City Water Tower, Tank Is Getting Face-Lifting Now

Work is now underway on a major overhaul of the city's elevated water storage tank and tower, according to an announcement made this week by C. P. "Pat" McNeel Jr., City Water Commissioner.

Commissioner McNeel stated that a contract had been let by the city to the Texas Water Tank Co., of Abilene, which includes scaling, welding, painting and coating the interior of the tank and scaling and painting of the exterior and tower.

Contract price is \$2,600.00, and completion of the work will put the 50,000-gallon reservoir in first-class condition, he stated.

O. L. LaBeff, 77, Dies Of Heart Attack Here

O. L. LaBeff, 77, owner of a shoe repair shop and bootmaker here the past eight years, died suddenly at his home of a heart attack Saturday night, Oct. 24.

Born in Leon County, Texas, June 15, 1882, he moved to the Cross Plains area with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry LaBeff at an early age. The family lived on a farm a few miles south of town on Turkey Creek for many years and he attended grade school in the communities in the area.

"Lum", as he was familiarly known by his friends, began his bootmaking career in his father's shop at the age of 10 and during his younger days, worked in many Texas towns, New Mexico, Arizona and Idaho. At one time he was employed by M. L. Leddy Co. in Menard and San Angelo and operated his own shop in Menard for 20 years. He moved here from Seagraves.

He was married to Agnes Higginbotham in 1915 at Menard. She died in 1935 and in 1942 he was married to Ima Haney at Lubbock, who is at present a teacher in the local ward school.

Survivors include his wife, two sons, O. L. Jr., of Riverton, Wyoming and M. J. of Albuquerque, N. M.; two daughters, Mrs. Wayne Hutchins, Lamesa and Mrs. Les Christol, Amarillo; eight grandchildren, one brother and two sisters.

Funeral rites were conducted Monday, October 26, at 2 p.m. from the First Baptist Church, with the pastor, Rev. V. D. Walters, officiating. Burial was made in the Cross Plains Cemetery under the direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home.

Bill Edington Escapes With Minor Injuries When Station Wagon Overturns and Burns

Bill Edington, of Albany, formerly of the Burkett Community, escaped with minor injuries Thursday night of last week when the 1959 Plymouth station wagon he was driving went out of control in the dry creek bed at Burnt Branch. The vehicle caught fire and burned after the accident which occurred about 8:00 o'clock, some six miles west of town near the L. L. Montgomery place.

Truck Mishap Wrecks School Bus Monday

A truck belonging to the Gerad Feed Co., of Jonesboro and driven by Marvin J. Adams of the same address, went out of control on Highway 206, just southwest of Cross Plains Monday afternoon and overturned, striking a school bus belonging to the Cross Plains Independent School District, badly damaging both vehicles.

The accident occurred on the "L" turn just east of the Silas Havens farm. Claude Thomas, driver of the bus, stated that he could see that the truck was out of control but that both vehicles were trying to round the curve traveling in opposite directions, and it was impossible to get out of the way. Thomas was treated by a local physician for cuts and bruises and the truck driver escaped unharmed.

The bus was returning to town from its route through the Burkett area and occupied by the driver only when the accident occurred.

He said that the truck owner was fully covered by insurance and the bus will be put back in first-class condition. World Championship Poultry Show To Be Held This Year At Fort Worth Stock Show

Fort Worth.—The American Poultry Association, Inc., oldest livestock organization on the American Continent, has voted to award the World Championship Poultry Classic to the 1960 Southwestern Exposition and Pat Stock Show, Jan. 29 through Feb. 7, according to W. R. Watt, president-manager. This classic is composed of four departments, three of which will be held in Fort Worth. Those are the large poultry, the bantam poultry and the turkey departments.

The grand champions of these three departments will be crowned World Champions. This will be the first time the World's Champions have been selected during the Fort Worth Stock Show. Of special interest to turkey exhibitors is the fact that in addition to the regular premiums, the American Poultry Association will award the champ a beautiful trophy and \$25 cash. There are two divisions in the Fort Worth Turkey Show: the breeder and junior shows.

Judges for the poultry show, which is always run on American Poultry Association, Inc., rules, include: C. T. Driessen, Great Falls, Mont., secretary of the American Poultry Association; Alen D. Pitchett, manager Chamber of Commerce, Cushing, Okla. and Joe R. Harner, treasurer of the association and large poultry breeder of Fremont, Ohio. Turkey and waterfowl judge is E. D. Parnell, API licensed judge, poultry husbandry professor, Texas A&M College, College Station, Texas.

In order that exhibitors will not have to leave their prize birds in cages over five days, the poultry show is split in two sections. The first five days will include turkeys, pigeons, waterfowl and rabbits. Entries close on Jan. 10, 1960 and exhibits must be in place by 6:00 p.m. Friday, Jan. 29. The next five days of the show will include all large poultry and bantams. These entries also close on Jan 10 and must be in place by 6:00 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 3.

This will be the eighth annual show of Standard Bred Pigeons held by the Fancy Pigeon Association of Texas in cooperation with the Southwestern Exposition and Pat Stock Show.

The American Poultry Association as well as the Texas Bantam Association will hold annual meetings in connection with the Stock Show. All specialty clubs will also hold meetings.

Mickey Freeman, Mary Strength and Susan Albrecht will serve on the program committee with the vice-president.

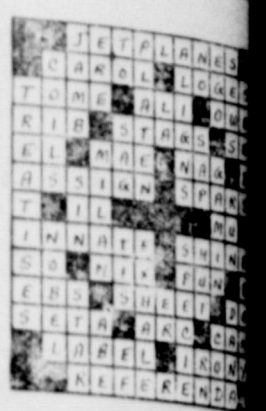
