Update on school county elections

The election season had two new events Monday with the start of early voting for the runoff for Texas state senator and the official call for the election of the two atlarge seats on the Muleshoe Independent School District (MISD) Board of Trustees in May.

The early voting to decide between Kel Seliger of Amarillo and Kirk Edwards of Odessa will run through Friday. Election day for the special election is Feb. 17.

Just three days after votes for that race are canvased and a winner officially declared, the race begins anew with early voting for the primaries in a number of local, state and national offices, including state senator. The early voting will end March 5 and election day is scheduled for March 9.

The at-large seats currently held by trustees David Tipps and Bruce Barrett are also up for grabs.

Oualified citizens who wish to run can file Feb. 16 through March 15. Early voting will begin on April 28, if either seat is contested. Regulár election day is set for May 15.



"Welcome Back!" to a Good Friend I Once Kicked Out

Ivan Woodard is coming back! Having-kicked Ivan out of one house, I'm very pleased to welcome him back to the 16th & D Church this Sunday. I don't usually write much in this column about "in-house" stuff, but you might find this interesting. You see, my friend Ivan Woodard has been my predecessor in more ways than one. Ivan was the first preacher

at the 16th & D Church of Christ. (In its almost 35-year history, it has had only four-Ivan Woodard, Terry Bouchelle, James Johnson, and Yours Truly, and I'll be celebrating my 19th anniversary here on Easter.)

But I'd known about Ivan a long time before he came to Muleshoe because he was living in my parents' home in Amarillo when I made my initial appearance there myself in January of 1957. Dad was, in addition to preaching revivals all around the country (good Church of Christ folks called them "gospel meetings" lest, I suppose, we should become confused with folks who got spiritually revived!), and he was directing a Bible training program that was responsible for helping launch the ministries of a very significant bunch of ministers and ministry families. Ivan was one of those ministers (as were two of our other four). He'd moved up from

Kerrville and Mom & Dad had invited him to live with them and my much-older siblings while he was in Amarillo-until 1 arrived (quite a surprise, I was!) and baby-booted him out! Some years later (in the

very early 70s) my brother Gene was in Muleshoe guestpreaching on a particular weekend or Sunday, and I'd tagged along because I was so spiritually minded (and because the Poynor girls lived in Muleshoe). Ivan had moved here recently, and I remember him taking us down the street and up the hill overlooking Avenue E ("Snob Hill" he smilingly called it) to show us the parsonage, then being constructed/renovated. I remember looking out across Muleshoe from its upstairs window and talking to Ivan. I had not the ghost of an idea that I would live in that house for (at this point) almost 20 years and raise four sons there. And neither one of us knew that part of what Ivan was doing as he preached in Muleshoe was blazing a trail for me.

From the fireplace in the fellowship hall (which the youth group wanted and paid for by selling the watermelons they raised on Dan Throckmorton's land) to the Mulehound Special (it was a really old really interesting bus Ivan patched up-sort of-and used to cart the youth group all over the state) and on to his attitude of infectious love for Christ and everybody else who loved Christ regardless of denominational lines, Ivan did a great job. I owe him a lot. And it will be great to have him back this Sunday.
