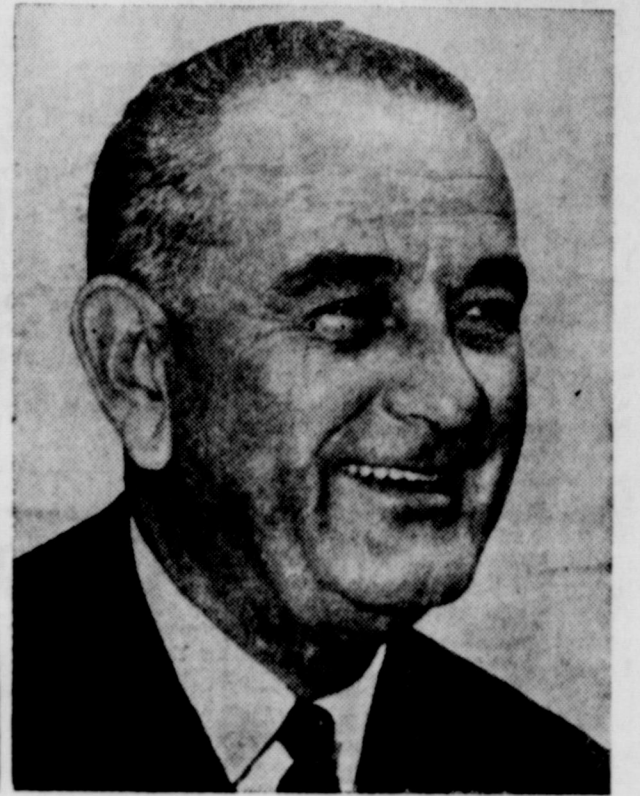

Born Dec. 16, 1867 in Joplin, Mo., she moved as a child with her family to Lyons, Neb., where she was married to W. F. Taylor. He died several years ago.

In 1907, she came to Abilene with her husband, H. R. Dickson where they operated the old Commercial Hotel from 1907 to 1909.

They moved to Washington where she later married William Slater.

In 1956, she returned to Abilene to live with her daughter and son-in-law, Dr. and Mrs. H. A. Pope.

Survivors are the son-in-law; three grandsons, J. Baylis Pope of San Angelo, Judge Jack Pope of San Antonio and Bill Pope of Cross Plains; and one granddaughter, Mrs. Betty Pope Horton of Abilene.

Long Illness Fatal To Vernon Strahan

Vernon Strahan, 64, formerly of Cottonwood, died Friday at 10:45 a.m. in a Galveston hospital after a long illness.

Funeral services were conducted from the First Presbyterian Church in Lamesa Sunday afternoon at three o'clock and burial was in the Lamesa Cemetery.

Mr. Strahan was born and reared at Cottonwood, having left this locality 40 years ago. He was at Big Spring 25 years and for the past 15 had been engaged in the abstract business at Lamesa. He was a veteran of World War I.

Survivors include the widow, two sons, one daughter, three brothers: Ed and O. D. Strahan of Cross Plains and Howard of Odessa, and one sister, Miss Missouri Strahan of Cross Plains.

Bank Increases Capital And Surplus by \$50,000

Capital and surplus of the Citizens State Bank is being raised \$50,000, giving the local financial institution a total of \$150,000 in the capital and certified surplus accounts and making the total capital structure \$273,500.

Enlargement of capital permits broadening of the bank's service functions, including the handling of larger loans. Whereas the loan limit was formerly \$25,000, it is now \$37,500.

Deposits at the Citizens State reached an all-time high shortly after first of the new year, soaring above two and one-half million dollars.

Increasing capital and surplus is regarded in banking circles as a fundamental procedure in strengthening sinews of a financial institution.

"This is realization of a long-planned step," said Fred V. Tunnell, president of the bank yesterday, "and is in keeping with the avowed policy of officers and directors to enlarge and improve services to people of the Cross Plains area."

Annual meeting of the bank's stockholders was held Friday afternoon. No changes were made in the institution's executive staff.

April To Be Busy Month For Voters

Although 1961 is not regarded as an election year, indications point to a busy year for poll tax holders.

In addition to election of City Councilmen and School Trustees, a regular April chore for voters, another proposition is scheduled that month. Texas voters will trek to the polls to name a United States Senator to replace Lyndon B. Johnson, who Friday assumes the vice-presidency. Johnson's successor will be named Tuesday, April 4, at the same time city councilmen are selected.

Members of the council whose terms expire in April are Otis Purvis, C. H. Dawson and Pat McNeel, Jr. Candidates for any of the places must file at least 30 days prior to date of voting.

Tenures of Chester Glover and Ben Atwood will expire as school trustees in April.

Cross Cut Stockmen Ready To Test Herds

A meeting will be set in the Cross Cut Community soon to organize stockmen in that area for a brucellosis testing program of Brown County cattle herds.

Ross J. Newton, who met with state veterinarians this week, advises that a tuberculosis testing program will be carried on at the same time.

"It has been nine years since Brown County herds were checked for TB," he said, "and by conducting the two programs simultaneously it will not be necessary to do the work again in 1962 as originally scheduled."

Brucellosis tests are conducted by taking blood samples from the jugular veins of cows. All herds of 50 or less cows are required to test every animal.

Larger herds may be checked by sampling every other cow if owners prefer.

Newton points out that three men will be required to aid veterinarians in the work in the Cross Cut area. Purpose of the forthcoming meeting will be to designate workers and acquaint livestock men with time and methods to be employed.

Brown County has been divided into six divisions. The Cross Cut area falls in numbers five and six, however, the same procedures will be followed in both localities and the organizational meeting will be for residents of both sections.

It is estimated that between one and three months will be needed to complete the two testing programs in Brown County.

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou discusses ignorance this week, something he may have first-hand knowledge of.

Dear editor:
I don't know about the rest of you, but there are too many countries in the world for me to keep up with.

Just this morning I was talking with a man in town who considers himself pretty well informed and after asking me how I was getting along he said, "Well, how does the situation in Laos look to you?"

Laos? Thunder, how do I know what's happening in Laos when I don't even know what's happening in Eastland County?

By the time I half-keep up with what's happening in Callahan County, in Austin, in Washington, and on this Johnson grass farm, plus a few side-lights and headlines on Moscow, Cuba, and England and France and Germany once in a while, I just don't have any time left for all those other places, especially when at least half of what I learn about most of the places mentioned turns out to be unreliable anyway.

I figure if I learned enough about all the countries that have been in the news lately, such as Algeria, Laos, Belgium, the Congo, Guatemala, etc., to know what was happening, learned enough about them to know who was president of which country and what side he was on, plus who was after his job, I wouldn't have time to do a bit of farming this year, and any time I get too busy to farm, I'm going to do it with something more interesting and satisfying than studying geography. I'd rather be too busy fishing to farm than too busy studying the Congo to farm. A man too lazy to find nothing

better than Congolese politics to avoid plowing, is pretty hard-pressed to know what to do with his time, and deserves to plow.

I know this may be considered backwards in some areas, and it may be, and practiced universally might lead to world confusion, and certainly we don't want that, we're already trying it but I found out long ago that there are lots of countries on this earth that are going to have to get along with me being ignorant of them.

I can't be expected to keep up with the internal politics of Laos when I don't even know the internal politics of Callahan County.

1961 Auto Tags Go On Sale February 1

New 1961 license plates for automobiles, trucks and all vehicles moving on Texas highways, go on sale Feb. 1. In Cross Plains the tags will again be handled by McCuin's Insurance Agency.

County Tax Assessor-Collector Albert C. Lovell reported yesterday that passenger car plates will be white with black letters. Those sold in Callahan County will bear the letters CY, preceding numerals. Callahan County tags will begin with the number CY 6250 and continue through CY 9699.

It is expected that between \$75,000 and \$100,000 will be paid for license plates in this county during 1961.

Truck plates assigned to Callahan County begin with IP 7800 and run through IP 8649. Farm pick-ups are in two groups. The first start with 8F 9625 and continues through 8F 9999. The second group begins with 8H 230 and runs through 8H 474.

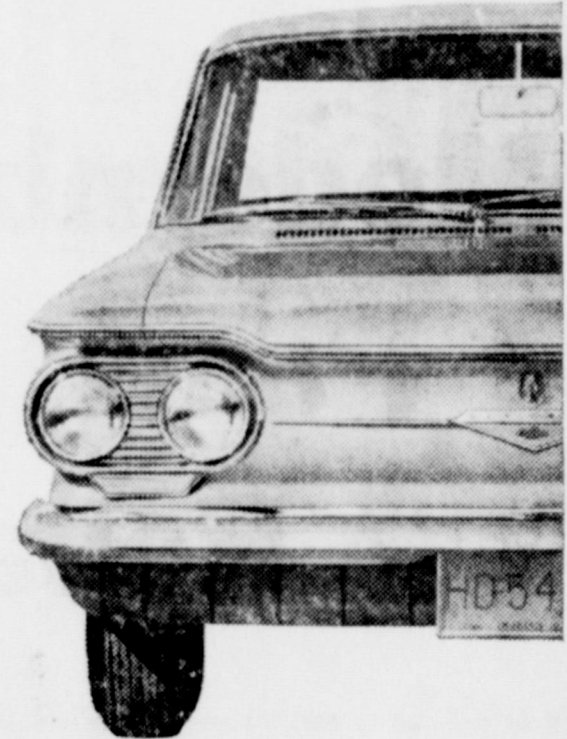

What Lies Ahead For America? 14 Local Men Make Predictions

With the United States changing Presidents Friday, Review publishers felt that readers might be interested in a cross section forecast by a number of local people regarding what they foresee for the near future and possibly the next four years. Accordingly, a number were interviewed by telephone. They opined as follows:

TOM BRYANT: "I do not see a bright future. The nation seems on the brink of a depression and a major war is definitely within the realm of immediate possibility."

J. L. (Poky) BONNER: "There will doubtlessly be many financial fluctuations within coming months, however the threat of worldwide conflict seems less than it was last summer. I believe our economy will remain stable and the U. S. will be doing business in the same old way and at the same old stand for a long time to come."

TROY CROCKETT: "The immediate future seems to promise

a continuance of about what we have known for the past several years. I'd say the outlook for the large farmer is possibly a little brighter and that for the small farmer a bit darker."

RAYMOND DEBUSK: "The future looks rather secure. The cattle market is much more stable than four months ago. I'm betting on things going well. Like everybody else, I'm scared of war and hoping for peace."

J. C. CLABORN: "Predicting the future is a little out of my line, however, I'm expecting the economy to remain sound. Nobody knows whether or not there'll be a war but the chances of escaping one might be a little better than several months ago."

CLAUDE MAYES: "The most serious problem confronting the nation and the entire world is the threat of war. I believe a major conflict will be averted. Business conditions appear headed toward improvement."

REV. HAROLD G. WISE: "Many changes are probably in store for us within the next few years. Some will be good and others bad."

BILL POPE: "I'm a little pessimistic concerning the future. I fear we will have one of three bad experiences: a war, socialism or a major depression. Of the three, I believe the latter preferable."

NEAL DILLARD: "The future seems to look good to me. I rather expect some improvement in business conditions and most everyone to get along reasonably well. My guess would be less unemployment and no major war."

DALE BISHOP: "I predict neither a boom nor a financial break. Any change in business will, I feel, be for the better. As long as America remains strong war will probably be averted."

HAROLD GARRETT: "The present recession will probably expand until March and then make a turn for the better. There will likely be a worsening of the agricultural economy with tighter controls. On the international scene I expect a continuance of 'brush fires' but no conflagration."

C. H. DAWSON: "Business will likely show substantial improvement within the next year or two. I foresee no war in the immediate future."

ALBERT LOVELL: "I'm optimistic concerning the future. No war and improved general business conditions appear very probable."

BILLY MAC COPPINGER: By 1962, we likely will see business conditions become better. My guess would be no World War, however, deterioration of conditions in South America seem imminent. That too, though, will eventually be worked out."
