Vegetation was killed throughout the Cross Plains area this NEXT ISSUE SLATES week by Winter weather. The slayer this time, however, was freeze and not frost. Tuesday morning's temperature, guaged between 14 and 19 degrees on various thermometers, was the death knell for exposed plants.

Average date for a killing frost in the Cross Plains area is Nov. 13, however, only light frosts preceded the freeze. This is seldom the case in this section of Texas, old timers declare.

Brucellosis Tests To Begin In April

PRICE SEVEN CENTS

Cattle herds of Callahan County will be tested for brucellosis. Five hundred and forty-two persons, representing ownership of 68 per cent of the county's cattle, signed petitions requesting the program be instituted. Only 528 signatures, representing 51 per cent of the cattle ownership, were required.

Petitions and official request for countywide testing were delivered by Deel Edington of Cross Plains to Dr. James B. Henderson in Coleman over the week end. Actual testing is expected to get underway by April 1.

Securing the necessary number of signatures to wind-up the petitions was accomplished in an enthusiastic drive made in all sections of the country last week by farmers, ranchers and livestock owners. As a result of their efforts the "clean-up" program will eliminate financial penalties which have heretofore been imposed upon cattle leaving Callahan County.
