Miss Ida Nell Williams of Austin, art teacher of Casis School there, has been listed in the 1961-62 edition of Who's Who in American Education. This volume is an illustrated biographical directory of eminent living educators of the United States and Canada.

Miss Williams holds B.S. and M.A. degrees from Texas Woman's University, Denton, and has studied advanced painting with Alexander Hogue and John Chetcuti. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Williams of Cross Plains.

In 1944 she became associated with the Austin Public Schools, teaching at Robert E. Lee until joining the Casis faculty in 1951. Prior to this she taught at Lockhart and Paducah, and taught art education at the University of Texas in the summer of 1950.

## \$104,158 Contract Let For 2 Flood Dams Here

R. E. Dennison of Tilden, Tex., submitted low bid of \$104,158.50 for the construction of the first two of 12 floodwater retarding structures to be built in the watershed of Turkey Creek Conservation District.

E. J. Hughes of Brownwood, area soil conservationist, told directors of the local flood control unit at a meeting in Cross Plains Thursday night that four bidders tendered proposals.

**Specifications Explained**  
Dennison's bid calls for placing and compacting about 200,000 cubic yards of earth-filled material, evacuation and placement of about 4,000 cubic yards of rock, furnishing and installing about 4,100 pounds of reinforcement steel in 93 cubic yards of concrete, placing 30,000 square yards of topsoil, constructing approximately 15,000 feet of net wire fencing and installing 400 feet of 24 inch spun concrete pipe in principal spillways. The two projects are to be finished within 212 calendar days from Feb. 28, making completion date Sept. 28.

The two sites to be built are those numbered two and three on the district's construction plans. Both are in the Cottonwood locality. Site two is on land owned by the Coats heirs, Floyd Odell and Claude Joy, of Cottonwood, and site three is on

the Evans land in the same general area.

**10 More Programed**  
Ten additional floodwater retarding structures in the Turkey Creek District are scheduled for construction to begin by June 30. The eight sites, numbers 8 and 9, 10 and 12, 4 and 5, 6 and 7, are to be advertised and let in four contracts. Two remaining sites, 1 and 11, are scheduled for construction during the 1963 fiscal year, say directors of Turkey Creek Conservation District.

**Other Units Help**  
In preparing for awarding of each contract, the Baird and Rising Star Work Units of the Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with the Central Colorado and Brown-Mills Soil Conservation Districts will work with farmers and ranchers in getting Basic Conservation Plans for carrying on a program of soil, water and plant conservation above each of the structures. At least one-half the drainage area above each structure must have a basic plan for controlling accelerated erosion before the contracts can be awarded for construction. The directors of the Turkey Creek Conservation District and each of the Soil Conservation Districts are urging greatest possible participation among land-

## Local Boys Score Well At Houston Stock Show

Scott Odom, Cross Plains High School freshman and son of Mr. and Mrs. Morris Odom, garnered a number laurel as a livestock exhibitor at the Houston Fat Stock Show over the week end. He claimed eighth place in the Angus calf division and sold for 40 cents per pound. Weighing 825 pounds the calf brought \$330. In addition, the local youth will receive a cash award.

A second calf entered by Odom in the Houston show survived the sifting committee but failed to finish among the prize winners. It sold, however, well above market price.

Weems radioed the sheriff's department and was joined by Deputy Sheriffs Byron Richardson, Tod Newton and City Marshal Lee Brown of Baird. One of the three apprehended admitted shooting the calf but could not remember exactly where. It was learned, however, that they had been to the Brown County line bought beer and were returning to Baird along the Farm-to-Market Road north of Cross Plains.

**Ranchers Aid Lawmen**  
Ranchers Gene Finley, Bill Hatchett and son, Jim Roy, were contacted and asked to help find the rightful owner of the slain calf. Assisting officers, they soon found that the animal belonged to Bob Joy of Cross Plains. It had been killed with a .22 calibre rifle on his farm .7 of a mile north of Cottonwood.

Statements were taken from the two younger men in which they confessed the calf was shot from the public road, then loaded in the car. They are said to have implicated the older man, however, he refused to admit any connection.

**New In County**  
Richardson lodged charges of cattle theft against each of the men and one of shooting firearms from a public road against Collier. Charges of driving while intoxicated and on the wrong side of the road were filed by Weems against Townsend. Weems also charged the other two men with drunkenness.

Collier told arresting officers that he had just moved his family to Baird a few hours before being apprehended. He said he had gone there to join a cedar-chopping crew. Both others charged also have families.

Officers report there have been other isolated incidents of cattle theft in Callahan County in recent months and that efforts are being intensified to apprehend rustlers.

All charges were filed in Justice of the Peace W. L. (Lawrence) Bowlus' court at Baird.

## Over Three-Fourths Fruit Killed By Recent Freezes

At least 75 per cent of this year's fruit crop is believed to have been killed by freezing weather, opine local orchardmen.

Most peach, pear and plum trees were in blossom when temperatures dived to near 10 degrees here last week. Apple and apricot trees may possibly

yield some fruit. Extent of their damage is more in doubt.

At Rising Star, peach and pecan grower C. E. Smith said he "wouldn't give 15 cents" for his chances of getting much of a fruit crop this year. But he thought prospects for pecans remained good since the trees had not started new growth.

## Bandit Whips Out Pistol, Holds 3 Officers At Bay

Two armed robbers gave Sheriff Homer Price and two Highway Patrolmen several anxious moments Monday night.

The pair, who had robbed a service station in Palo Pinto County earlier in the night and temporarily abducted an attendant, was stopped near Baird by the two patrolmen because of a defective tail-light. Investigation revealed that the two coincided with a description broadcast from Palo Pinto County of the men involved in the crime there. Officers took them into custody and were near Callahan County jail, when one of the pair whipped out a .25 calibre automatic pistol and held

his captors at bay.

Sheriff Price, hearing a ruckus, went outside to investigate. He was unarmed and quickly fell victim of the same predicament in which the other two officers were involved.

Reports are that Price might have been shot if the bandit's pistol had not jammed. The second prisoner, not sharing the menacing attitude of his partner, grabbed the gun during an unguarded second and a fight ensued. Officers leaped into the fray and quickly seized the pistol.

The prisoners, both from out-of-state, are now jailed and will face charges in at least two counties.

## Man Who Stole Watch At Rowden Store Confesses

Milton Ross Cox, 35, of Brownwood, was arrested in a local service station Monday and charged with theft of a watch from the Rowden Store, operated by Mr. and Mrs. Weldon Gary.

Cox told arresting officers in a signed statement that he entered the Rowden Store about 4 p.m. and that Mrs. Gary was in the back. Before she could reach the front, he grabbed in a

showcase and stole a watch valued at \$29.50 plus tax.

He was nabbed in Don Watkins' Humble Station a few minutes later by Highway Patrolman Jerry Mathews and is now being held in jail at Baird.

Cox is also charged with "shop lifting" from the John Loven station on Highway 36, 10 miles west of Rowden store.

Charges were filed in J. M. McMillan's justice court in Cross Plains.

## City Passes Civil Defense Ordinance

In accordance with suggestions of federal authorities, Cross Plains City Council has enacted an ordinance to empower a civil defense and disaster relief committee to function in time of extreme emergency.

The new statute designates the mayor of Cross Plains as civil defense coordinator and authorizes his appointment of a committee of subordinates.

The mayor is further authorized to cooperate with county officials and representatives of nearby cities in working out relief and civil defense facilities.

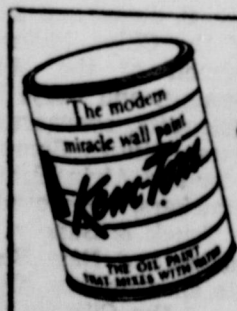

Callahan County farmers are showing an increased interest in the 1962 Feed Grain Program, reports Tommie Harris, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

As of March 1, a total of 94 farmers had signed to divert 2,200 acres from corn and grain sorghums into soil conserving uses.

From now on, Chairman Harris believes, officials will be increasingly busy explaining the program to farmers and helping them fill out the necessary forms indicating their "intention to participate" in the 1962 feed grain program. Under the program, diversion payments are available to farmers who shift a stated percentage of their acreage formerly planted to corn and grain sorghum into approved soil-conserving practice. By cooperating in the program, growers also qualify for price supports in their 1962 crops of corn and grain sorghum.

**CIVIL DEFENSE AND DISASTER  
ORDINANCE**

**AN ORDINANCE CREATING A  
MUNICIPAL DEFENSE AND  
DISASTER RELIEF COMMITTEE  
BETWEEN THIS AND OTHER  
CITIES OR COUNTIES; AND  
FOR RELATED PURPOSES:  
PROHIBITING UNAUTHOR-  
IZED LIGHTS AND WARNING  
AND ALL-CLEAR SIGNALS AND  
MAKING VIOLATIONS A MIS-  
DEMEANOR PUNISHABLE BY  
FINE NOT EXCEEDING \$50.**

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY  
COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF  
CROSS PLAINS, TEXAS:**

Section 1. There is hereby created  
the Municipal Defense and Disaster  
Relief Committee of the City of  
Cross Plains, Texas, which shall  
hereafter consist of the follow-  
ing:

(a) The Mayor of the City of  
Cross Plains, Texas, who shall serve  
as Chairman of the Committee, and  
who shall be known as Municipal  
Defense Coordinator of the City of  
Cross Plains, Texas.

(b) The Assistant Defense Coordi-  
nator of the City of Cross Plains,  
Texas, who shall be charged with  
the preparation of a civil defense  
plan for said city, together with  
such other duties as the Coordina-  
tor may prescribe. The Assistant  
Coordinator shall be appointed and  
hold his position at the pleasure of  
the Municipal Defense Coordinator.  
The Assistant Coordinator shall  
serve as Vice-Chairman of the Mu-  
nicipal Civil Defense and Disaster  
Relief Committee of the City of  
Cross Plains, Texas.

(c) The Directors of Divisions and  
Chiefs of Services of such Divisions  
as may be provided by resolution by  
the City Council or by directive of  
the Municipal Defense Coordinator.  
Representatives not to ex-  
ceed twelve in number from civic,  
business, industry, labor, veterans,  
professional, or other groups to be  
selected and appointed by the  
Mayor.

Section 2. The powers and duties  
of the Municipal Civil Defense and  
Disaster Relief Committee shall in-  
clude the recommendation for adop-  
tion by the City Council of a civil  
defense plan for the City of Cross  
Plains, Texas, and the recommen-  
dation for adoption by the City  
Council of any and all mutual aid  
plans and agreements which are  
deemed essential to the implemen-  
tation of such civil defense plan.  
The duties of such Civil Defense and  
Disaster Relief Committee shall also  
include the making of a survey of  
the availability of existing person-  
nel, equipment, supplies and ser-  
vices which could be used during an  
emergency, as provided for herein,  
as well as a continuing study of the  
need for amendments and improve-  
ments in the civil defense plan  
adopted by the City Council. The  
Civil Defense and Disaster Relief  
Committee of the City of Cross  
Plains, Texas, shall meet upon the  
call of either the Chairman or Vice-  
Chairman.

Section 3. The Mayor of the City  
of Cross Plains, Texas, is hereby  
authorized to join with the County  
Judge of the County of Callahan,  
and the Mayors of other cities in  
said county in the formation of a  
Civil Defense and Disaster Relief  
Council for the County of Callahan  
and shall have the authority to co-  
operate in the formation of a Civil  
defense plan for the County of  
Callahan and in the appointment  
of a Civil Defense Director for the  
County of Callahan, as well as all  
other powers necessary to partici-  
pate in a county-wide program of  
civil defense and disaster relief in  
the City of Cross Plains, Texas.

Section 4. The office of Municipal  
Defense Coordinator is hereby cre-  
ated. The Municipal Defense Coordi-  
nator shall have the authority to  
request the declaration of an emer-  
gency by the City Council or the  
City of Cross Plains, Texas. In  
the event it is deemed necessary to  
declare the existence of an emer-  
gency without delay, the Coordina-  
tor may, if the City Council is not  
in session, do so, but such action  
shall be subject to confirmation by

Fronts of the checks in that day were about the same as now, however, on the back of each was a bill of sale for completing cattle, hog, horse and sheep transactions.

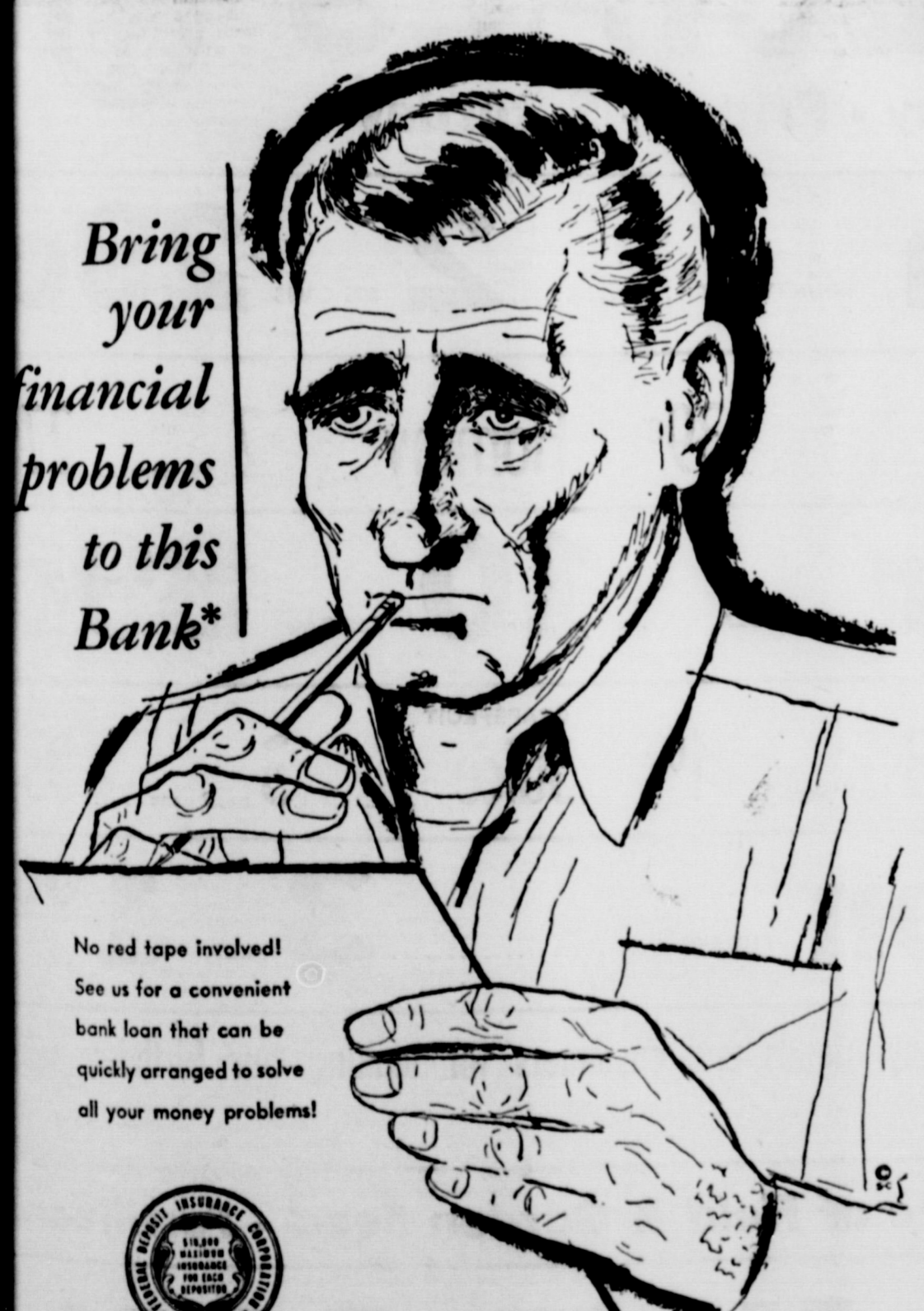

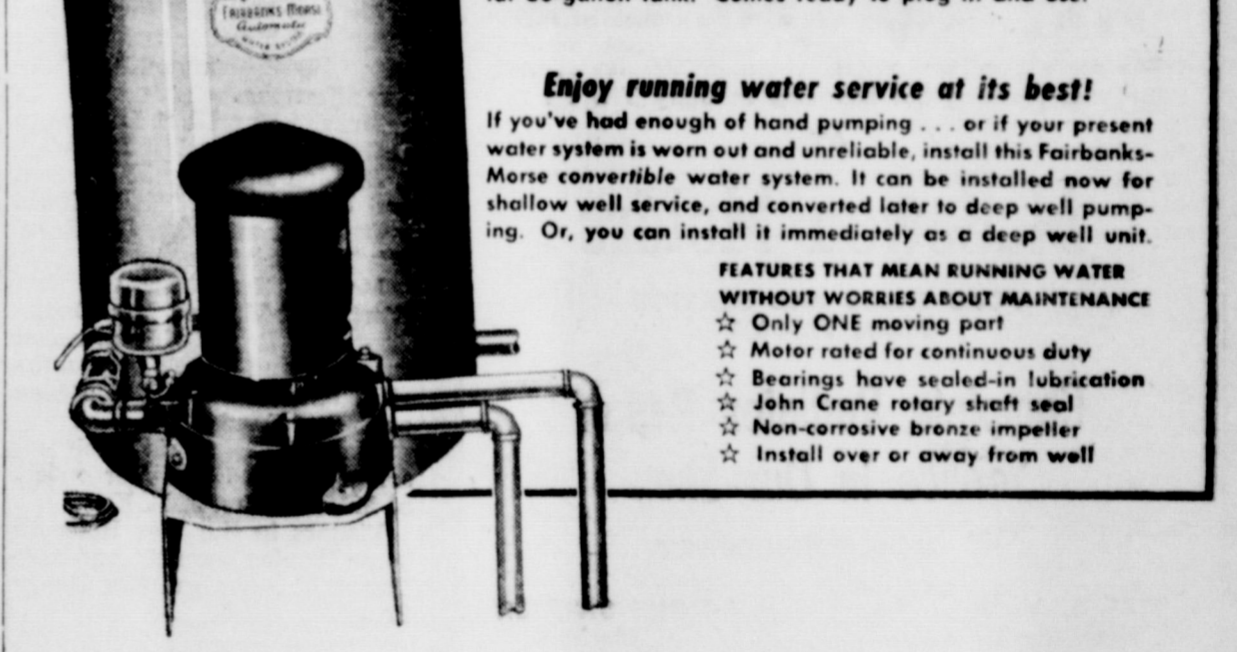

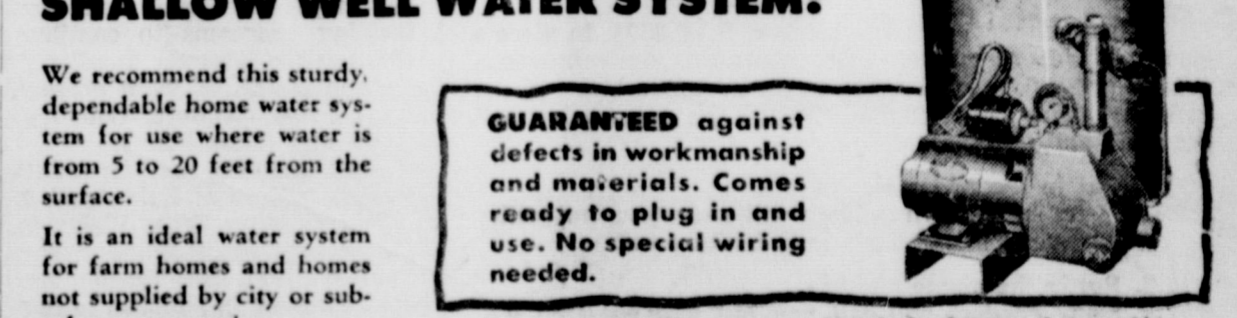

- Keep the readers from guessing**  
On important details it is better to include them if they are relevant to a sale.
- Be available**  
If you advertise your phone and address be sure you are not absent when the ad appears so as to accommodate the reader.
