



This gigantic deception by Communism was accomplished at a time when the Soviet people were being persecuted ruthlessly by the communists, a time when the famous Staling purges of the 30's were under way, a time when the Kremlin had forced more than ten million human beings into slave labor, and a time when one of the worst famines in history was raging in the Soviet Union. The gullible and wild-eyed tourists missed it all. With rare exceptions they came back polluted with the communist conspiracy's propaganda about how wonderful it was in "Rus-

Eugene Lyons told the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee in his analysis of tourist testimony that he knew from personal observation in the early 1930's that the inspectors of that period "saw little and understood less." Once again there seems to be an endless swarm of gullible American tourists going to and from the Soviet Union. Just as in the early 30's the truth about the criminal international communist conspiracy is snowed under with clouds of confusion. 




