## Cemetery Fence Will Definitely Go Up Here

Cross Plains Cemetery will definitely get a new chain-link fence.

The project, which has remained in doubt several weeks, was assured yesterday as additional workers rallied to the support of W. A. (Slim) Crutchmer, who has heretofore been waging a one-man campaign.

Thus far \$350 has been contributed, Crutchmer reported. Two Cross Plains ladies entered the solicitation to help raise \$3,000 to finance the project. They are Mrs. J. Peyton Smith and Mrs. Eli Powell.

"We feel that Mr. Crutchmer needs help," they said, "and like most everyone else, we're so interested in seeing the project pushed to successful conclusion that we are entering the fundraising campaign," they said.

The two ladies pointed out that it was definitely not their

intention to detract from the fine work thus far accomplished. "We wish only to hasten it and lend a helping hand," they said.

## Ex-Local Man Seizes \$25,000 In Counterfeit Money; Nabs 3

Twenty-five thousand dollars in counterfeit money was seized in Fort Worth Thursday by Secret Service Agent Charles E. Kunkel, former Cross Plains High School all-star athlete.

A 35-year-old man was nabbed by Kunkel as he was hiding a shoe box filled with 1,250 bogus \$20 bills.

It was a break in a summer-long investigation, demanding night and day vigil, that federal officers had patiently waited for.

Arrested as he hurriedly placed the box of counterfeit bills in the tire well of his car's luggage compartment was Harold Gregory Ainsworth, Jr.

Ainsworth was covering the box with papers when Kunkel tapped him on the shoulder and asked for the package.

Also taken into custody by Kunkel and another special agent, James Boyett, was Ervin Newton Crain, 41, from whose automobile Ainsworth had removed the box of illegal currency.

Arrested shortly afterward was James A. Kelley, 62, an ex-convict, whose 37-year-old wife had been previously arraigned in federal court at Fort Worth on charges of passing worthless

\$20 bills, fitting the description of those in last week's shoe box haul.

Both Mrs. Kelley, who was released on \$1,500 bond, and her husband refused to make statements or otherwise enlighten investigating officers as to where she got the bogus bills. Kelley had been held for investigation when his wife was charged and then released.

Ainsworth, Crain and Kelley were arraigned on complaints signed by Kunkel and charging them with intent to defraud by keeping in their possession and concealing a quantity of counterfeit \$20 Federal Reserve notes in excess of \$5,000.

All three men were released on \$2,000 bonds.

Kunkel testified regarding the circumstances of the arrest after Ainsworth, through his attorney, asked for a statement as to why he was being held in custody.

"I watched as these two men, Crain and Ainsworth (pointing them out) drove up in their cars," Kunkel testified. "Ainsworth walked over to Crain's car, picked up the box and took it back to his car and was putting it in the tire well and covering it up with papers when I walked up."

Kunkel, in reply to questions from Assistant U. S. Attorney William N. Hamilton, said he identified himself as a Secret Service agent, told Ainsworth "I'll take the box" and warned him that anything he said would be used against him.

"I guess I'm in trouble," Kunkel quoted Ainsworth as saying as he handed over the shoe box full of bogus \$20 bills.

Kunkel described the bills as drawn on the 11th Federal Reserve Bank, series 1950, with check letter J-14 on the face plate and the numerals 777 on the back plate.

Kelley, who drew two prison terms in 1932 for convictions in Iowa—one for assault and another for robbery—and Crain waived a hearing and said they didn't want counsel.

Kunkel is a 1951 graduate of Cross Plains High School, where he was an outstanding performer in all sports. He is married to the former Miss Joan Hall, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ira H. Hall of this city. The Kunkels have three daughters and make their home in Arlington.

## Larry McAnally Receives Top Farm Award At Kansas City

The highest honor of his profession was conferred upon Larry McAnally, young Cross Plains farmer, in Kansas City yesterday. He was awarded the "American Farmer" degree for outstanding achievement in agriculture at the national convention of Future Farmers of America.

McAnally became the first recipient of the distinction from this immediate section of Texas. It is pointed out that only one in 1,000 applications for the honor are eventually approved. Accompanying McAnally to Kansas City was O. B. Edmondson, local teacher of agriculture. McAnally credits Edmondson

with having inspired his interest in farming and developing the desire to "shoot for the high honor." Edmondson was not originally scheduled to make the trip, however, a number of local friends chipped in expense money for the trip and insisted that he accompany his prize pupil.

"We're somewhat like the good people of Abilene, who felt that Coach Oliver Jackson should accompany Bobby Morrow to Australia and later Earl Young to Italy for the Olympic Games," said John Pruet, local FFA booster. "The fruition of seeds of inspiration planted years ago, we feel deserved to be witnessed by the planter."

McAnally and Edmondson caught a special train to Kansas City at Fort Worth Monday night. They are due to return here over the week end.

McAnally's career in FFA, which led to his ultimate selection for the organization's highest achievement, started in 1955 when he began as a Greenhand in Cross Plains High School. The following year he became a Chapter Farmer and won the Maverick Calf Scramble at the Texas State Fair in Dallas. Witnessing the contest at that time was Gov. Price Daniel, who said the tenacity exhibited by the Cross Plains youth in holding on to his prize, although exhausted, was an inspiration to every adult present. The Governor introduced himself to the Cross Plains boy on that occasion and has honored him several times since.

In 1958, McAnally won the DeKalb award for outstanding merit in FFA. He received the Lone Star Farmer degree at the recent state convention in San Antonio.

While a student, McAnally's projects included field crops, fat cattle and beef steers. Since graduation in 1959 he has been engaged in farming, nine miles west of here. He is married to the former Miss Barbara Merrill. They have one child, an infant son, Wendel Mark.

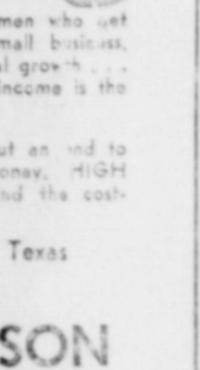

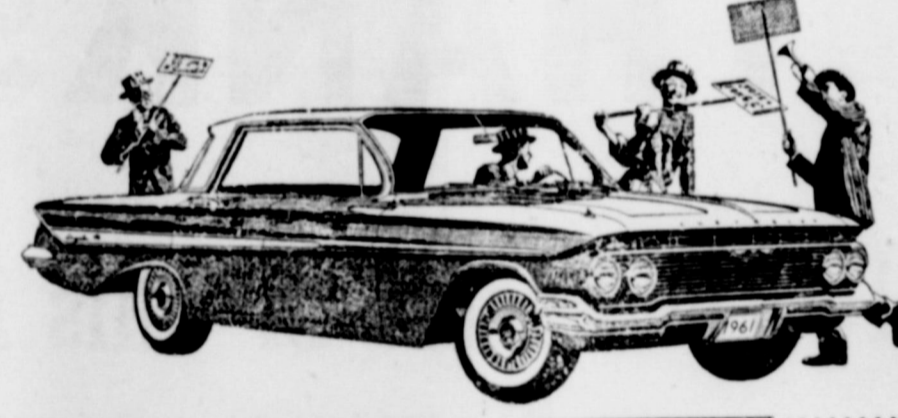

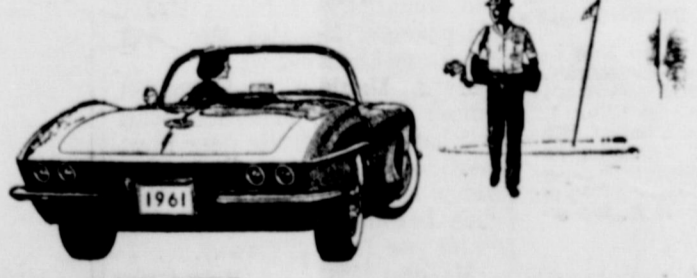

Martin Dies asked for government protection for this important witness but did not receive it. When General Krevitsky was found shot to death in his Washington D.C. hotel room it was called suicide. Well informed Americans are convinced that he was a victim of the very group he testified against.

Another victim was Juliet Poyntz, considered one of the top Communist leaders in the U.S., when she tried to leave the party. Her disappearance from an apartment in New York has never been solved. Carlo Tresca, who also became disgusted with the Communies and came up with irrefutable facts in the Poyntz case, was gunned down on the streets of New York.

These are not the incomprehensible rantings of irresponsible alarmists—they are the facts pointing to an ultimate American reign of terror if the infiltration, subversion and roving of Red agents is not stopped. It is time that unthinking, apathetic Americans awaken to the facts about anti-Christ Communism and its frightening success in our country.



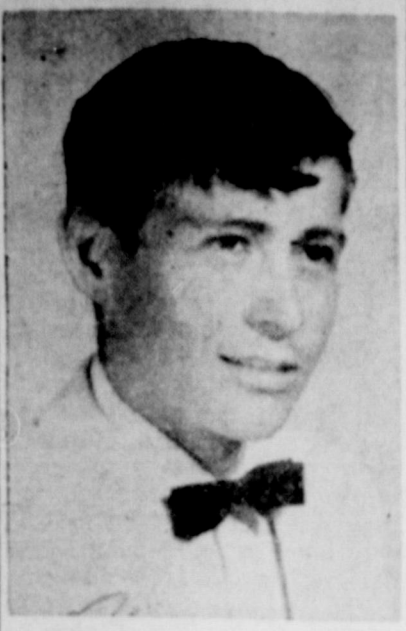

# Bufs Upset Ranger 12-0 In Tough Defensive Game

The Cross Plains Buffaloes upset the Ranger Bulldogs 12-0 here Friday night in a hard fought defensive game.

After battling to a 0-0 first quarter, Cross Plains broke the tie with a touchdown early in the second period. That first half tally stood until only five seconds remained in the game, when the Buffaloes pushed across their second tally.

Friday night's non-conference battle starred the defensive units of both squads.

Statistics show that Class AA Ranger Bulldogs gained just 61 net yards both running and passing, while the Buffs did somewhat better. They rushed for 106 yards, and picked up 42 in the air for a total of 148 net yards. Both elevens had eight first downs in the game.

**Bulldogs Threaten.**  
Three downs after receiving the opening kickoff, Ranger was forced to punt and got their first break, a recovered Buff fumble on the punt on the Bison 40. But the Cross Plains defense quickly did its job and took possession of the oval on downs, just outside their own 30.

After a mild threat, the Buffs lost the pigskin on downs, but three plays later the Buffs were back in business on the Ranger 45.

Buff defender Larry Hefner pounced on a loose ball in the Ranger backfield and set the stage for the Buff's first counter.

**Buffaloes Score.**  
Buff Left Halfback Alvin Hutchins knifed over from inside the one-yard line to pay

Facing fourth down and needing 20 for the first, Ranger decided to "go for broke," and went down fighting. Buff Center Elmer Graham knifed through the Bulldog line to drop Robie for a seven-yard loss and hand the Buffs the ball on the Ranger three.

In three plays Cross Plains tallied. Hutchins blasted his way for two yards to the one, and on the next play Dallas sneaked to the six-inch line. John Baird then hit right tackle for the TD. Only five seconds remained on the clock. Baird's conversion kick was blocked, and the score read 12-0 for the Buffs.

The win pushed the Buffaloes' non-conference record to a winning 3-2 and gave them third place in pre-district 10-A standings.

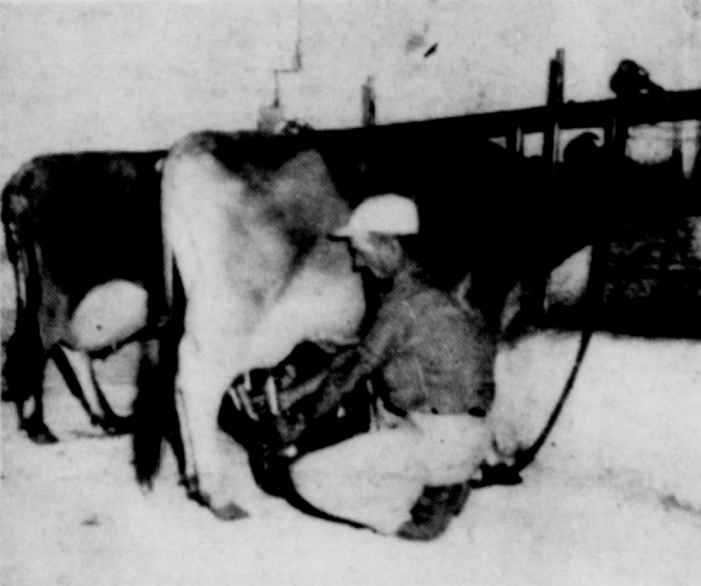

**PHILOSOPHER FINDS NEIGHBOR WHO HAS IDEA FOR SOLVING OUR CASTRO PROBLEM**

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou, covers a wide range of ideas this week, his letter indicates.

Dear editor:  
The way it looks to me, the United Nations is an organization of disunited leaders, but what I started out to say was I was sitting around with a bunch of people out here the other afternoon discussing politics. I tell you, after a week or so of reading how much Khrushchev and Castro love each other and hate the United States, a general discussion of American politics is as refreshing as finding out you've got more money in the bank than you thought.

At any rate, the question came up—which man can handle the world situation, Nixon or Kennedy?

One of the men, who has four kids, eight installment payments a month, and a 10-year-old tractor, said: "I don't know, both of em I guess, at least both of em claim they can, each one better than the other, but even if either of them can handle the world situation, I don't believe either one of them is equal to the job of handling my situa-

tion."  
The trouble is, he went on, his budget is in worse shape than Washington's, without near the resources.

"All it takes to raise the debt ceiling for Washington is an act of Congress," he said, "but it takes an act of a banker to raise mine, and bankers don't have to run for re-election. Kennedy or Nixon might talk Congress into voting more money, but they wouldn't have much luck with my banker. Maybe Nixon or Kennedy can solve the education problem for the country as a whole, but I'm still gonna be faced with the bills for my boy in college. Maybe they can bring our defenses up to date, but I don't believe they could do much with my 10-year-old tractor."

I tried to explain to him that there are some things he's supposed to do himself, but he had me there. "Where does it say so in the platforms?" he asked.

I couldn't answer him, so I took the natural step a man takes when he's cornered. I asked him what he thought we ought to do about Castro.

The only thing he could suggest was that if we kept on firing off test missiles, maybe

doubled up on them, many of them would go in the direction and the prob. Castro would be eliminated. I don't think this is a good idea. Yours faithfully, J. A.
