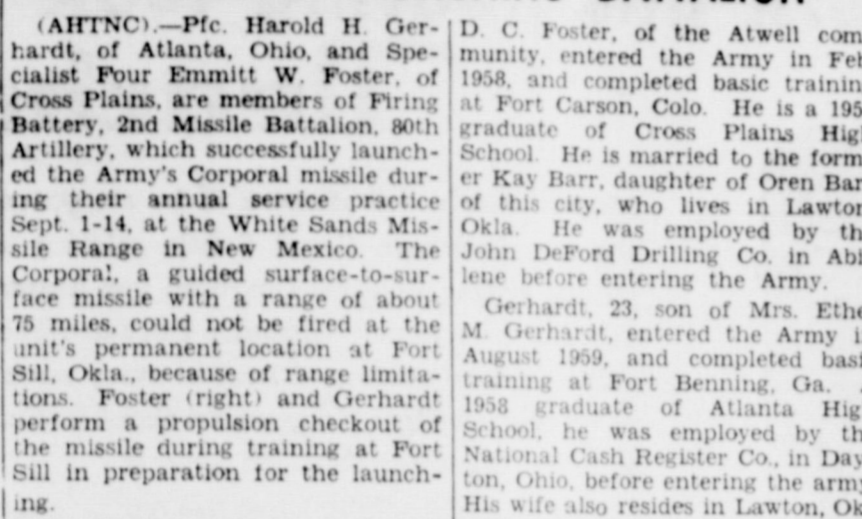

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH SETS DATE FOR OPENING OF NEW BUILDING IN OCTOBER

The First Baptist Church of Cross Plains has selected the first Sunday in October as the day to occupy its new auditorium and educational building. The project now being completed was initiated in ground-breaking ceremonies Aug. 31, 1958, with actual construction work starting the following month, Sept. 22.

The new and ultra modern church edifice will house five departments of the Sunday School and Training Union, a church office, pastor's study and the auditorium. The auditorium will accommodate 275 people with available space for 60 more in an adjoining wing designed for overflow crowds and educational space. This seating arrangement will care for about 75 more than the present building which has been used since 1923, it was pointed out.

Rev. V. D. Walters, who is beginning his fourth year as pastor of the church, this week, states that formal dedication services will be held later when all of the church furniture has been installed and the windows completed according to specifications. The structure is designed for art glass in the windows and doors, but is not available and will not be here until December or January, it was said. Rev. Walters also stated that new furniture for the choir and pulpit has been purchased and paid for, but that seating for the auditorium area will not be purchased until necessary funds are obtained.

The present project composed of two of four proposed units has been completed at a cost of approximately \$58,000.00, apart from architectural and supervision fees which bring the total cost to about \$65,000.00. Local firms have figured prominently in the construction of the building. Claude Mayes of the Mayes Lumber Co. has been building supervisor and Higginbotham's has furnished the material and interim financing. All work has been done with local carpenters.

The pastor and congregation extend a cordial invitation to all visitors and friends of the church to attend its opening day activities on Sunday, Oct. 4. An "Old-fashioned Dinner on the Ground" will be enjoyed by all who wish to attend.

PHILOSOPHER PREPARED TO PRESENT KHRUSHCHEV WITH JOHNSON GRASS

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou takes note of Mr. Khrushchev's visit to the U. S., his letter this week reveals.

Dear editor:

I understand Mr. Khrushchev is on a tight schedule and won't be able to stop by my farm out here, which is perfectly all right, I'm on a tight schedule myself and wouldn't have much time to entertain anyway.

But what has interested me most about his trip to the United States is the reaction of these big-time columnists who write for the big dailies.

One group is arguing Khrushchev shouldn't have been invited at all, but I don't have much feeling on this point. As far as I'm concerned, anybody, including a dictator, is welcome to come over and look us over, so long as he doesn't bring his army with him.

Another group says Khrushchev won't be here long enough to get the feel of America, won't get to know what we think. Some Congressmen have lived here all their

DeLeon Blanks Buffs, 28-0; Travel To Goldthwaite Friday

The visiting DeLeon Bearcats white-washed the Cross Plains Buffaloes 28-0 here Friday night in the second gridiron tilt for both teams.

DeLeon took a one touchdown lead in the first quarter and was never headed. It took the Bearcats two more quarters to build up steam but in the fourth stanza they broke loose and scored 22 points.

A stout defense kept the Buffaloes bottled up on their own end of the field most of the night. The Buffs managed to penetrate Bearcat territory only three times. The smothering defense thrown up by DeLeon held the Buffs to only 96 yards gained. Meanwhile the visitors ran and passed for a total of 314 yards. Cross Plains mustered only four first downs while DeLeon gathered 17.

DeLeon Scores.

Cross Plains lost the pigskin to the visitors on an opening kickoff fumble on the Buff 26. But Buff Paul Whitton gave the Buffs possession again by recovering a Bearcat misplay on the Buff 16. But the Buffaloes couldn't move the ball and were forced to punt.

DeLeon then took command and started their first touchdown drive from their own 45. Ten plays later Bearcat Fullback David Coan went over right guard for the touchdown. Halfback Stanley Kirk was stopped short of the goal line as he attempted to run for the extra points. With 4:12 left in the first quarter, DeLeon led 6-0.

In the second quarter the locals found themselves in hostile territory for the first time. Buff Halfback James Merrill covered a DeLeon fumble on the visitors 44, but the stout defense allowed the Buffs only six yards, and the ball changed hands on the Bearcat 39. De-

SONIC BOOM DAMAGE CLAIMS CAN BE FILED THROUGH DYESS AFB OFFICER

A sonic boom which caused considerable damage to windows in this area shortly before noon, Thursday of last week, brought Air Force officials to Cross Plains Monday of this week to survey the local damage.

Property owners suffering damage can get the necessary forms for filing a claim by writing to Lt. Frank H. Jaques, Box 536, Dyess AFB, Texas.

Officials of the Air Force state that it is their policy to make prompt payment for any damages caused by a sonic boom set off by one of their planes.

The Air Force recently made public its official policy concerning sonic boom damage, as follows:

1. Window and plate glass may be broken by a sonic boom.
2. Light brick-a-brac may be shaken or vibrated from shelves.
3. Loosely latched doors may be pushed open and damaged.
4. There is a possibility of aggravation of existing plaster cracks only when extensive glass damage is present. Without extensive glass breakage, aggravation of existing plaster cracks is highly unlikely.
5. Structural damage to foundations, load-bearing walls and the like is considered "a practical impossibility unless extraordinary circumstances exist."
6. Direct physical damage or injury to persons is considered impossible, although injuries could result indirectly, as from falling glass.

The booms are one of the penalties of modern civilization, as they are a product of national defense and Air Force officials have stated that "For the present, nothing can be done to prevent sonic booms except to fly below the speed of sound or outside the atmosphere—unacceptable measure in the light of security needs.

Social Security Tips Given

September 30 may be an important date for you if you were dependent on a working son or daughter who died at some time after 1939.

Before August, 1958, many parents who inquired about their eligibility for social security survivor's payments were told that they could not qualify because the son or daughter was survived by a widow, widower or child. Now a 1958 change in the law makes benefits payable to dependent parents as well as to other survivors.

If you are at retirement age and if you were being supported by your son or daughter at the time he or she died, you should inquire at your social security office before September 30 to get all of the benefits due you.

September 30 is an important day because if applications are not filed with the social security office by that date, some back payments may be lost.

Surviving parents, who are not yet of retirement age, should also get in touch with their social security offices before too much time has passed. Proof of support must be furnished within two years of August 1958 or within two years of the son or daughter's death, whichever is later.

Sept. 20-26 Is Proclaimed As Texas School Safety Week

Texas School Safety Week will be observed in thousands of Texas school classrooms during the week of Sept. 20-26, in response to an invitation extended to the State's school teachers by Governor Price Daniel.

The Governor has proclaimed that week because "Texas now faces a critical emergency on its streets and highways as the result of increased traffic deaths this year and because it is imperative that all Texans be brought to full realization of the immediate threat to their well-being."

The special week was recommended by the Governor at the annual Texas Safety Conference in Houston last March. Almost immediately, representatives of the Governor's Highway Safety Commission, the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Public Safety, aided by the Texas Safety Association, veteran citizen-support group for public safety in Texas, began making necessary arrangements.

In his proclamation, the Governor asked the school officials and teachers to make plans for special traffic safety programs and studies in every classroom in Texas.

Governor Daniel said one of the compelling reasons for emphasizing traffic safety in the public schools was the high percentage of youngsters involved in Texas traffic tragedies in 1958. The annual report of the DPS showed that 24 per cent of all the car drivers who died in Texas traffic in 1958 were between 15 and 24 years of age; 29 per cent of all passengers killed in Texas traffic last year were in this same age-group; and while only 18 per cent of all the licensed drivers were between the ages of 15 and 24; 29 per cent of all drivers involved in highway crashes were in this age-group.

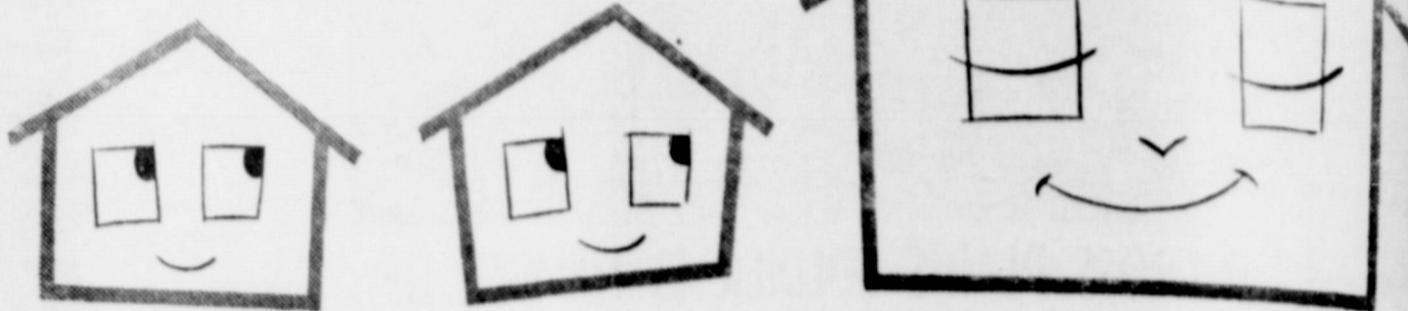

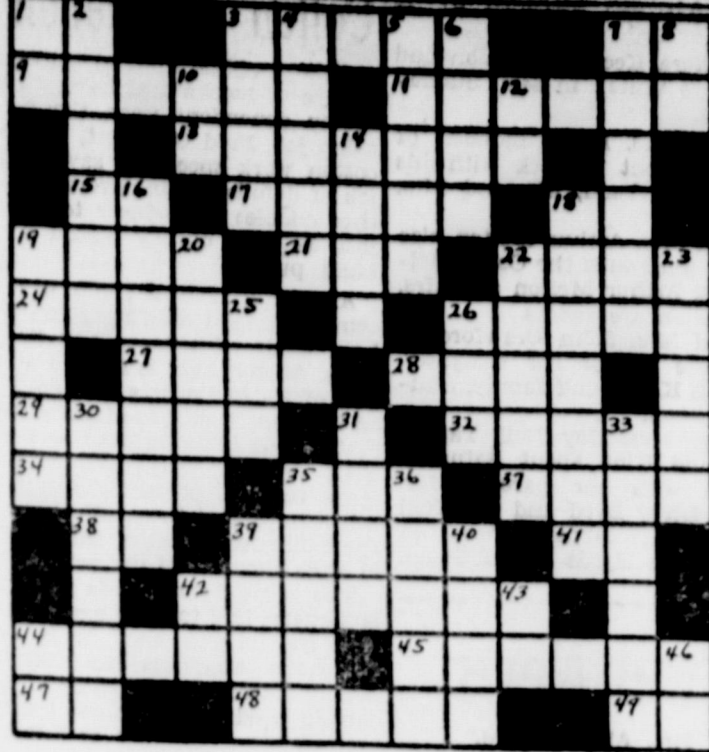

IT'S THE LAW IN TEXAS

Thousands of school children are trooping back to school throughout Texas. Many of them will be transported by school buses. Most people are careful when approaching a school bus which may be standing beside the road or school to pick up school children or allow them to alight. However, we have already had some very bad accidents this year because a child or a motorist, or both, were careless at that very time.

Most Texans are aware of the law which requires a driver to come to a complete stop when overtaking from the rear a school bus which has stopped to receive or discharge school children. After stopping immediately behind the bus, he is then allowed by law to proceed past same at a speed "which is prudent, not exceeding ten miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children."

What may persons do not realize is that the very same rule applies when MEETING a stopped school bus. While everyone is interested in protecting our children, unthinking violators of this simple safety rule greatly outnumber those who comply. Failure to follow the law in this case can lead to fines up to \$200 even when no accident occurs. Following an accident in which a child is injured or killed, the penalties are naturally much more serious.

Although the above rule does not always apply when passing a stopped school bus in a business or residential district of a town, the necessity for extreme caution even in those locations is obvious.

When it comes to overtaking and passing moving vehicles, exercise of ordinary common sense will generally keep a driver within the law. For instance, when passing a car it is only common sense to proceed on past it a safe distance before cutting back to the right side of the highway. Also, any driver would realize the danger of increasing his speed while another is attempting to pass him.

In the same category is the prohibition against passing on the right under most ordinary circumstances. Of course, you may legally pass on the right in a few specific instances, such as when the vehicle overtaken is making or about to make a left turn, or upon a one-way street with two or more lanes, or upon a four-lane highway.

However, our traffic laws state that even when passing on the right is allowed, it shall be done only under conditions permitting such movement in safety. And, in no event should such passing be accomplished by driving off the pavement or main-traveled portion of the roadway.

Familiar to all are the no passing zones designated by dash lines placed to one side of the center stripe on our highways. Not so well known are the restrictions against crossing the center line when approaching within 100 feet of or

when traversing any intersection or railroad grade crossing.

A driver should never cross the center line of a highway when the left side of the road is not clearly visible and free of oncoming traffic. Generally speaking, when not engaged in passing another vehicle, one should not drive to the left of the roadway.

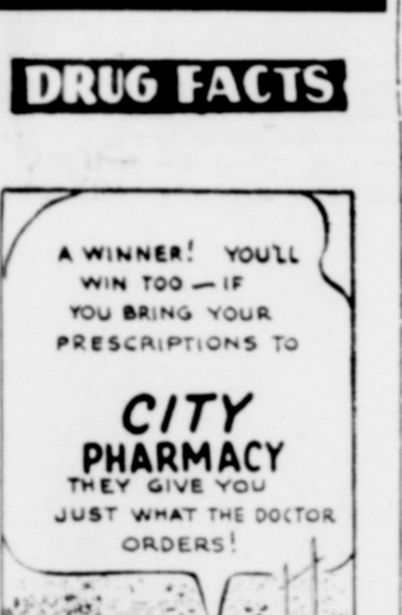

**Hints Are Offered on
Cotton Defoliation**

College Station.—The success or
failure of mechanical harvesting of
cotton dependent upon the defoliation
job Fred C. Elliott, extension
cotton work specialist, says a good
job of defoliation in favorable weath-
er enables a producer to harvest
just as high quality cotton as by
hand pulling.

Arsenic acid and penta are the
commonly used defoliants and both
have their advantages and limita-
tions. Arsenic acid is applied at the
rate of 1½ to 2 quarts per acre mix-
ed in about 8 gallons of water. This
material is toxic to man and ani-
mals and is very corrosive. For
these reasons, precautions must be
taken to protect the applicators and
the equipment. Cost of this materi-
al runs about \$1.75 per acre.

The recommended rate for penta
is 2 quarts in 7 to 8 gallons of diesel
or kerosene per acre. It is non-
poisonous and has no corrosive
action. However, Elliott adds, it is
caustic and may cause burning
around the nose, ears and lips of
the operator. Since it is mixed with
diesel or kerosene, the cost goes up
to about \$3.00 per acre.

The addition of 2-4-D to the de-
foliation aids in the control of re-
growth, and should not be used
where the seed will be saved for
planting purposes. Those who do
use 2-4-D should do so only if they
are thoroughly familiar with the ma-
terial. Once 2-4-D is used in a ma-
chine, cautions Elliott, it cannot
be washed out.

Amino triazole will also check re-
growth and is recommended in the
defoliation leaflet L-145, "Cotton
Defoliation Guide," which is avail-
able at the county agent's office.

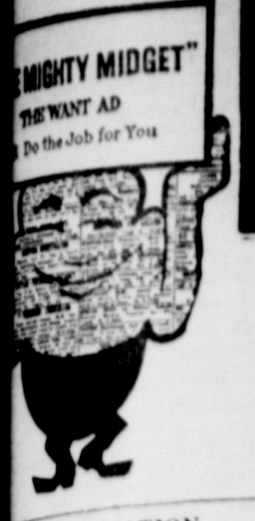

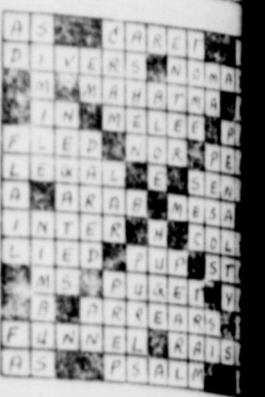
