The the Social Security Administration has the responsibility for maintaining approximately 126 million earnings records, Mr. Weatherly, Field Representative of the Abilene district office pointed out today that it is the responsibility of Star and Mrs. Josephine Allen of each individual social security card holder to check his record periodically to make sure it is correct.

He also stated that everyone should check his social security record at least once every three or four years. In most instances the Social Security records become final and not open to adjustment after three year, three months and 15 days from the end of the taxable year for which the earnings were reported. There is another point to be considered too-the sooner an error is found, the easier it can be corrected. Saunders Asks Re-trial-Former meeting was held in the Roof Gar-Insurance Commissioner J. Byron den at the Brownwood Hotel. Saunders is asking for a new trial of the perjury charges against him. Saunders was convicted in an Austin district court and sentenced to two years in prison.

He was accused of having lied to legislative investigating committee as to why the now-bankrupt ICT Insurance Co. paid him \$7,000 while he was insurance commissioner. Saunders contended the money was payment for his interest in oil royalties on a piece of property he sold the company.

It is the first time in history of the state that a person has been charged with perjury as a result of statements to a legislative investigating committee. Saunders' attorneys have vowed to take it all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court if necessary.

Gibbs Re-called-Joe P. Gibbs has, for the third time, been trapped to join the high command of

the State Board of Insurance. Gibbs was appointed by Gov. Daniel to succeed Board Member David B. Irons who will leave Nov. 1 to join a Dallas law firm. Irons said his resignation was not triggered by the Department's recent difficulties with the Legislature which cut salaries of top officials. Gibbs served as an insurance commissioner from 1941 to 1952 as an appointee of Govs. W. Lee O'-Daniel and Beauford Jester. He served again from 1957 through Februray, 1958, after Gov. Daniel made appointments to an entirely new, reorganized board.
