more poll taxes were paid in Cross Plains this year than any other Callahan County voting precinct. Baird, which ordinarily leads, dropped four below Cross Plains.

Total in Callahan County this year is 2,008. A breakdown by voting precincts is shown in the accompanying table.

Only 31 exemption certificates were issued to new voters, who will be 21 years old after poll tax paying time but before election day

In counties of less than 10,-000 population, of which Callahan is one, persons over 60 are not required to register for free votes. It is estimated that there are 1,000 such elgibles in this county, however, no more than half that number custom-

arily casts ballots. The county as a whole showed a decline of 120 poll tax payers this year as compared with two years ago. 1960, through was a presidential election year. Of the 14 Callahan County voting boxes, 10 showed a loss in voting strength and four registered

Poll tax payments in counties adjacent to Callahan were: Eastland 4.185, Coleman 2,554, Brown 5,507, and Shackelford

Pat McNeel, Sr. and Tom Bryant, executives of that corporation, do not recall the exact number of barrels of oil which had been run at the time of the Amerada sale. It is believed, however, that about 75, 000 is near the total. Since then Amerada has sold 3,487,246 barrels. Largest well on the lease is still making 29 barrels daily. It is 35 years old. Average daily production of the entire lease now is reported to be 450 barrels. The property is currently in its 44th month of water-flooding. Twenty-five injection wells are being utilized to recycle 8,-000 barrels of water daily.


