Times That Try Men's Souls

(An Editorial)

People generally believe as they choose, be the question religion, politics or international crisis. Most all are agreed, however, that the United States stands on the brink of war. The situation is much like the weather; it could clear in a few days or develop into a ghastly storm. There is unanimity of opinion, however, that the Western Allies have been pushed to a precipice from which there is no safe step backward. Courage and resolution, no yielding of territory or ideals, promise the only solution.

It is possible that developments in Berlin, Cuba or any of a dozen other trouble spots could trigger hostilities.

War, however, does not necessarily mean the employment of nuclear weapons. Fear of retaliation could stay their use by both sides. Both the Allies and Axis powers had deadly poison gasses during World War II, yet neither resorted to their use. Only in isolated incidents in China were they utilized.

On the other hand, if nuclear warfare is the only alternative to capitulation to the Russians, Americans have but one choice. Doomsday is preferable to centuries of

With oneness of purpose, complete dedication in strengthening the fibre of the nation's defenses, willingness to sacrifice personal fortunes and personal pleasures and privileges, America's strength will prevail. Free people, determined to perpetuate liberty for their children, the teachings of Christendom and dignity of the individual are not easily conquered or annihilated.

The time calls, however, for abandonment of partisan politics and dedication to a single objective. Confidence in our leaders and subrogation of personal fortunes is the only answer.

Americans have faced grim days before and always responded heroicly. This generation must be no




