Ag Economist Takes Look At the Wheat Situation

The entire 1959 wheat crop will probably total about 23 per cent less than the record 1958 crop, but this is still four per cent above the 1943-1957 average. Yield per seeded acre in 1959 amounts to about 19 bushels compared to 26 bushels last year, but much above the average of 15 bushels.

The 1960 crop may exceed the 1959 crop, even with the minimum allotment in effect. It has been estimated that a little more than 53 million acres may be harvested. If yields based upon a crop of about 1.2 billion bushels would be produced, 8 per cent larger than the 1959 crop. With domestic disappearance and exports the same as estimated for the 1959-60, the carryover on July 1, 1961 may be about 165 million bushels over the estimated carryover on July 1, 1960, according to John G. McHaney, extension economist.

Wheat carryover on June 30, 1960 is expected to total about 1,368 million bushels, said McHaney. This is about 91 million bushels larger than that of July 1, 1959 and is a new record. There is a very good possibility that the carryover on June 30, 1961 will be even larger, he added.

Wheat prices may be slightly higher in 1959-60. Much wheat is being withheld from market due to adequate storage space as a result of new construction, and reduced production from last year's record level. Another reason is that the amount of wheat not eligible for price support, because of seedlings in excess of allotments, is more than those for the 1958 crop, which were above any previous year. Also, many farmers are withholding wheat from market until the new tax year because of large sales from the 1958 record production, the economist added.

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Pecans Entries in Cisco Show Must Be This Year's Crop

Nuts entered in the Seventh Annual Eastland County Pecan Show to be held at Cisco, December 11-12 must have been grown in 1959 by the person exhibiting them according to R. L. Ponsler, President of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce who jointly with the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association is sponsoring the two day affair.

People who live in towns with only one tree are equally welcome to enter a quart of their pecans, the same as those who with large orchards or groves, according to Oscar Schaefer, Cook Community, president of the growers association.

Over 70 different growers entered Burkett pecans in the 1958 show. Growers not only from Eastland but from adjoining counties as well are eligible and encouraged to show their nuts.

The show is held in the county annually for the purpose of focusing attention on the pecan industry, to recognize the tremendous potential possibilities of growing pecans in the area and to learn to compare varieties. The per capita consumption of pecans in the United States is a little less than one pound it was explained.

About 20 different varieties and dozens of different natives or seedlings will be seen in the show. Burkett, Mahans and Western Schley usually have more entries in the show than do other thin shell varieties.

The bake show featuring pecan cakes, pies, cookies and candy under the supervision of the County Home Demonstration Council will be a featured part of the show.

A pecan queen contest will also be held in conjunction with the affair. Mrs. Peggy Gallagher, Cisco, is in charge of the contest.

Army Recruiter Gives Army Christmas Leave Policy

Master Sergeant Leonard M. Evans, local US Army recruiter, says the US Army has announced its Christmas Leave Policy for members of the Women's Army Corps.

"Training of WAC personnel will be suspended during the period December 19 through January 2, 1960," he said.

Any young lady enlisting in the WAC during December can be home for Christmas, and then return to Fort McClellan, Alabama, to complete basic training following the holiday period.

Trainees normally scheduled to complete basic training during the week of December 26, 1959, will be accelerated to graduate one week early. Interested young women can obtain additional information at the US Army Recruiting Station, 300 North Third Street, Abilene.

Truck Operators Reminded Of Federal Road Use Tax

A considerable number of truck operators have not paid their Federal use tax on highway motor vehicles, according to Mr. A. E. Fogle Jr., Administrative Officer of the Abilene office. The Internal Revenue Service has surveyed the State registration records and has prepared a list of the truck operators subject to the Federal highway use tax who have not filed their tax return on Form 2290 and paid their tax.

Mr. Fogle explained that although the law had been in effect since July 1, 1956, many truck operators still are not familiar with the tax and the fact that a return must be filed annually and the tax paid. Other returns may be due if additional trucks are put into operation during the year. In general, this tax applies to the use on the public highways of motor vehicles having a taxable gross weight of more than 26,000 pounds. The tax applies to these vehicles even if they are operated solely within a city, town or other metropolitan area.

The Internal Revenue Service has available Publication 349 which explains the tax in detail. Mr. Fogle advises truck operators subject to the tax who have not previously filed, to file Form 2290 paying the tax due at the earliest possible date.

Those who do not file and pay on time are required to pay interest at the rate of 6 per cent per year on the tax from the time it is due. In addition, there is a penalty of 5 per cent a month, but not to exceed 25 per cent, for delinquent filing in the absence of reasonable cause for the delinquency.

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State Capital NEWS

By Vern Sanford

Austin.—Ordinarily between Thanksgiving and Christmas, politicking takes a back seat to holiday preparations in the Capitol.

This year a lot of people are more concerned with what sort of "gifts" they'll get in January.

Gov. Price Daniel has called special elections to fill the three legislative vacancies for Jan. 9. For the several candidates already ac-

tively running for these offices, election would be a highly acceptable post-season "present".

Governor Daniel also has written members of the legislature asking how they feel about having a special session early next year to raise money for higher teachers' salaries.

Some have already stated, bluntly and publicly, that this is a gift they could pass up. It would force

them to choose, right before running for re-election, between disappointing the teachers and passing a new tax, which always makes somebody unhappy.

Several have said that they feel the matter of teacher raises either should have been settled during the sessions last spring and summer or should be postponed until the next regular session. After statewide elections, it's pointed out, legislators might have a clearer idea of what all the people want.

Other lawmakers, however, say they feel teachers should have an immediate raise.

Talk now is that, if the special session is called, it will be about Jan. 12, just after the general elections.

For state officials in general, holidays are focused, not on Dec. 25, but Feb. 1, the last day to file for a place on the primary ballot. For the candidates, no "visions of sugar plums" can compare with the hope of having Feb. 1 end with no tough opposition in sight.

Water Engineer Resigns—McDonald D. Weibert has resigned his post as chief state water engineer effective Jan. 12.

Weibert said that he was not leaving because of being "under fire by anyone" and that he did not have another position at the time.

Weibert is a retired Army Engineers Corps colonel. He was hired in April, 1958, to head the Water Board's planning section. Legislature authorized the planning section to study all the state's surface and underground water resources and make a statewide report to the Legislature.

Water Board has been the target of critical statements in recent months by the Texas Water Conservation Association and the Texas Society of Professional Engineers. TWCA charged that friction between board members had caused the state's water program to lag.

Governor Daniel, in a recent speech, recommended that the Water Board be reorganized along the lines of the State Highway Commission.

Water Fight Continues—Whether the Trinity River or the San Jacinto River is the best source for Houston's future water needs is the issue in a prolonged hearing before the State Water Board.

Trinity River Authority and the City of Houston are seeking permits to build two dams near Houston. San Jacinto River Authority is contesting the application. It contends Houston has an agreement to get its water from the San Jacinto and that Trinity water is insufficient and polluted.

Engineers for the Houston-Trinity group have presented mountains of statistics in support of their case that Trinity water will be adequate for industrial use and cheaper than San Jacinto water.

City of Denton has dropped its opposition to the proposed dams after coming to an agreement with TRA and Houston to protect water rights of the Garza-Little Elm and Grapevine reservoirs.

Commission Studies Gas Prices—Railroad Commission is now considering the record of nearly a year's heated discussion over wether Lone Star Gas Co. should be allowed to raise its rates.

More than 300 Texas cities are

affected. Lone Star is asking to increase rates from 30 to 40 cents per 1,000 cubic feet. It says that 9 cents of this is swallowed up by the higher prices it must pay for gas at the wellhead. It is asking also that some system be established to adjust prices to customers automatically when costs to the company go up significantly.

Attorneys for the affected cities charge that the gas company is trying to put an unfair share of the cost on householders rather than on the big industrial consumers.

Laws Clarified—In a series of opinions, mostly concerned with the new laws passed this year, Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has ruled:

1. That parts bought for repair of air conditioners are not subject to the new 3 per cent sales tax on air conditioners. All parts sold for the original installation are taxable.

2. That the law creating a Texas Coordinating Commission for Health and Welfare Services is unconstitutional. Commission would have been made up of persons from both the legislative branches of government, thus violating the "separation of powers" principle of the constitution.

3. That members of the State Board of Insurance can be paid their regular \$50 per day fee for work on Saturday.

4. That a juvenile offender arrested during the night can be held in jail until taken before the judge the next morning.

5. That county funds can be used to pay all or part of the hospitalization insurance premiums for county officials and employees.

6. That a veteran who refuses to execute a contract under the veterans land program after purchase has been approved forfeits 5 per cent down payment and portions of the closing fees.

Record Sales Seen—Totals thus far indicate Texas should hit an all-time high in retail sales in 1959, says the Bureau of Business Research.

BBR's estimate of total 1959 sales, based on the good showing of the first 10 months, is \$13,558,000,000. This would be 8 per cent better than last year.

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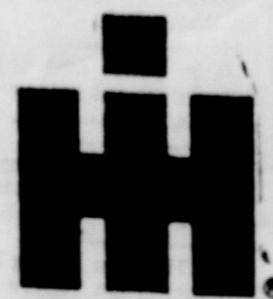

The officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law, and make due return as the law directs.
