### 4.350 000 IS GOV. ESTIMATE OF YR'S. COTTON

The cotton report issued from Austin last Friday indicates Texas will this year produce 4,350,000 bales of cotton as compared with 450,0000 bales produced in 1932, 5,319,000 in 1931 and 4,037,000 in 1930. The yield as of Nov. 1 is reported to be 185 pounds per acre as compared with 162 pounds in 1932, 173 pounds in 1931 and 120 pounds in 1931.

The last cotton crop estimate made at Washington and released last week sets that nation's total crop at 13,000-000 bales, despite the governments still,000,000 effort to curb the output. 


