## Cabbie, 54, Tries Suicide At Motel

William Wesley Barnett, 54-year-old Brownwood man, was found near dead in the Hillcrest Motel in Cross Plains Monday morning at 11:30, following an overdose of sleeping pills.

Investigating officers ruled the incident attempted suicide and said that Barnett left a note directing disposition of his body. Barnett, a taxi-cab driver, checked in at the motel Sunday morning just before noon. He was not seen again until a maid entered his room to clean up 24 hours later. He is said to have been mentally depressed since the death of his mother about a year ago.

Deputy Sheriff Byron Richardson and Highway Patrolman Jerry Mathews, investigating officers, telephoned a local physician who examined Barnett and directed that he be rushed to a Brownwood hospital. Reports from the bedside late Tuesday were that he remains in a critical condition.

Mr. Atwood, a retired farmer, had been ill since Oct. 5. Born in Williamson County, Mr. Atwood lived in Cross Plains until 1926, when he moved his family to Lubbock. The Atwood home was that one mile east of town, now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Ode Strahan.

The deceased had been a deacon in the Baptist Church 57 years. He had contributed every month for many years to the upkeep of Cross Plains Cemetery.

Survivors are two daughters, Mrs. J. W. Reid and Miss Ruby Atwood, both of Lubbock; a foster son, Sidney Ratcliffe, Gustine, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. W. E. Jones of Lubbock and Mrs. C. W. (Chess) Barr of Cross Plains; a brother, C. E. Atwood of Abilene, one granddaughter and three great grandchildren.

Nephews served as pallbearers. Attending funeral services from Cross Plains were Mr. and Mrs. Barr and Mrs. H. C. Williams.

## Testing Program Shows Local Schools Among Nation's Best

How do Cross Plains Schools compare with others across the nation?

Do students leave the local educational system better or poorer equipped for college and adult life than their counterparts across the country?

These questions, which have occupied the thoughts of parents and patrons, were definitely answered last week when re-

turns from a national student testing program were received here.

A comprehensive examination given 38 members of the present senior class at Cross Plains High School, covering all phases of training from first grade to the twelfth, reveals the local institution in the top 10 percent of the nation. Average grade of the class as a whole

here was 90. National average is 50.

Test results, said by educators to be a measurable yardstick of the overall job being done by a school, were studied by members of the board of trustees in regular meeting Monday night. Cognizance was taken of the fields in which local students scored well and corrective measures discussed for the areas

in which grades were lower.

Trustees expressed themselves gratified with the fact that of the 38 seniors tested, 29 were above the national norm and only nine below.

Best results by Cross Plains students were in social sciences and mathematics. Only one phase of the testing revealed them below the national average. That was in use of reference books: encyclopedias and related sources.

Compared with other American secondary schools, local students were given the following percentiles: 97 in basic social concepts, 76 in natural science background, 97 in correctness of expression, 92 in quantitative thinking, 89 in interpretation of social studies, 84 in interpretation of natural sciences, 69 in interpretation of literature, 86 in vocabulary and 44 in use of source material.

Studies started in the primary grades are believed to influence the entire learning process. Supt. Paul Whitton, therefore, instituted the study of phonics in the first three grades six years ago, and this year the subject is being continued through the fourth. Other corrective practices are likewise being made a part of the school curriculum here and are believed to have contributed to the 25 percentile improvement made by this year's senior class.

The testing program is being continued at all grade levels, in accordance with recommendations of the Texas Education Agency as a constant check on results and progress.

Cross Plains Schools have incorporated the counseling and guidance program, providing a specially trained instructor to confer with individual students and point out areas of deficiency and ways of correction. The counselor here is B. C. Godwin, who also serves other Callahan County schools.

Funeral for Claude Alexander Humphreys, 77, of near Bangs, a former resident of Burkett, was held Sunday from a Brownwood funeral home.

Mr. Humphreys died Friday at 3:30 p.m. at his home. Born Sept. 6, 1884, in Burkett, Mr. Humphreys had lived in Brown County since 1923 and was a retired barber. He was a Baptist.

He is survived by his wife, Anne; one son, Welton Humphreys of Alice; one daughter, Mrs. Horace Haile of Gonzales; four brothers, Rufus Humphreys of San Antonio, J. J. Humphreys of California, Wash Humphreys of Fort Worth and Vernon Humphreys of Las Cruces, N. M.; one sister, Mrs. Sam Waring of Fort Stockton and four grandchildren.

## Car Smash-Up Fatal To Dale McCook, 49

Dale McCook, 49, former Cross Plains High School band director, died Monday in Hope, Ark., of injuries sustained a few hours earlier in an automobile accident.

The body was returned to Abilene, which has been his home the past several years, and funeral was held there Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock. Burial was in Elmwood Memorial Park at Abilene.

McCook came to Cross Plains in 1938 and directed the local school band during its formative years. Under his leadership the band won many state and one national honor. It was during his tenure that first uniforms for the band were purchased. He went from here to Baird in 1940 and directed the band there. For a number of years, however, he has been in the ministry and engaged in the insurance business as well. He was returning from having conducted religious services at Camden, Ark., when the fatal accident occurred.

Surviving are his wife, the former Norma Krey; a daughter, Mrs. Joe (Mary Dale) Wilcox of Dodge City; two sons, Billy Fred and John Robert, both of the home; his mother, Mrs. Billie McCook of Abilene; his father J. R. McCook of Lubbock; his brother, W. E. (Mose) McCook, owner of the Athletic Supply in Abilene, and a half sister, Jo Jean McCook of Lubbock.

# Buffaloes Close Grid Season With Loss To Albany Lions

Great line play and downfield blocking paved the way for fleet Albany Lion backs to run past the Cross Plains Buffaloes 61-8 in Lion Stadium Friday night.

The defending class A state champion Lions streaked to a 20 point lead before five minutes had elapsed in the first quarter. They added to their first period lead by annexing 13 points in the second, seven in the third and 21 in the final stanza.

Cross Plains found the Lion defense vulnerable by going to the air and scoring their touchdown in the second period. Buffalo quarterback Doug Dallas' fine passing arm kept the Buffs in possession of the pigskin for the major portion of the game.

Dallas connected on a possible record of 26 of 47 passes, while flying to 234 yards in the air. Right halfback Darrell Wyatt was Dallas' primary target, gathering in 10 aeriels for 99 yards, and the touchdown. Right end Jerry Payne hauled in the two point conversion and caught seven passes for 49

yards. Left end Charles Barr got 34 yards on five completions, primarily of the screen pass variety, and fullback Jay Wilcoxon and left halfback Max Howell, who was slowed by an injury, each grabbed two tosses for 28 and 24 yards respectively.

Pass interceptions and a fumble played a major part in the lop-sided score Friday night. Two Lions interceptions staved off goalward thrusts by the Buffs and Lion halfbacks Gary Hise and Johnny Agan returned interceptions 75 and 30 yards respectively for touchdowns. A Lion fumble recovery on the locals' seven yard line set up the second Albany touchdown.

### Lions Roar

On the second play from scrimmage Lion halfback Dennis Tucker raced 60 yards for the Lions' first touchdown. Conversion failed.

All-State halfback Agan banged seven yards for a TD after All-State guard Bill Stapp had recovered a Buff bobble. All-State end Rocky Hill kicked the point.

Hill set up the third Lion counter with a 25 yard punt return to the Cross Plains 38. Quarterback Roy Hogan passed the needed yardage to end Bud Leech, and Hill added the point.

### Buff's Score

Late in the first quarter the Herd got its offense moving and pitched its way 77 yards in 16 plays with the drive being climaxed by Darrell Wyatt on a good catch of a three yard toss from Dallas. The two point conversion went to the other side with end Jerry Payne on the receiving end. Key play of the drive was a 14 yard pass from Dallas to Howell for a first on the Lion 35 after the Bison had gambled on a fourth and six situation.

Albany blitzed back with Tucker streaking 62 yards on the first play after the kickoff. Hill again split the uprights.

Jerry Payne shouldered a Lion receiver of a Buff punt out of the way and recovered for the locals on the Lion 28. But on the next play Dallas' pass went into the hands of halfback Hise, who ran 75 yards to score. Hill's kick was wide.

In the second half Agan rounded right end for 31 yards to pay dirt on the second play from scrimmage after they gained the oval. Hogan kicked the point.

Cross Plains then marched from their own 23 to the Lion 21 before an interception stopped the threat. Another interception halted a Bison drive that carried to the Lion two early in the final period. The drive covered 64 yards in 11 plays, the entire yardage coming through the air on eight completions.

Midway through the fourth quarter Hogan had a 47 yard scamper called back by a penalty, but after an incomplete pass he rambled 52 yards to score. He also kicked the point. With just over two minutes remaining in the game quarterback Mike Coulter circled right end for 54 yards and a six pointer. Hogan kicked the point.

Ten second later Agan intercepted a Buff pass and ran 30 yards for the last TD. Hogan made seven of sixes.

### Albany Champ

Albany won the District 10-A championship with a perfect record and will lay their 24 game winning streak on the line Friday night at Albany in the bi-district contest with 9-A winner Mason. The game will start at 7:30 p.m. in Lion Stadium.

Cross Plains finished its most unsuccessful season in recent history with a 2-8 season record and a 1-4 conference showing.

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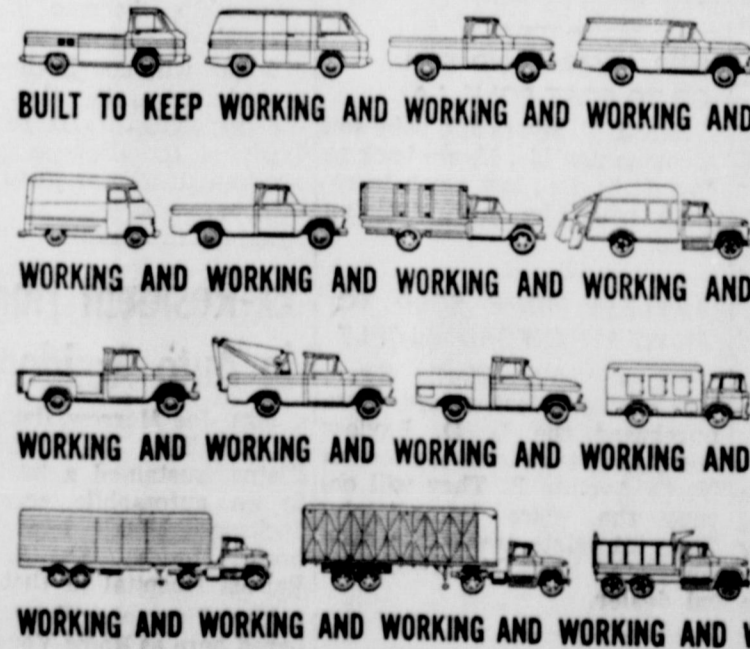

The past seven years, peak years in the Social Security have been in January, according to Fay Ford, Field representative, who visits Cross Plains regularly. She adds that the number of people aged 62 and over in January are usually delayed in processing because of such high volume.

Ford suggests that people over 62 planning on retiring in January or February see her on her next visit to discuss possible advantages of getting their claims early. With the liberalization in the 1961 Amendments everyone over 62 who has three years of more social credits should investigate the possibility of collecting at least some retirement in 1962 even though they are not yet 62. If expected 1962 are less than 1961, Mrs. Ford urges a discussion with her about payment options. The next visit to Cross Plains will be at the City Hall at 10 o'clock Tuesday, Dec. 19.

# How Do You Like Your History? Review Writer Summarizes 1900

How do you like your history, out of a book or day-to-day accounts as the big events were reported by newspapers long ago?

A Cross Plains Review writer has researched the year of 1900 and hereunder abstracts the topics of that time, when Texas was a state of 3,048,710 people.

Greatest story of the year was the Galveston flood, which occurred in early September. Here is the way newspapers chronicled it: Tidal wave smashes Galveston, 6,000 dead, nation stunned, 38,000 marooned, all contact with mainland lost, world helps in only way it knows—with prayers.

Most heinous crime of the new country was the fatal poisoning of Wm. Marsh Rice, one of the state's wealthiest men. He was poisoned by his valet and attorney. Here's the way a Houston paper related the story: "A bank clerk became suspicious when a check signed by W. M. Rice for \$25,000 payable to Albert T. Patrick was presented for cash. He insisted on calling Rice for certification and was told the industrialist was dead. Arrests were immediately made. Rice's fortune, valued at \$8,000,000 will go to Rice Institute and name of the Capitol Hotel in Houston will be changed to the Rice Hotel, by provisions of the owner's will.

Texas newspapers in the summer of 1900 screamed the news that San Antonio was then the state's most populous city with 53,321 people.

Other datelined events of 1900 included these:

Hoboken, N. J., June 30: Steamship piers burned here today killing 326 persons.

Washington, D. C., June 7: The 56th Congress adjourned this morning after being in session 137 days and passing 283 public and 932 private acts.

Baird, Tex., March 30: Callahan County now in its 23rd year is developing rapidly with good economy and being occupied by hardy, substantial people.

New York, N. Y., Dec. 1: James J. Jeffries, boxing heavyweight champion, has been acclaimed "athlete of the year" by the Helms Athletic Foundation.

Fire Creek, W. Va., March 6: Most disastrous mine explosion

ever known in the New River district occurred here early this morning. 125 miners are known dead, representing one-fourth of this town's population.

Atlanta, Ga., June 24: A passenger train on the Macon branch of the Southern Railway ran into a washout near McDonough, Ga., last night killing 35. Every person on the train except occupants of the Pullman car perished.

San Francisco, Calif., Nov. 20: A large crowd of men and boys who had gone to the rooftop of the Pacific Glass Works building here today to view a football game in a nearby field, plunged below into liquid glass vats, when overcrowding caved in the roof. 19 died instantly and about 75 others were injured, some so horribly burned they may never recover.

New Orleans, La., July 29: A race riot started here four days ago was finally controlled tonight. Fights between black and whites raged for days. Six persons were killed and hundreds injured.

Houston, Tex., Sept. 1: Houston, a city of 44,663, will operate its public school system one year for \$94,817.96. (Note: a budget of this size would in 1961 operate a school accommodating around 275 students.

Austin, May 19: Governor Hogg is on a speaking tour of South Texas.

Popular songs being sung throughout the country in 1900 included these: "Well Rooty Tooty-Too, They Blow Their Flute", "The Bird In The Gilded Cage", "Home On The Range", "Jeanie With The Light Brown Hair", "Where Is My Wandering Boy Tonight" and "The Band Played On".

Maxine Elliott was the darling of American swains in 1900 and many masculine hearts skipped a beat when she married the matinee idol, Nat C. Goodwin.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 7: President William McKinley, candidate for reelection, and Vice-Presidential candidate Theodore Roosevelt were elected by a margin of 832,280 popular votes. Their margin in the electoral college was 137.

America's navy in 1900 consisted of 1,357 commissioned officers, 315 warrant officers and 17,229 enlisted men, a total of

18,901. The President was authorized to maintain the regular army at a strength not to exceed 65,000. The Marine Corps had 211 officers and 6,000 men. Population of the United States was 76,304,099.

Top batters in baseball during 1900 were Honus Wagner of Pittsburgh, National League

leader, with an average of .380, and Sam Dungan of Kansas City, American League champion, whose average was .337.

Newspapers in 1900 were telling again of the longest bare-knuckle prize fight on record, which had happened 15 years before. It lasted six hours and 15 minutes and went 185 rounds.

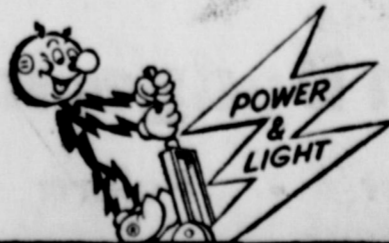

### 'Aid And Comfort' To Enemy?

(An Editorial)

Under military law a soldier can be convicted and shot for giving "aid and comfort" to the enemy.

Have the billions this country has poured into Marshall Tito's Yugoslavia done anything but provide "aid and comfort" to the Communists, whose published objectives are to bury America and rule the world?

Since 1950 the United States has given Tito's country a billion and one-half dollars. Another billion was given from 1940 until 1950, in the hope of winning the Yugoslavs to democratic ideals and the Western concept of freedom. These billions, so gaudily given, do not take into account such other benefactions as the training of foreign pilots to fly American Sabrejets, as is now being done at Perrin Air Force Base despite the protests of enraged citizens.

Supplied with an adequate amount of American dollars, Tito has been traveling through under-developed countries distributing grants, credits and spreading Communist propaganda. Within little more than a year the Yugoslav despot has passed out \$40,000,000 in India, \$15,400,000 to Ceylon, \$10,000,000 in Indonesia, \$10,000,000 to the United Arab Republic, \$5,500,000 to Sudan, \$5,000,000 in Morocco, a five-year credit to Ghana to build a sugar refinery, a distillery and other projects, plus a second helping of \$15,000,000 to Indonesia.

If we're determined to give away our wealth, wouldn't these grants have profited us more if they had come directly from the United States, and not from a man who stood up at an international conference in Belgrade last August and parroted the Moscow doctrine?

One of the better-informed Americans on Yugoslavia is Dr. Charles Zaler, a former diplomat now with the Library of Congress, who worked with the senate sub-committee on an extensive study of how Tito is using American aid. This is what he says:

"Yugoslavia can never be won to the West. In case of War, Tito will fight on the side of international Communism. He knows that his particular brand of Communism can never survive if world Communism is brought to an end."

There is little comfort to American people in seeing sizeable tax bites taken from their earnings, when it is remembered that a portion goes to such purposes as perpetuating Tito and his kind. There is even less comfort to mothers and fathers, who realize the dollars to Yugoslavia are "stacking the deck" for an enemy their sons may one day oppose.
