

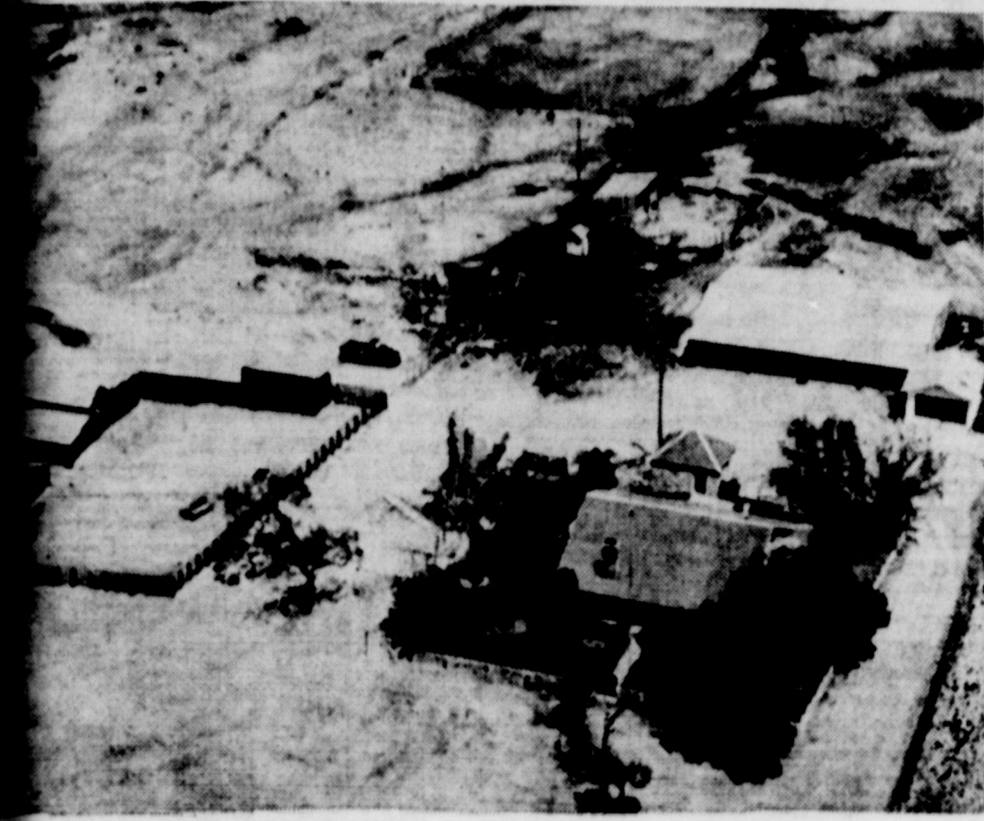

## Methodist Send Pastor To National Conference

Rev. Gordon Dennis, pastor of the First Methodist Church, will leave April 26, to attend General Conference of the Methodist Church in Denver, Colo. Members of the local church have made it possible for their pastor to attend this epoch-making event. Denver will host some 1,000 delegates, 88 of them from overseas, and 4,300 visitors. Already the entertainment committee has been swamped with a record 15,000 requests for guest tickets. Five Denver churches, all within a few blocks of the convention hall, are providing extra meetings rooms: Central Christian, Central Presbyterian, First Baptist, First United Presbyterian, and Trinity Methodist. Bishop William C. Martin, of the Dallas-Fort Worth Area, will deliver the Bishop's address which is the official statement prepared by the Council of Bishops concerning the progress and future needs of the church. General Conference only convenes every four years and this could well be one of the most important conferences in the history of American Methodism, say local churchmen. Rev. Local voters turned out in record numbers for two elections in the past five days. A total of 995 votes were polled in the two referendums. It is doubtful if any town in Texas near the size of Cross Plains polled a comparable vote.

Theodore (Teddy) Souder, 26-year-old groceryman, became Cross Plains' second bachelor mayor in history. He was swept into office by an avalanche of votes, polling nearly three to one of two opponents, in the municipal election Tuesday. Winning council seats were C. D. Westerman and Garland B. Gary. Westerman served on the board of aldermen here a number of years ago. Gary is a newcomer to the council. The vote Tuesday is believed largest polled in a city election here in more than 30 years. Mrs. Mary Wagner, presiding judge, reported the total to be 431, and announced tabulations as follows:

Largest vote ever polled in a school trustee election was cast in Cross Plains Saturday, as seven candidates sought two places on the local school board. Fred W. Stacy, election judge, reported 524 votes were polled. Successful candidates were Nathan Foster, a new comer to the board, who led the ticket with 220 votes, and Sterling Odom, only incumbent seeking re-election, tallied 218. ## Cross Plains Becoming Highways Focal Point

Probably no inland town in Texas will be better served by highways than will Cross Plains, when State Highway 206 is completed through here. That opinion was the consensus of 35 local business and professional men and visitors at a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce in the banquet room of Odom's restaurant here Tuesday at noon. Present at the meeting were: District Highway Engineer Jake Roberts and F. W. Couch of the State Highway Department in Abilene; County Judge J. L. Farmer and County Commissioners Scott Bryant, I. G. Mobley and Claude Foster; Mr. and Mrs. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, and representatives over the Texas Highway Patrol. Roberts pointed out to the group that Main Street in Cross Plains is sufficiently wide to accommodate Highway 206, but pointed out that present traffic and parking problems, which had been previously cited by H. McDonald, president of the club, and Byron Richardson, deputy sheriff, would be aggravated by the increased flow of traffic unless a new traffic code is adopted here. Richardson and McDonald each stressed the need for a four-way stop sign at the intersection of Main Street and Highway 36, and at other points of entry into busy streets. Roberts assured the group of cooperation of the Highway Department and asked that when a master plan is approved by the City Council here that his office be provided with resolutions as passed by the governing group. ## Call Examination Here For Rural Mail Carrier

An examination for Rural Carrier for the post office at Cross Plains will be open for acceptance of applications until April 26, the Civil Service Commission announced yesterday. Applicants must take a written test. They must have resided within the delivery of the office for one year immediately preceding the closing date of the examination. In addition, they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. There is no maximum age limit. However, persons who have passed the age of 70 may be considered only for temporary renewable appointments of one year. Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office. Application forms must be filed with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. and must be received or postmarked not later than April 26. The carrier opening in the Cross Plains office is for Rural Route number 2.

Dear editor: It never has worried me much about what other people thought about me, consequently I don't get riled up over what the television industry thinks of the American public, but this doesn't go for some people.

I was reading in a newspaper only this morning where the head of the national P.T.A. was outraged at what the television people are offering the public, especially the children.

She said there is far too much violence, too much silliness, too much trash, offered the 30 million children watching T.V. these days. Also she said if the television industry would take a survey they'd find the American public isn't as moronic as the industry apparently thinks.

Well, it's my opinion that the television people aren't in much shape, mentally speaking, to be surveying anybody's intelligence judging by some of the programs I've had a chance to see.

But back to the violence angle, the brutality, the shoot-

ing, the crime, the delinquency, the stupidity, shown on television, with millions of kids watching. I know there are some people who say if you don't think your children ought to see such programs, turn the thing off, but they don't understand the control the kids have over the situation. The only way to keep most children of most parents from watching television is to wait till the picture tube blows out.

Consequently, the argument is that the only way to improve the situation is to improve the programs, and until they do, we're liable to have more juvenile delinquents, more youthful crime, more children with the wrong viewpoint toward life, etc.

Well, now, I'll tell you. I think a lot of kids could stand some improving, but I doubt if improving television will do it.

And if you want to protect children from hearing about violence, silliness and stupidity, you'd better not let them read the newspapers or listen to the radio or read history. In fact, you'd better not let them associate with adults at all.

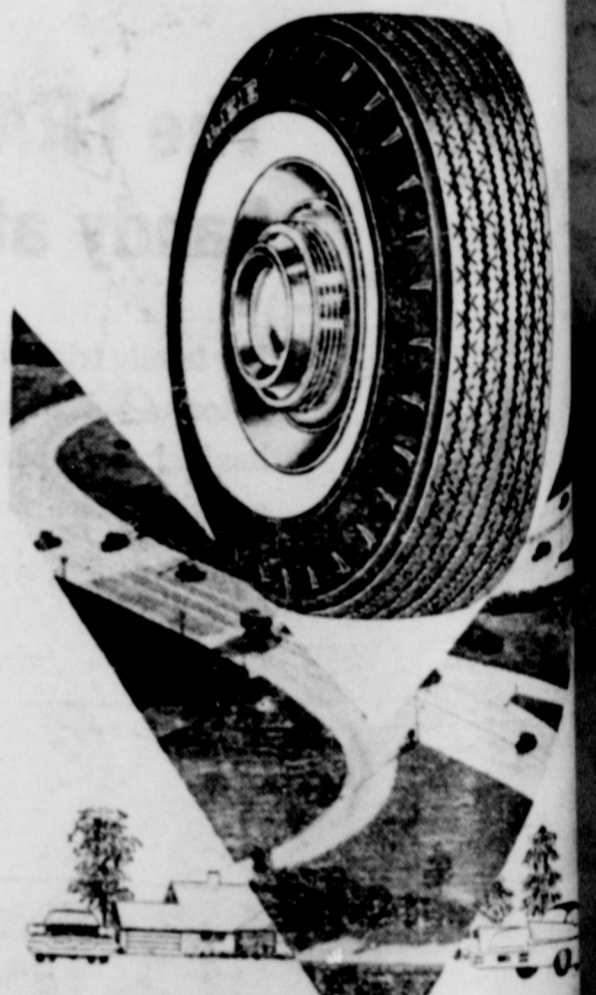

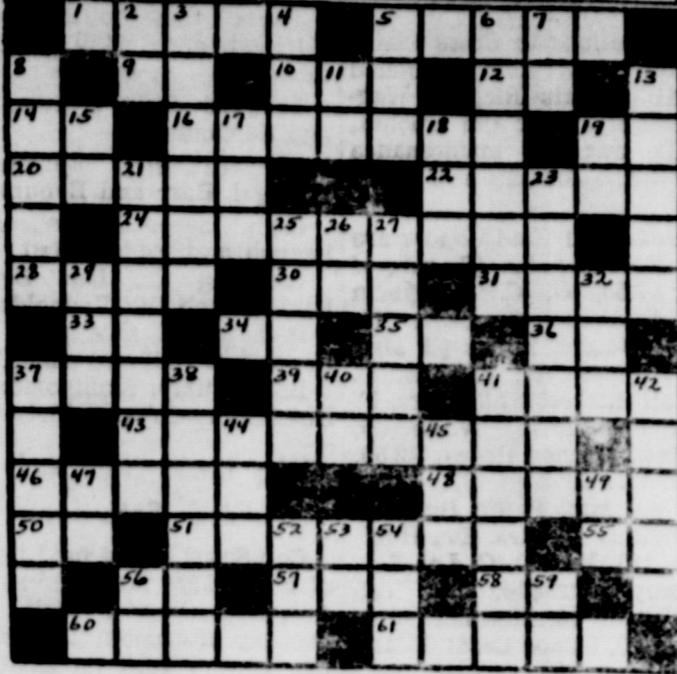
