Expect Over 200 Visitors At Tourney Here Sunday

Between 200 and 300 visitors from 12 communities are expected in Cross Plains Sunday afternoon as this city plays host to the annual archery tournament for Explorer, Boy and Cub Scouts.

Competition will be held on the high school football field here, beginning at 2 p.m. Jack Tunnell will serve as tournament director.

39 Teams Eligible
Three teams of four members each are eligible from the following places: Baird, Clyde, Moxelle, Coleman, Winters, Wingate, Santa Anna, Talpa, Novice, Putnam, Eula, Valera and Cross Plains.

Although most of the communities will not send a full complement of three teams, all are expected to be entered in some phase of competition.

Tunnell Makes Trophies
Trophies will be awarded winning teams in all divisions. The awards are customarily provided by the host city and those to be given here have been handcrafted by Tunnell, an adult leader of long standing in the Scout program. They are said to be the most attractive awards ever provided in the annual archery competition and are available at no cost as a result of the local man's public spiritedness.

There will be no admission charge for the tournament and local people are being urged by Scout leaders to attend.

"Presence of an audience is inspiring to boys and stimulates interest in not only archery but the entire Scout program," said Paul Whitton, one of the local group which is assisting Tunnell in making preparations for Sunday's event.

Last year's archery tourney was held at Clyde.

Five local juveniles were apprehended here Monday night after Perkins Laundry had been looted and the cash box taken. The quintet surrendered \$40.16 to Deputy Sheriff Byron Richardson, which they said was taken from the laundry and confessed to shoplifting at 13 other Cross Plains concerns.

Hey Podner, Bottled Any Worms For Today's Mail?

Callahan County livestock owners, who contributed \$7,700 to the screwworm eradication experiment now underway in Texas, are now rendering a scientific service. They're bottling worms and there's good reason why.

Scientists have requested that any case of screwworms detected on a Callahan County farm be closely examined and samples of the worms

bottled and sent to the County Agent or directly to Screw-worm Identification, Box 969, Mission, Texas.

Laboratories at Mission will identify the organisms and if they are found to be screwworms, the infested areas will be "treated" with sterile flies. This will be a means of hastening eradication of the expensive pest, in addition to procedures now being utilized in South Texas.

It is explained that the bottled samples should contain about 10 worms and be covered with water of alcohol so they will not dry up.

County Agent Travis Allen declares there will be no quarantining of cattle as had been thought by some. He stresses that the help local livestockmen give scientists will curtail spread of the pests and ultimately hasten their complete eradication.

After the sample worms have been removed from infested animals, Allen says treatment of wounds should proceed as usual. He points out that the Animal Health Foundation is recommending use of Korlan smear.

"So much hard work has already gone into this program and possibilities of success promise such rewards that every livestockman should cooperate completely," Allen said Tuesday.

Those who have not yet made money contributions to the program and wish to do so are reminded that additional funds are urgently needed. There are committeemen in every community to accept donations for this purpose.

Prominent Lady Buried Tuesday

Funeral service for Mrs. Walton Wagner, 86, who died in an Amarillo hospital Sunday afternoon, was held from the Cross Plains Church of Christ Tuesday at 2 p.m. with Claude Sikas of Abilene Christian College and Minister Bill Nicks officiating. Burial was in the local cemetery beside the grave of her husband who died June 6, 1930.

Mrs. Wagner was born March 14, 1876, at Crockett and came to Cross Plains in 1896 to teach music where she met and married Walton Wagner, Feb. 28, 1897. They made their home here during the intervening years and when this city was incorporated in 1911, her husband was chosen as first mayor.

Mrs. Wagner enjoyed many unusual distinctions. She was one of only two women ever to serve as members of the local school board. It was during her time in office that the present high school building was erected on North Main Street. She was also a member of both the Daughters of the American Revolution and Daughters of the Confederacy. She was a long-time member of the Church of Christ and taught a Sunday school class of adult women until she became ill.

Mrs. Wagner moved to Amarillo about 20 years ago, to the home of her eldest daughter, Mrs. Key Furr, and had resided in that city since. She had been in declining health several months.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Furr and Mrs. Henry Cravens of Merton, nine grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren. Two sons, Bill and Ross and a daughter, Frieda, as well as her husband, preceded her in death.

Grandsons served as pall bearers at the funeral and interment services Tuesday afternoon.

Council Talks Of Buying Gas Meter

Cross Plains City Council in regular semi-monthly session Tuesday night discussed installing an orifice meter at the city gate as a means of measuring gas purchased by the municipality for resale through its distribution lines.

Equipment of the type desired is reported to cost in the neighborhood of \$600. Councilmen are now investigating meters offered by various manufacturers. Gas purchased by the city during February cost \$1,635.

All members of the Council were present at Tuesday night's meeting.

"Transfers of this nature are easily arranged on a one year basis and the grantors suffer no loss or decrease in

their original allotments," said J. C. Earp, head of the ASC office in Baird.

Fourth, fifth and sixth grade geography: At Home and Around the World, The American Continents and Living in the Old World.

Seventh and eighth grade vocal music: Brichard Music Series, Music in Our Life and Music in Our Times.

Eighth grade American history: Freedom's Frontier.

American dictionaries for use in grades four through the seventh: Thorndike-Barnhart Dictionaries.

High school science: Hogg, Physical Science—A Basic Course.

American history in high school: Todd's Rise of the American Nation.

World history in high school: Boak's The History of Our World.

The selections to be used in Cross Plains were gleaned from a larger list, which had been prepared by a 15-member statewide textbook committee. The books will be new ones, introduced in the local school system in September.

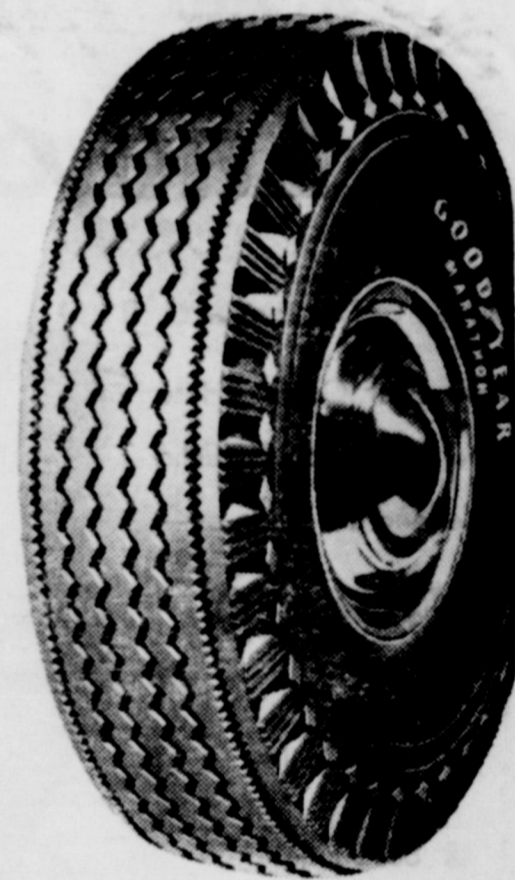

Bidders Figure On 2 More Dams As Work Begins On First 2 Here

With construction beginning on two retention dams in the Cross Plains area, bidders are now readying proposals for two more projects which are to be opened by officials of the Soil Conservation Service at Temple April 6.

R. E. Dennison, successful bidder at \$104,158.50, on the first two dams, is assembling equipment and personnel at sites two and three.

Sites eight and nine will be let next. Eight is on the Damon Jones farm, southwest of Cottonwood, and nine is on the Oliver D. Worthy place one mile north of Cross Plains.

Largest of the first four dams to be built is site two, for which specifications call for the impounding of 213,539 cubic yards of dirt. This project is on lands owned by the Coats heirs, Floyd Odell and Claude Joy. Next largest project of the initial four will be at site nine on the Worthy place. It calls for the removal of 110,730 cubic yards.

Smallest of the first four projects is at site three on the

Evans heirs property, west of Cottonwood. It requires impounding 56,517 cubic yards of dirt.

Bids on the next two projects will be opened at 2 p.m. April 6 at the First National Bank in Temple.

A total of 12 retention dams will eventually be built in the watershed of Turkey Creek in Callahan and Brownwood Counties.

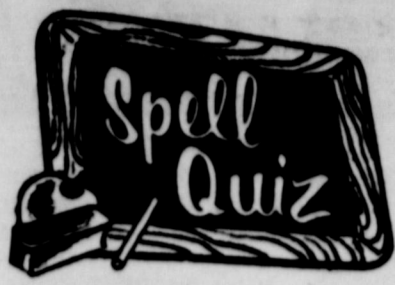

Auto Owners May Face Waiting Line

Only 20 days remain for automobile owners to submit vehicles for safety inspection and secure windshield stickers. In Cross Plains barely more than half the cars have been tested.

Cliff Gilmore, who operates Cross Plains' only inspection station, said yesterday that he expects to face an unprecedented rush just ahead of the April 15 deadline.

Operation of a vehicle on a public road without the sticker after April 15 will subject owners to a fine up to as much as \$200. Customary fine here, however, is about \$20.50.

Gilmore said yesterday that to date he has issued 320 stickers in 1962 whereas the usual number for this date is about 400. Within 12 months about 900 stickers are issued in Cross Plains, however, many of these go on new vehicles and are supplied later in the year.

Marrriages Lead Divorces 3 - 1 In Callahan County



Marrriages lead divorces by more than three to one in Callahan County. This fact was garnered from an examination of records in the offices of County Clerk Jonie Robinson and District Clerk Corrie Driskill in Baird this week.

During 1961 Mrs. Robinson issued 94 marriage licenses. The number would have been larger, she opines, were it not for the fact that many local people go to Abilene for blood tests, a pre-requisite to securing marriage permits, and buy their license outside this county. During the same calendar year 30 divorces were issued in 42nd District Court in Callahan County.

Thus far in 1962, marriage licenses are leading divorces five to one. Up to March 16, Mrs. Robinson had issued 15 licenses, whereas only three divorces have been finalized.

Officials report there is still confusion about Texas' blood test requirement. They point out that the law says both the prospective bride and groom must submit. Contrary to the belief of many, however, there is no three-day waiting period. County Clerks issue the licenses as soon as satisfactory blood test certificates are presented. Usually a couple takes the test one day and receives the necessary certificate the next. It is possible, however, to complete the requirement in a single day.

Although blood test samples are taken at the Callahan County Hospital in Baird, they must be sent to an Abilene laboratory for testing.

Judge Says Merger Of Offices Is Unwise

Consolidating the office of District Clerk with that of County Clerk, as is to be done in Callahan County, will not prove economical and can't possibly be in the interest of efficiency, said District Judge J. R. Black to a representative of this newspaper.

When a county's population drops below 8,000, Texas law requires that the two offices be merged unless there is a vote of the people to the contrary. Callahan County's 1960 population was 7,929.

A recent survey by the University of Texas claimed that Callahan County's population in 1961 rose to 8,265.

To The Voters Of Justice Precinct 6, Callahan County

There seems to be quite a number of the people who do not know the duties of a Justice of the Peace. A Justice sets the fine. The State Law sets the cost. If a person is brought in or given a ticket for a traffic violation by a county officer, and a fine is set at \$1.00, then the cost is \$19.50 which costs the violator \$20.50. If a state patrolman gives the ticket, the cost is \$15.50. There is no arresting fee charged.

The minimum fine is \$1.00. The maximum fine is \$200.00. A Justice is authorized to set a fine anywhere from \$1.00 to \$200.00. Most all the fines paid here in Justice Court range from \$1.00 to \$10.00, then the cost is added.

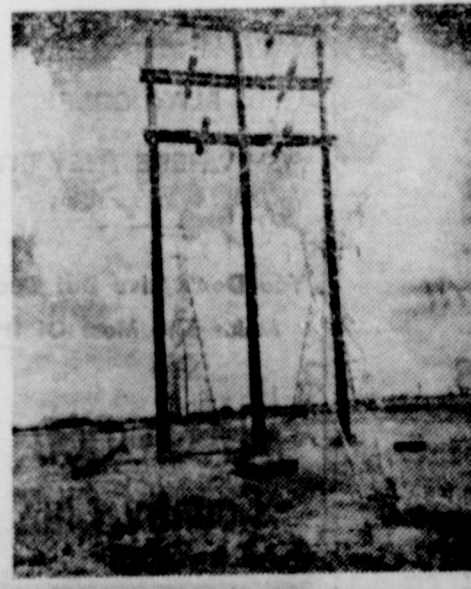
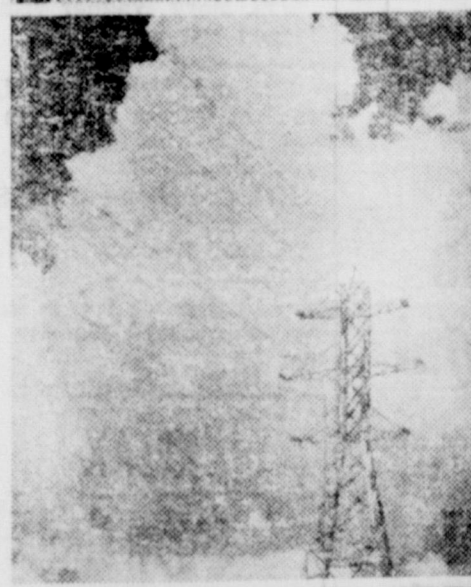
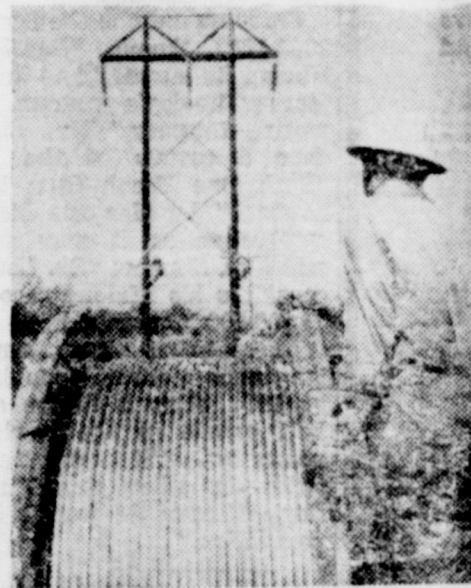

Highline routes to

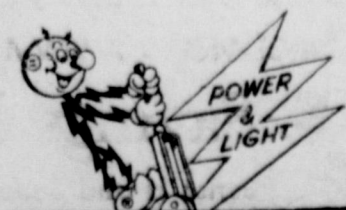
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High voltage transmission lines carry electric energy throughout our service area.

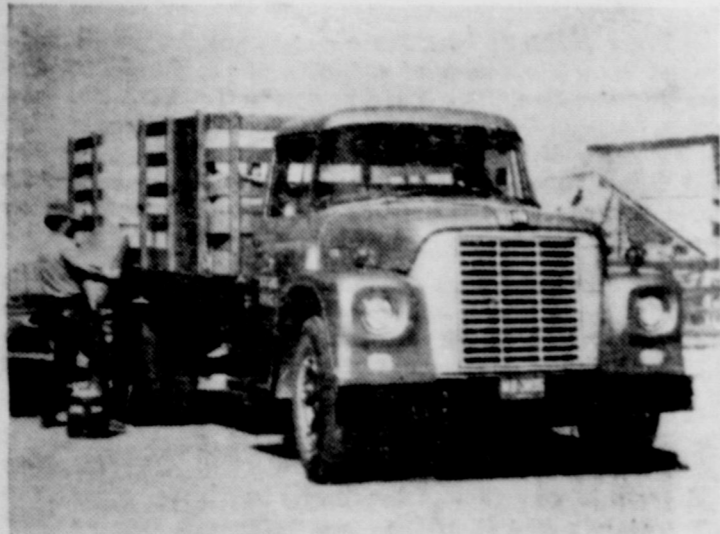
