

People Of This Area Show Good Samaritanism

People of the Cross Plains have again evidenced the spirit that they're Good Samaritans.

An effort launched here Monday morning to raise \$3,000 for the Cross Plains fund organization met with spectacular success. More than 95 per cent was raised in a single day. The drive chair-ported Tuesday night \$2,864.31 was raised in

the first day's canvassing. "We are not quite over the top," he said, "but enthusiasm on the part of both workers and donors promises certain success in this undertaking."

Thirty-five women met at a local restaurant Tuesday morning at nine o'clock and after a brief orientation, divided into solicitation teams to cover all portions of the Cross Plains area. Mrs. J. Peyton Smith and Mrs. Edwin Baum, who headed the women can-

vassers, said that many householders and proprietors of business firms were absent when their places were visited but that solicitors would return later this week.

The United Fund, recently organized in Cross Plains with Presbyterian Pastor, Rev. Harold G. Wise as president, will supplant all other charity drives during the next 12 months. No other campaigns are to be locally sanctioned, the Review was told by members of the

UF board of directors.

Money raised in the present campaign will go to support: Boy Scouts, American Cancer Fund, March of Dimes, West Texas Rehabilitation Center, Campfire Girls, Red Cross, American Heart Association, local charities including Christmas cheer, Salvation Army, Relief of Crippled Children, Texas United Defense Fund and Mental Health.

It was pointed out that the \$2,864.31 was raised only

through enthusiastic support of all communities of the Cross Plains area. Atwell, for instance, was said to have sparked the local campaign by making the drive there Tuesday of last week and turning in \$153.

Workers were busy at Cross Cut, Burkett, Dressy, Rowden, Cottonwood, Pioneer, Atwell and in other rural sectors yesterday and will continue several days more as all homes are reached.

Up to the time the \$2,864.31 was reported by Baum Tuesday night, complete returns were not available from any community, however, he said all workers reported people cooperative and generous.

"It is humanly impossible to see every person," Baum said last night, "it will be genuinely appreciated if anyone who is overlooked will mail a gift to any of the workers, or leave it at the Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains for credit to

the United Fund account. Donors who contribute in this manner will be credited individually."

"It would be impossible to convey sufficient thanks to those who worked so efficiently and those who gave so generously in Tuesday's drive," Baum said last night, "I do wish to say thanks, though, in behalf of the many fine agencies which will be helped by this example of good citizenship."

Home Towner

The hackneyed, old saying: "A small world," is proved true again. An occurrence Friday called to mind a series of incidents, all of which substantiate the "small world" idea. Waco real estate man stopped here for a few minutes. In brief conversation he said he was returning home to Big Spring where he'd go to take a blind man to a hospital. He'd only been acquainted with the man a few days and related the incidents surrounding their meeting. "I was in my front yard at home," he said, "and noticed a blind man had walked onto a neighboring lawn and was being hit by a water sprinkler. He didn't know which way to go. I was getting quite wet. I reproached myself and directed him home. His name was Ed Petty, who farms three miles south of Cross Plains. His crop sold at the rate of \$317.31 per ton.

It wouldn't have been Rev. Darby, would it," the man was asked. "But I don't know his name?" he explained that a minister named Darby had formerly pastored the First Baptist Church in Cross Plains and that he was losing his sight when he was nearly 30 years ago. "I last heard from him somewhere in the Waco area," he said.

It's odd how things happen. Waco man had no idea that friend had ever passed this way.

It's more unusual, however, that one which happened in New York City in 1951. Cross Plains family stopped at friends on Long Island. A 10-year-old local girl was engaged in playing in the yard with a group of New York youngsters. A neighbor, sitting on a porch, heard her talk and noticed she was not a native.

"Where are you from, honey," she asked. "Cross Plains," responded the girl as though anyone should know her town.

"The heck you are, I'm from King Star," said the man who bounded out of his chair to knock on his neighbor's door to get acquainted with the Texas girl.

The strangest incident of this kind as far as the Home Towner is concerned, happened some 100 miles away about 16 years ago.

While in a bombed-out captaining on the island of Iwo Jima one wet Sunday after this writer was watching a tropical rain fall in torrential fashion, a tarpaulin covered the roof, and water ran down a solid sheet.

While absent-mindedly at a table of water, it was almost impossible to see Lloyd Bryan lumbering through the rain. He had been 18 months in the two Cross Plains men's prison, one another, back on the island of the old home town. When he'd regained his senses, Lloyd commented: "Turkey Creek will be run tonight."

Methodist Church To Get New Pastor

The Rev. Mr. McAfee, who is coming to Cross Plains, is a nephew of Rev. J. U. McAfee, who pastored the First Methodist Church here about 12 years ago.

The Rev. Mr. Harper has been here nearly two years, having come to the local congregation from Corsicana.

File Additional Charge In Callahan Cattle Rustling

An additional cattle rustling charge has been filed against Francis Glenn Moody, 43, of San Angelo, one of three facing counts of livestock theft in Callahan County.

Moody already is charged with two counts of cattle theft in Taylor county, cattle and goat theft charges in Callahan County and forgery by endorsement at San Angelo. Charged with him in separate cases are Carroll Wayne Williams, 40, of Rt. 1, Cross Plains, and Williams' wife, Laura, who is Moody's ex-wife.

Authorities said the new charges against Moody are based on the alleged theft of a cow from the Herman Davis farm about five miles east of Denton Valley in Callahan County and 17 head of goats near Okra in Eastland County.

Officers working on the detailed investigation which now has lasted more than three months include Deputy Sheriffs Byron Richardson and Tod New-

ton of Callahan County, Sheriff J. D. Woodard and Deputy Ray Trammell of Taylor County and George Maxwell, 42nd District Attorney investigator.

Williams is charged in Callahan County with a cattle theft and three goat theft charges. Investigating officers said additional charges may be filed before the case is completed.

The purchase will give local firemen 1,500 feet of hosing, making it possible for them to extend fire-fighting facilities to every dwelling within the city limits. Several buildings were formerly out of range.

The new hose is in 50 foot joints, with special couplings and gaskets. It is guaranteed for five years and has a life expectancy of 20 years.

August Garlitz Has First Peanuts Here

First load of peanuts from the new crop was sold in Cross Plains Monday by August Garlitz, who lives in the Cross Cut area. Buyer was B. D. Montgomery, representing Ellis Gainey Peanut Company of Abilene.

The initial load to arrive here included 120 bags. It tested 64 and sold at the rate of \$315.48 per ton.

Second load of peanuts from the new crop was also bought by Montgomery for the same account. It was brought in by

Ed Petty, who farms three miles south of Cross Plains. His crop sold at the rate of \$317.31 per ton.

"Peanut harvesting is just now getting into full swing throughout the Cross Plains area," said Montgomery yesterday, "and the crop will really start moving to market this week end."

The 1961 peanut crop is believed to be one of the latest in history. Ordinarily, the first load of new crop peanuts is sold in Cross Plains around Sept. 1.

Baird And Ranger Move To 10-A Football District

In the three games with Class AA opponents Cross Plains has averaged \$237.86 per game, whereas against Class B opposition the average for two games has been \$316.81.

PHILOSOPHER NOT AFRAID OF MACHINES. ENSLAVING MAN, MAN CAN DO IT ALONE

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou is not afraid of machines, his letter this week claims.

Dear editor:

"I never have been worried over the chances of machines replacing man, as some people seem to fear as the machines get more and more complicated, especially the big, block-long electronic brain machines. In the first place, any time a machine can take over any job of work I'm doing, it's welcome to it. Nothing about that prospect that scares me.

"But I was interested in the reasons a scientist gave the other day on why machines will not replace man.

"According to this scientist, machines can't really think, they have to depend on man to put them into operation and to tell them what to add or subtract or multiply. And therefore, he said, to clinch his point, 'machines will never outstrip and enslave man, they lack reason and cannot do what man endowed with reason can do, namely, screen sense from nonsense and make decisions from inadequate or even incorrect data.'

"As I understand this scientist's argument, if you feed a machine the wrong information, it'll come up with the wrong answer, it's only when you feed it the right information that it can come up with a correct answer, whereas if you feed man with the wrong information, he'll reason his way out and still

come up with the correct answer.

"Now I'll tell you. This scientist may know a whole lot about machines, but I'm afraid he doesn't know a whole lot about people.

"Two-thirds of the world today is being fed the wrong information and so far the people have reasoned their way through it no better than what you'd expect out of a hand-cranked adding machine.

"Invariably, I suppose, when you feed the wrong information to a machine, bells ring and lights flash 'tilt' and it comes up with the wrong answer, but feed the wrong information to people and you never know whether they're going to blow a fuse or throw their hats in the air and vote for you. There's many an office-holder today who owes his success to the fact people aren't as apt as machines when it comes to analyzing data.

"People are more like my tractor engine. Regardless of what kind of gasoline you pour into it, it won't always plow.

"It may be true that machines will never enslave man, but we really don't need a machine for that anyway. Man is managing to do that by himself."

Don't We Learn Anything From The Past?

(AN EDITORIAL)

Right up to the bombing of Pearl Harbor, which thrust America into World War II, this country shipped scrap-iron to Japan. Many rail carloads went from Cross Plains as well as most every other city in the nation.

The forthcoming conflict with Japan was apparent at that time, and average citizens repeatedly commented how silly it was for this nation to sell a potential enemy the one thing it needed to wage bloody war. Everybody knew better but nobody did anything about it. Shipments continued right up to the time of the Sneak Attack.

Because of this short-sightedness, American blood washed the beaches of many Pacific islands. The cream of our young manhood was slain by bullets and bombs which the Japs could have never produced in quantity with out scrap-iron which they did not have.

Everybody saw the mistake and everybody said it would never happen again.

Now we wonder.

A situation very similar was brought to light last week almost by accident. This country has contracted to sell Yugoslavia 135 Saberjet fighting planes and is currently training a cadre of eight Yugoslavs at Perrin Air Force Base in Sherman to man the ships and teach others of their countrymen. The sad thing about the situation is that this type of business has been going on for years. The Pentagon said Saturday deliveries are also being made on 70 TV2 Navy jet trainers sold to Yugoslavia in a deal made in 1959.

Any grammar school youngster can tell you Yugoslavia is a Communist country, ruled by Marshall Tito, who may have had a few minor rifts with the Kremlin, but openly opposes democratic ideals as fostered by the United States.

Trading with Yugoslavia is reminiscent of the scrap-iron commerce with Japan. This time, however, we're also throwing in military knowledge by training a potential enemy, revealing to him the tactics and strategy of our aircraft.

It has been charged that Cuban pilots are receiving training from Yugoslavs in Europe. This has not been confirmed, but it is a distinct possibility. Tito and Castro give signs of close political kinship.

Many Texans in Congress — both Democrat and Republican — have announced themselves diametrically opposed to this type of dealing. As yet, however, it has not been stopped. We could one day be very sorry.

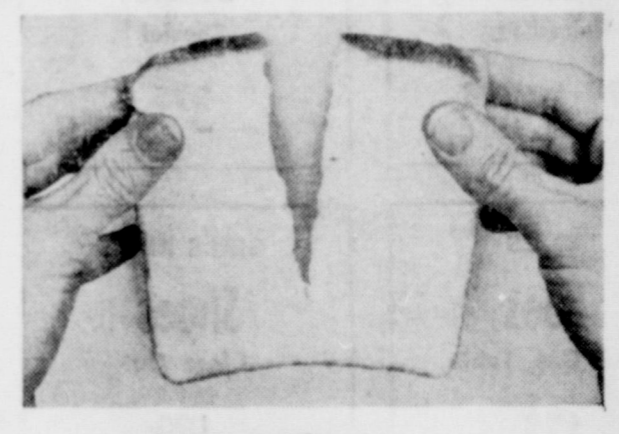

Santa Anna's Running Sinks Buffaloes 14-6

Santa Anna Mountaineers used the long run Friday night to take a 14-6 victory over the Cross Plains Buffaloes.

Friday's tilt was the first District 10-A contest for both teams.

It was the running of three backs behind bruising line play that earned Santa Anna's triumph. The Mountaineers' rolled up 318 yards on the ground, but their passing attack was completely impotent as they did not connect on a single aerial in five attempts. The Buffs almost equally divided their offensive yardage, getting 92 rushing and 96 via the air lanes.

Mountaineers wasted no time in rining up their first touchdown scoring the first time they touched the pigskin. Speedy halfback Tinker Dockery reeled off 52 yards on Santa Anna's third play from scrimmage. Dockery broke fast over the left side for the counter after he had gained four yards and fullback Harold Walker duplicated the feat. The hard running Walker blasted over right tackle for the two points.

The tough Mountaineer defense stymied the Buff offense except for occasional spurts in the first half. Cross Plains got no further than the hosts' 48-yard line.

Santa Anna put the game on ice four minutes and four seconds into the third period. The Mountaineers took an out of bounds kickoff on their 35, and marched the needed 65 yards in 10 plays with fullback Walker scrambling the final 23 yards, evading three or four Buff defenders. Quarterback Pete Simmons failed to get the two point conversion on a keeper off the right side.

Late in the final period Cross

Plains blitzed 94 yards to their touchdown. Buff guard Emory Lusk stopped a Santa Anna threat when he covered a loose ball on the Buff six yard line. Quarterback Doug Dallas engineered the 13 play drive alternating ground and passing plays nicely.

Right halfback L. V. Falkner sparked the drive with a 27 yard burst up the middle after the Bison found themselves needing a yard and facing fourth down on their own 15. On the next play Falkner was on the receiving end of a 20 yard aerial, and following the pass he got six more yards to the Santa Anna 33. Right end Darrell Wyatt snagged an 11-yard toss for a first on the Mountie 22. Two short passes netted five more yards then left end Charles Barr did a diving catch on a 10-yarder tipped into the air by a defender for a first on the Santa Anna seven.

Falkner got four to the three the fullback Jay Wilcoxon hit over right guard for the touchdown. A Dallas to right halfback Dwayne Clark pitch went astray on the conversion attempt.

Alert defenders choked off two Santa Anna threats, a penalty stopped one and the clock killed another.

Left tackle Keith Watkins halted a mild threat when he pounced on a loose ball on the Buffs' 26 in the first quarter. A 15 yard penalty nullified a 30 yard TD gallop by Mountaineer right halfback Randy Brown which forced the hosts to punt. 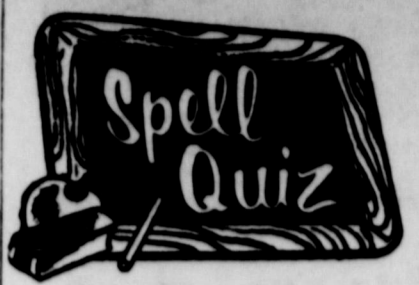
