Expect Record Vote Tuesday

Hottest Presidential Contest In 32 Years Believed Brewing; 650 To Poll Votes Here

Tuesday is general election day throughout the nation. With possibly one of the most hotly-contested presidential elections in the past 32 years promised, the largest vote in history of the country is predicted.

Cross Plains is expected to poll 650 ballots as compared with 523 four years ago, when President Eisenhower carried the local box with a plurality of 57 votes over Adlai Stevenson. The tally here at that time was: Eisenhower 268, Stevenson 211.

In the 1956 election Democrats carried the county by a margin of 32 votes. Stevenson had 1,188 to Eisenhower's 1,167. Texas voted Republican in the national referendum four years ago. The state is currently considered in the doubtful column by both parties.

Probably not since 1928 has so much interest been manifested locally in a presidential election as has been the case during the present campaign.

In Cross Plains voting will take place at the City Hall. Polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Fred W. Stacy will serve as presiding judge. Appointed by the Commissioner Court to assist Stacy were: Howard E. Coburn, F. C. Newton, Mrs. Ross Wagner, Mrs. W. A. Strickland and Miss Missouri Strahan. Several other workers were to be named.

The ballot to be used is one of the largest used in many years. It contains six columns, as compared with only five in the last presidential election year. Too, four proposed amendments to the Texas constitution are to be either ratified or rejected by the electorate.

For convenience of voter in studying the ticket before going to the polls a facsimile ballot appears on page two of today's issue of the Review.

Instruction will be arranged to provide greatest individual help to student musicians and at the same time arrange a program which will be entertaining to the public, said Roland G. Howell, Cross Plains High School bandmaster, yesterday.

Buffaloes, Clyde Clash In Crucial Game Friday

Cross Plains Buffaloes travel to Clyde Friday night for the Bulldogs in an important District 10-A football game.

Two squads will be fighting alive in the chase for district crown. Both teams enter Friday's contest with district marks. The favored Buffaloes defeated the Lions last week with a perfect 3-0 record.

Winner of the crucial contest will be in a position to position or share the district crown.

Surprising Clyde eleven last week end 40-12 in the district's big upset. Previously the bouts Clyde defeated Anna but lost to the Alions.

Cross Plains stayed in championship contention with a 34-15 victory over Eastland Friday. The Buffaloes humbled Santa Anna for their first victory, but the Early team, 32-8, in second contest.

Last week in the district, Alion on top, 3-0; Cross Plains tied for second, Eastland and Early are dead-end for third, 1-2, and Santa Anna in the cellar, 0-3.

Coach Jon Tate had 14 lettersmen at the beginning of the season. Standouts in the forward wall are 160-pound End Barton Scott and 150-pound Mark Garoutee, quarterback. Returning for the Bulldogs in the backfield last year's squad which defeated 14-6, are Harold Watts, tailback and Quarterback Tom Watts was one of the leading scorers in 1959. He has been slowed by an injury this year, and has seen

only limited action recently. The Bulldogs compiled a 3-5-2 season last year and in the current campaign stand at 2-6. Both wins have been in district competition.

Statistically, this season, Clyde has scored 125 points while allowing 164. Cross Plains has scored 110 and allowed the opposition 133.
