United Fund To Be Started Here

One community-wide drive to supplant all other local canvases for charitable and civic undertakings will be tried in Cross Plains.

Sixteen business and professional men in attendance at the regular monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce in the basement of the First Methodist Church Tuesday at noon, voted unanimously to launch the undertaking. It would be called a United Fund Drive.

Delegated to serve as convener in arranging an initial meeting of United Fund committeemen was Rev. Harold G. Wise, local Presbyterian pastor. He will contact representatives of other civic, religious and fraternal groups and endeavor to formulate an organization to mount the campaign in early Autumn.

One Big Campaign

Plans call for raising money for all causes in one drive, thereby eliminating separate campaigns for Polio, Heart, Cancer, Multiple Sclerosis, Salvation Army, Crippled Children, Boy and Girl Scouts, Red Cross, Christmas contributions, and any others which are periodically made here.

It was pointed out at the meeting Tuesday that Cross Plains has contributed generously to some causes and virtually ignored others. A budget committee from the United Fund would correct this by hearing requests from all groups and apportioning monies in keeping with need and availability.

Indicative of the haphazard manner in which this community has handled its contributions to charities was a report given by Mrs. Homer Moon, home service worker for the American Red Cross.

"Cross Plains is dragging its feet in this endeavor", she said. More than \$200 has been spent in rendering aid to local servicemen within the past year, she reported, and there has been no fund drive here for the Red Cross. Other sections of the county have necessarily borne the burden.

C of C Gives \$100

To temporarily alleviate this condition the Chamber of Commerce contributed \$100 from its treasury to be given to the Red Cross. This is for immediate use and will not be a part of the allocation to later be made by the general United Fund committee.

The Rev. Mr. Wise asks that local organizations, namely: Chamber of Commerce, the Lions Club, Garden Club, Sew & So Club, Woodmen of the World, the Masonic Lodge, Eastern Star, Parent-Teacher Association and others, appoint one member to serve on the United Fund general committee. Notification of the appointment of each organization's representative is asked by July 1.

The United Fund committee will meet some time in August and set up its own rules of operation. It is expected that the citizens and business firms will cooperate in a United Fund in the Autumn.

Torrential rains north of Cross Plains Sunday night and early Monday morning sent streams on rampaging rises and inundated lowlands.

Turkey Creek swelled beyond its banks and flooded about 40 acres adjacent to Highway 36 in the west part of town. The City Park on the east side of the creek was underwater, as also was lowland north of the road.

Livestock Drowned

From all sections of the Cross Plains area came reports of livestock drowning, fences and water-gaps swept away and crops damaged. A. L. Breeding had moved a combine into an oats field and planned to begin cutting Monday. The stand of small grain was levelled by rushing water, a total loss. J. L. Bonner reported five strings of fence on the Cutbirth ranch lost to the flood. Bill Calhoun told of similar damage at the Mrs. J. P. Smith place five miles west of town. Eugene Wilcoxon lost five head of sheep.

In the Putnam area about 150 head of sheep were reported lost.

the Charley Coats place creeks got out of banks and did extensive damage. Reports from that area were that the total rainfall was near 10 inches.

Pecan Bayou overflowed its banks at Burkett and shoved such quantities of water into Brownwood Lake that water ran six feet deep over the spillway. On Highway 279, between here and Brownwood, water was almost to the bridge floor at the crossing just south of the home of Mrs. Lonnie Edington.

Rail Service Cut

Railroad right-of-way was washed out south of Baird and the Texas & Pacific Railroad was forced to press buses into operation to shuttle passengers and mail from Cisco to Abilene.

The flood was said by D. C. Cox, of the Soil Conservation office in Baird, to be the most destructive to ravish this section since the deluge of the Autumn of 1957.

The rain which began about midnight Sunday and continued until nearly sunrise Monday was particularly destructive for the reason that it followed heavy precipitations of the night before. Both rains measured only 2.42 inches in Cross Plains, according to S. F. Bond, local weather observer, however, on all sides of this city it was reported much heavier. C. R. Cook gauged 8.75 at his place 10 miles west of town. At Baird, where several homes were flooded, the two-day fall was measured at 9.50 inches.

Crops Damaged

All over this area damage was reported to grain crops which were waiting harvesters. Oats apparently suffered more than wheat. Dale Gary, local grain buyer, explained it this way: "Oats simply can't take as much punishment as wheat". Telephone calls to all sections of the Cross Plains area Tuesday afternoon revealed most ponds had run around, promising a sufficiency of stock water for Summer months.

Outlook for the city's ability to supply hot-weather demands for water in Cross Plains was reported good yesterday by Mayor Ted Souder.

Rainfall this week brought the total received thus far this year in Cross Plains to 15.12 inches. The first five months aggregate this year was 12.47. This is the heaviest here since 1957 when 20.37 fell during the first five months of the year. The average for the past 11 years here has been 9.27 for the first five months of the year.

PHILOSOPHER SAYS EFFICIENCY IS ANSWER FOR SMALL FARMS OR BIG CITIES

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou discusses efficiency this week, but we can't say with how much success.

Dear editor: I realize that while whole countries are disappearing these days, worrying over the disappearance of the so-called family-type farm seems like a waste of time if not misapplication of thought, but according to an article I read in a newspaper last night, a lot of people are concerned about this matter.

But I'm as interested in the actual disappearance of the small farm as I am in what these people think will bring it about.

According to them, inefficiency is the cause. The small farmer has got to get more efficient if he expects to stay on his farm, they argue.

I don't know about this. In my own case, I don't expect to get any more efficient, and I don't expect to move off this Johnson grass farm. People confuse efficiency with bigness. To me, a four-row cultivator is something you can work your land with in half the time it took with a two-row outfit, but to other people it's something you can work twice as much land with in the same long hours.

Efficiency can be overdone. For example, in this same paper I was reading last night, I noticed that a contest was in New York the other day to see which was the fastest to get across midtown Manhattan. The results showed you cross this center of American culture and efficiency about as fast in a horse and buggy as you can in a car, and even if you foot you won't be far behind.

Efficiency has produced automobiles in such numbers that becoming useless in big cities and cities themselves have come so efficient they're manageable.

Airplanes have become so efficient and numerous they try to circle around an airport hour to find a place to land. Government has become so efficient the tax payers can't afford it.

It was efficiency that reduced the bomb that'll kill a hundred thousand times as many people than a cannon ball.

The way it looks to me, efficiency is the hope of man and the small farm is the refuge of this style of operation. The last thing the world is doing is coming out here telling me how to get more efficient. In my case, it might matter, but some farmers listen.
