FEDERAL COTTON CONTRACTS WILL BE READY FOR SIGNING JANUARY 1: 35 TO 45 PERCENT REDUCTION

1. 35 TO 45 PERCENT REDUCTION

The 1934-35 Cotton Acreage Reduction Contract offered by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration calls for a 35 per cent to 45 per cent reduction in cotton acreage with a flatal payment running as high as \$15.00 per acre on the land taken out of production, and a parity payment of not less than one cent per pound for 40 per cent of the average five year losse period, from 1928 to 1932. \$75,000 OPTION CONTRACTS ARE RECEIVED HERE

Two hundred and eighty Government Cotton Option contracts covering a total of 3,725 hales of cotton were received here Thursday afternoon by J. B. Waide, Jr. county farm agent. The value of these contracts at the present price of cotton is approximately \$75,-606,000. Mr. Waide stated that these option contracts could not be deliver-deceased to the contracts and the suthority was received from Wahington Treceived from Wahington The Contracts of the producers on the same day. In this way no individual or section of the country will benefit by receiving the option first.

All of the option contracts are made out only in the name of the producer. After the producer receives his contract he may piedge it using the form which is provided for this purpose to any person to whom he wishes to pass his heading the may be to the may piedge it using the form which keeper may execute the producer. Then the present to whom he wishes to pass his contract for 16 bales of cotton. Richard Roe, his landlord, is interested in this contract to the extent of 25 per cent or 2½ bales. The cotton option contract will be made in the name of the producer. Joint check will not be made in payment of these option contracts. However, Richard Roe may decide to buy 3m Doe's interest in the cotton option contract as if he were the producer and the check would be sixed to Richard Roe and then exercise the option contract as for any option contracts are pledged, they must be pledged in full.

Mr. Waide went on to say that the landlord would be given due notice before any check would be released.


