Hargrove's wife lived three years in Cross Plains. He was known throughout the area for his services which were held Sunday afternoon at three o'clock by Rev. V. D. Walters.

Burial was in the cemetery under the direction of Higginbotham & Burnett County, Dec. 14, 1910, at Cottonwood.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. B. R. Jr. of Cross Plains; Mrs. Mildred Free of Cross Plains; one brother, Mr. Charlie Barr of Cross Plains; and Mrs. Lee Ann of Fort Worth.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at 4:30 from the Stevens Memorial Chapel in Coleman, with the Rev. L. A. Holeman officiating. Burial was in the City Cemetery at Coleman.

The deceased was born in Coryell County, Feb. 27, 1887, and married Miss Cora Ella Tennison, Jan. 9, 1910. He was a retired pipeline company employee and a member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors include his wife, one daughter, Mrs. Hazel Coker, and two sons, B. C. of Lubbock, and Exal D. of Cross Plains; 12 grandchildren and one great grandchild.

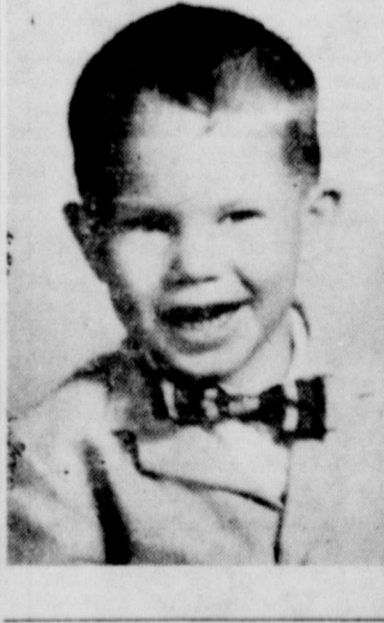

PHILOSOPHER SAYS MOST BUSINESS CAN GO UNDERGROUND; BUT NOT FARMING

Editor's Note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou has found something new to worry about this week, his letter indicates.

Dear editor:

There's a move on in the world that has me worried. It's the theory that to be safe in this nuclear warfare age, everything has to go underground.

It's a fact, I read only last night that it's possible that all homes some day will be built underground. Why not, the argument went. We've already found out buildings don't need windows, you can air-condition them the year around, so why not build houses underground? Eliminate all the costs of style and outside architectural appearance, the need for painting, reroofing, etc. Just build them out of concrete, cover them up with dirt, turn on the air-conditioner and be cool in summer and warm in winter. Not even any lawns to mow.

Moreover, we've already got underground munitions manufacturing plants, underground airports for bombers, underground launching sites for guided missiles, underground government office for emergency use, why only last week they launched some guided missiles from under water via submarine.

Now I've been thinking about this, maybe it is possible to live underground, to keep all grocery stores, drygoods stores, highways, filling stations, churches, football fields, schools etc., below ground, at considerable initial expense, I'll admit but what's money against survival?

But, it has just occurred to me that there's one occupation that can't be put underground, namely, farming.

Consequently, I can foresee the day when everybody else is living safely and snugly underground, while us farmers are up on top exposed to the hot sun and Russian fall-out.

This is a prospect on which I do not look with favor. Going to the added expense not only of keeping a high-priced tractor running, but also of equipping it with radar and a geiger counter and a lead-lined radia-

tion-safe cab, plus an anti-aircraft gun, will be more than a farmer can stand, regardless of how much help both parties are offering him during the next few months.

Farming is lonely enough as it is, but the thought of us being up here on top of the ground plowing away while the rest of you are down there safe and carefree in the ground, tending Russia and China to blast away, is highly unpleasant. It is something which will not only get all the inefficient, marginal farmers off the farms, but most of the efficient ones too.

Can't they think of some other way to run the world?

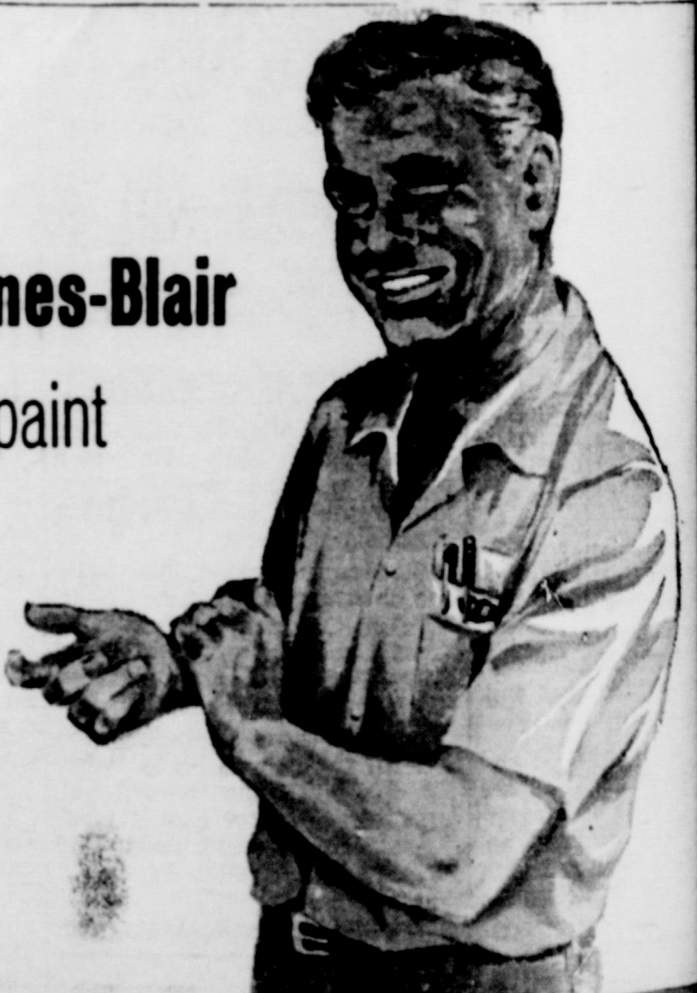

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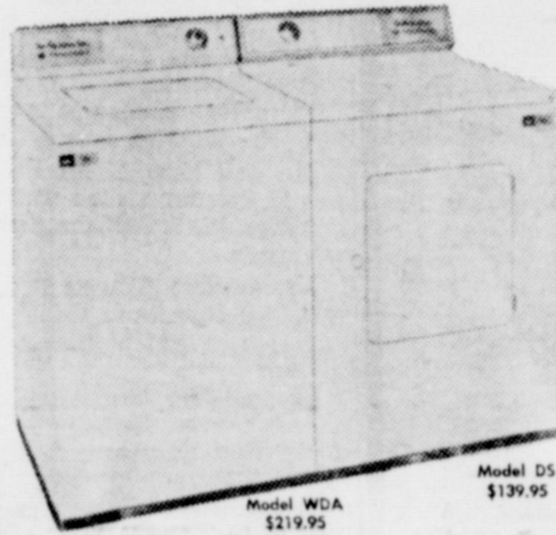
