It's at times like this that weather predicting takes on the same impossible job of a public opinion poll. Sometimes a poll is right, sometimes wrong, and a citizen is left with the job of predicting for himself which poll and which forecast is right. The weather, like people, doesn't always follow a predictable pattern, which is the reason no candidate knows what the voters thought until all the votes are counted and then I don't always know what the weather will be tomorrow until I get up the next day and look at my thermometer. And sometimes then it seems like it's colder than the thing shows. Weather forecasting has a long way to go before it can tell me today how much clothes I need to wear tomorrow.
