#### Safety Chief Urges Care In Handling of All Firearms

Carrying, possession and the sale of firearms is, for the most part, governed by law. But it is difficult to legislate against carelessness yet it is carelesness that is responsible for the most firearms injuries and fatalities. Almost half of all fatal firearms

accidents occur in the home. These generally happen when preparing to clean guns or pistols, in dropping a gun or knocking it off a support, in showing the "unloaded gun", or in actual horseplay.

One of the greatest hazards from firarms comes from leaving them loaded and in places where they are accessible to everyone-including children.

Other precautions listed by TSA

1. Always treat a gun as though it were loaded-until you have proved that it is not; and never aim unless you intend to fire. Put firearms away unloadel, dismantled, with all ammunition in a locked

chest 2. Before a person is allowed to handle firearms alone, he should be taught how to use them, on a well-protected range under competent instruction.

When buying ammunition, are should be taken to make sure that it is suitable for the gun in which it is to be used.

4. With many accidental deaths and serious injuries resulting from the mishandling of revolvers and guns, it is possible that the hazard created to members of the household may outweigh their protective

value as defense weapons. 5. Loaded guns should not be leaned against trees, fences, walls or other objects, nor should they be

left unattended. 6. When carrying a loaded gun, it should be kept on "safety" and carried in such a way that if the "safety" fails, no injury will result.

7. When climbing with a gun over or through obstacles, such as fallen trees and fences, "break" the gun or open the breech and put the gun over the obstacle first. 8. Be sure of your target before you pull the triger, and never shoot at a flat, hard surface or the sur-

face of water. 9. It is also important to know the maximum range of the gun you are using so that your shooting will be kept within safe limits.

10. All hunters should know the laws regarding hunting and the use of firearms.

Austin, Texas-From now until January, Texas political skies will be crowded with trial balloons.

Already, through polls, public and private, conference and speeches, a host of ambitious politicos are trying to test the wind and fix their time tables accordingly.

In the past decades, office holders all down the line arranged their schedules on the assumption that the governor would retire after two terms. When the governor moved out, others moved up, and a sucession of vacancies was created.

A roadblock at the top would pose hard decisions for those who have been getting primed to move up. Atty. Gen. Will Wilson's firm plans to run for governor have been no secret. But he has not said he will run even if Gov. Daniel does.

If Daniel does run and Wilson decides to sit tight, a half-dozen attorney general hopefuls, including Speaker Waggoner Carr, will be either stalled or up against stif-

In legislative races much of the same agonizing is going on. Wherever a senator is up for re-election, there are usually one or more House members itching to try for

Some have already jumped in some have definitely decided against it. Others are still "talking saying that the time comes when a man must go "up or out" Question is: "When is that time?"

Demos Guard Harmony-For the moment at least Texas Democratic party leadership appears more united at the summit than it has been in years.

At their recent meeting, State Democratic Executive Committee members cheered both Gov. Daniel for a third term and U. S. Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson for president. Gov. Daniel, Committee Chairman Ed Connally and National Committeeman Byron Skelton all applauded Johnson




