# Farmer Who Should Know, Says Irrigation Here Beats Texas Plains

A man who knows irrigated farming and all its ramifications has left the Texas plains where he worked 1,000 acres, and bought a spread of similar size north of Pioneer, which he feels offers a better

He is Cowan Hutton, who was an irrigation farmer in Lubbock County 21 years.

Wherever shallow water is available in the Cross Plains area, a real opportunity exists," he says. Hutton is fortunate. There is a prolific water sand on his

old Cade place, seven miles

utilizing four wells with a

total output of 700 gallons

per minute, to irrigate 140

The Cade place of 143 acres was Hutton's first land purchase here. He bought it seven years ago. Since then he's acquired the A. A. Huntington place of 400 acres, the 206 acre Henry Shaeffer farm and the 150 acre Talbert tract for a total of 899 acres.

The watered land has been principally planted in peanuts, maize and corn. Hutton believes, however, other crops could also be profitably irrigated. Most forage raised on the irrigation project is fed to livestock. In the past seven years Cowan has bought no commercial feed for his cattle

and goat herds, and his animals are uncommonly fat. neighbors say.

Hutton is quick to attribute credit for his success in local irrigation to his father-in-law. Delma Dean, who has been looking after the operation since the start.

"After all I was in Lubbock County until last September," he says.

Hutton believes that any farmer who can get shallow wells capable of making around 100 gallons per minute can irrigate profitably.

Contrary to popular opinion soil here is more fertile than many imagine. Hutton took scattered samples from his Eastland County acreage and then did the same thing from the high-priced land he was farming in Lubbock County. The two batches of samplestheir designations known only to Hutton-were sent to a soil analysis laboratory for appraisal. The Eastland County samples came through tests with fertility ratings far in excess of those from the Texas

Although fertilizer is needed here, Hutton points out that it is used in meager quantities as compared with the highly-touted Texas plains. There they apply nitrogen up to 82 percent, whereas anything more than 16 is rare

here, he pointed out.

Deep plowing is another practice which Hutton believes could be utilized to greater advantage throughout the Cross Plains area. He's doing much of it at his place and has found that the soil is as thick as four feet in many places. He emphasizes that not only is fertility enhanced by deep plowing but that greater root penetration and more retentive capacity for

rainfall is gained. "We've got a wonderful country here," Hutton says, "it presents an interesting challenge in the future of

agriculture. Hutton first started visiting this area after he married the former Laverne Dean in December 1941.

"Every time we came down to visit her parents I was impressed with the condition of livestock and crops. The country just appealed to me," he

The Hutton's have five children: a married daughter, Mrs. Wanetta Parsons, and four sons, Cowan Junior, J. D. Danny and Lynn. They have built a commodious new three bed-room and basement home of Lueders stone on the land north of Pioneer, and face the future confident that their soil will reward them amply.





# 70-Year-Old Man Here **Speaks Five Languages**

In Callahan County, where 99 percent of the people are native born Americans, foreign languages are seldom heard. The native tongue is all most people ever take the trouble to master. A. A. (Almer) Anderson, who lives on the Brightwell Ranch, 13 miles west of Cross Plains, is an exception.

Although he was born in Texas-70 years ago-and was never out of the state until inducted into military service during World War I, Anderson speaks five languages fluently. They are: English, Norweigan, Swedish, Danish and Spanish.

Why did a native Texan learn three languages only rarely used in this state? The Scandanavian tongues had been commonly used by Anderson's parents who came to this country from Norway. Their first two children were born there, and they and the subsequent sons and daughters were taught the languages. Spanish was learned in Bosque County, where Anderson spent his boyhood and noon.

Mexicans were numerous.

Although Anderson seldom has an opportunity to use more than two of the languages which he knows, they stand him in good stead anytime a foreign word is encountered in reading. Similarity of tongues often dictates meaning of a strange word, seen for the first time.

Anderson and his wife lived in Cross Plains until moving to the Bightwell Ranch 12 years ago. Their two children reside here now. They are Mrs. Rufus Renfro and Darwin Anderson.

Anderson is a small, quiet man, who listens more than he talks. When he speaks, however, friends heed intently. The man of five languages never ceases to astound them with exceptional talent and understanding.






