Cross Plains' 1960 population is 1,164. The city suffered a loss of 137 in the past

Callahan County's population dropped from 9,087 in 1950 to 7,206.

While news of the population was disappointing to citizens of Cross Plains, who had hoped the city might reflect some growth, the decrease here was well below the average experienced by most small towns in Central and West

Baird lost 193, Rising Star 296, Gorman 198, Comanche 437, Cisco 783, De Leon 229, Moran 219, Ranger 690, Eastland 350, and Brownwood over

Only small city near here showing an increase in population was Clyde, where an increase of 201 was reported.
