It shall be the duty of every citizen to defend the right to buy and sell, to own land and other property, to engage in commerce, and to work and earn a living wage, as a fundamental guarantee of the freedom and welfare of the nation. IX. It shall be the duty of every citizen to instruct his children in the principles of freedom and to spread the ideals of democratic

It shall be the duty of every itizen to preserve an attitude of self-reliance, and to use all legitimate means to achieve financial ndependence and security; to practice thrift and economy in his own affairs and to require the same of ocal, state and federal government.


