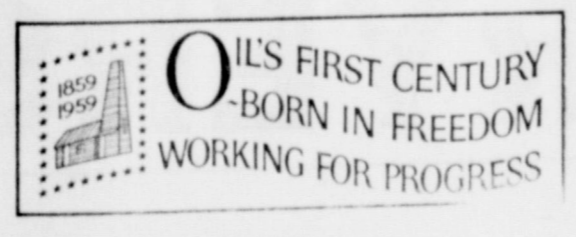

State Highway Patrolmen Get Salary Hike, Sept. 1

Austin—The Texas Department of Public Safety announced today a higher pay scale for DPS patrolmen will go into effect Sept. 1.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director, said the pay of beginning patrolmen will be increased from the present \$300 per month to \$325 during the time they are in training at the Department's Law Enforcement Academy at Austin. It will be raised to \$350 per month during their period of on-the-job training in the field.

Upon completion of the full training period, patrolmen's pay will range between \$365 and \$388 per month, depending upon their assignment.

Garrison said the pay raise was made possible as a result of an increased appropriation made available for this purpose by the recently-adjourned Texas Legislature.

At the same time, he announced that men between the ages of 21 and 35 interested in becoming patrolmen should have their applications filed by the deadline of Sept. 7.

He said competitive examinations will be given over the state Sept. 15, 16 and 17 to fill approximately 80 vacancies in the Department's four uniformed services—the Highway Patrol, License and Weight, Drivers License and Motor Vehicle.

"This is an opportunity for qualified young men to become a part of one of the most respected organizations of its kind in the Nation, and at the same time to occupy an essential position in our society," Garrison added.

Qualifications call for a high school education or the equivalent, sound physical condition, height not under five feet, eight inches nor over six feet, four inches, and weight not less than two nor more than three pounds per inch of height.

Among the benefits enjoyed by DPS patrolmen are training with pay, job security, advancement opportunities, vacations with pay and a retirement system. Uniforms and job equipment are furnished.

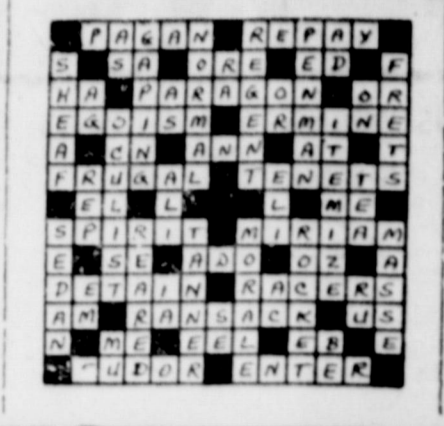
