PHILOSOPHER DOESN'T WANT TO LIVE IN ALASKA BECAUSE OF POOR MISSILE AIM

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou tells where he wouldn't like to live, his letter this week reveals.

Dear editor:

"I have long since given up arguing with people over whether it's better to live in the country or in town, on account of it dawned on me that's one argument a man in the country ought to lose, because the more people there are in town, the less there are in the country, and that's a pretty good argument."

"At any rate, I got to thinking about places to live the other day and while this Johnson grass farm out here suits me, I'm pretty well dug in and I don't know of anything that could pry me loose outside of a tax eviction notice from the sheriff, I suppose there are other people who feel the same way about their location."

"Then I got to thinking about places I wouldn't want to live, and heading the list is Alaska."

"Now I haven't got anything against Alaska, if she wanted in the Union to help us share the debt burden that's her lookout, but you couldn't pay me enough to live there, and I'll tell you why. It's not because of the climate. Even if they changed the temperature up there and made it pleasant to live the year-round, still wouldn't be interested."

"The reason I wouldn't be interested is on account of the scientific ability of mankind. I don't trust it yet. I mean I don't trust it's aim, and when I say aim I mean its shooting aim."

"That is, say Russia and the United States get into a push-button war, as most civilized people figure they will. All right, which is the shortest route for guided missiles between the secret launching pads of each country? Right over Alaska, of course. And how good is the aim of these missile scientists? Well, it ain't good enough to make Alaska a safe place to be."

"Two out of three successful and accurate launchings of a missile is considered a pretty good batting average these days, which means a third of the missiles from both countries could fall in the lap of Alaska, just by accident."

"A good portion of Alaska may be like this Johnson grass farm — it's not worth wasting a bomb on — but if I lived in Alaska, I'd either move or push hard for more accuracy among the missile scientists."

"Man is going to have to improve his aim a lot before it's safe to start a missile war."

State Representative Scott Bailey reminds local merchants of the new Sunday "blue law" which became operative Wednesday, Nov. 1.

The statute, enacted by the last legislature, makes it illegal for stores to offer 46 items for sale seven days per week. Firms

which operate on Saturday are banned from doing business on the items on Sunday. Stores which close on Saturday, however, may do business on Sunday.

Items restricted from sale seven days per week are: clothing, clothing accessories, wearing apparel, footwear, headwear, home, business and outdoor furniture, kitchenware, kitchen utensils, china, home appliances, washing machines, driers, cameras, hardware, tools—excluding non-power driven hand tools, jewelry, precious or semi-precious stones, silverware, watches, clocks, luggage, motor vehicles, musical instruments, recordings, toys, excluding items customarily sold as novelties and souvenirs, mattresses, bed coverings, household lines, floor coverings, lamps, draperies, blinds, curtains, mirrors, lawn mowers and piece goods.

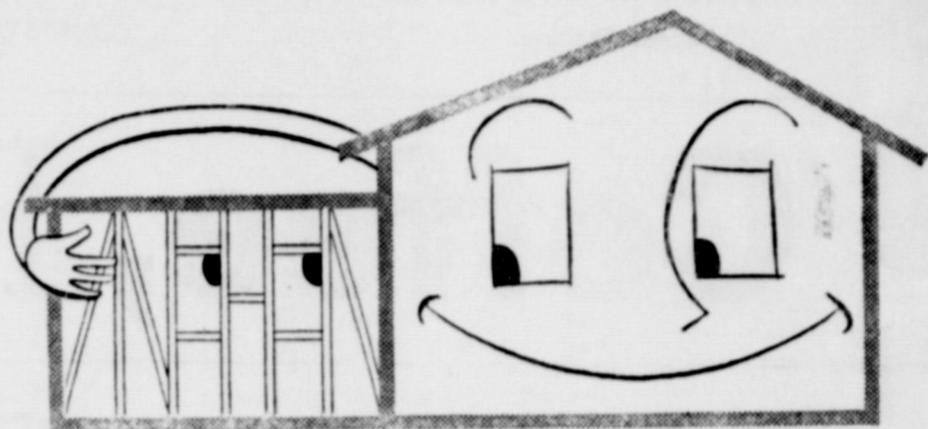

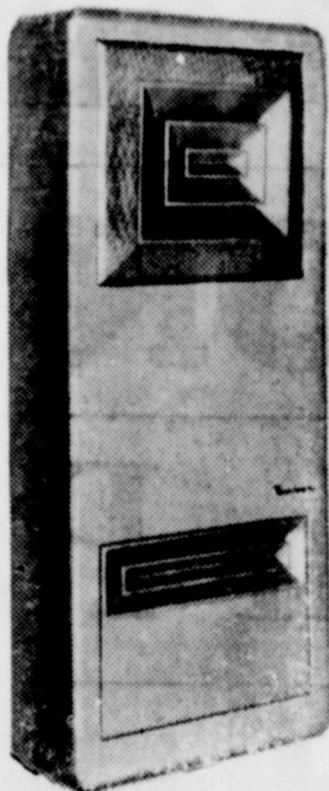
